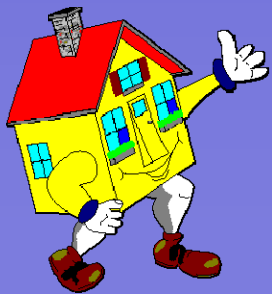


Aims of Block Watch

- Increase awareness of judicial process.



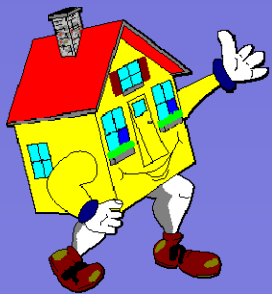

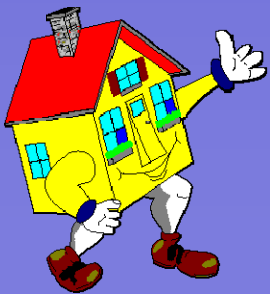
The Criminal Code defines Breaking and Entering in Section 348 as:

1. Everyone who

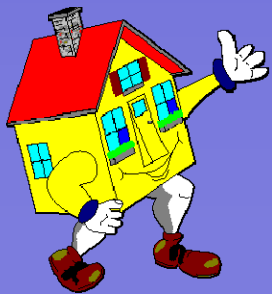
- a) breaks and enters a place with intent to commit an I.O.* therein,
- b) breaks and enters a place and commits an I.O.
- c) breaks out of a place after
 - I) committing an I.O. therein, or
 - ii) entering the place with intent to commit an I.O. therein, is guilty
- d) in relation to a dwelling-house, to imprisonment for life, and
- e) in relation to a place other than a dwelling-house, not exceeding ten years.

"Place" means a dwelling-house, building or structure or any part thereof, other than a dwelling-house, railway vehicle, vessel, aircraft, or trailer, or a pen in which fur-bearing animals are kept in captivity for breeding or commercial purposes.

* Indictable Offence (I.O.) : An offence against a federal statute.

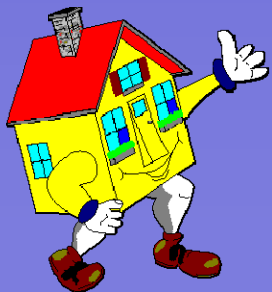

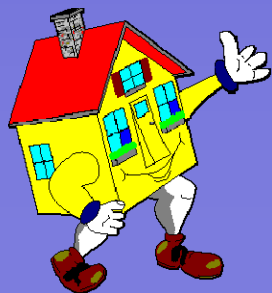

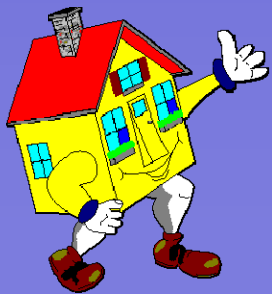

community last year?



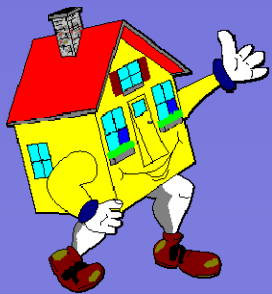
A residential* break in, how does it happen?

- Target Hardening (CPTED).

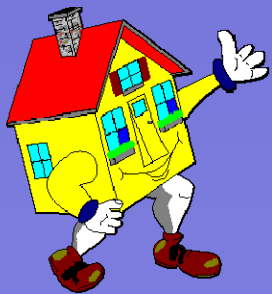

- Refer to your Captain's Handbook.
- Have at least one annual meeting.
- Keep your Block Map current.
- Welcome new neighbours.
- Distribute Participant Manual.
- Mark valuables for identification.
- Share home security tips.
- Report suspicious activity/fan out.



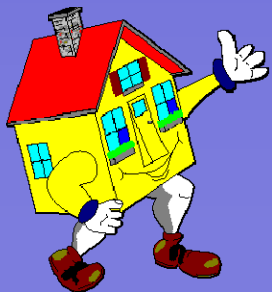
Remember, you are not the

for your block.



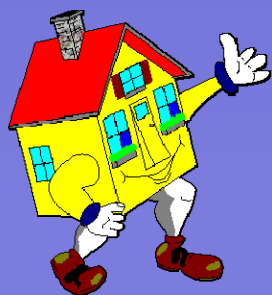
Every Block Watch must have one Captain and at least one Co-Captain. Practically speaking, there is no difference between the two.

They must come from separate households.

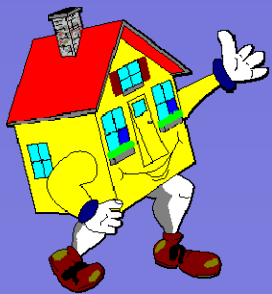
If you leave, move or wish to take a break, please, find someone to take your place.



The Block Watch program does NOT expect, or ask you to patrol your neighbourhood. We simply ask that you and your neighbours be our eyes and ears until our arrival. In short, to be our "Best Witness".

Participation to be effective.

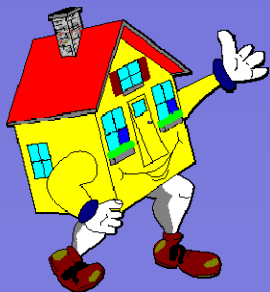
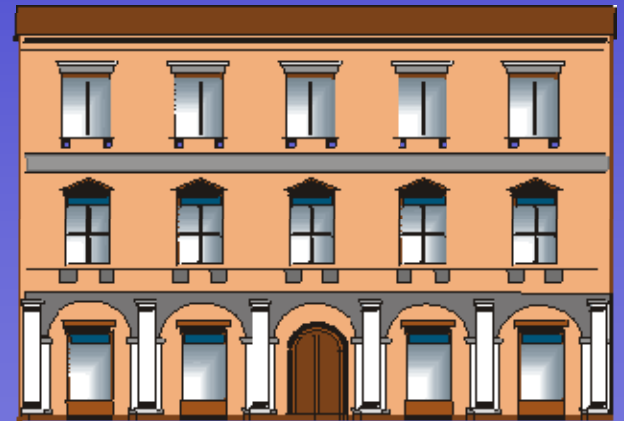

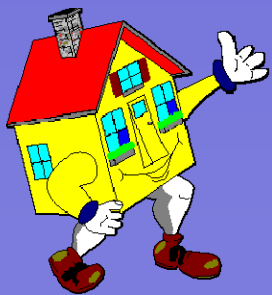
When you canvass your block

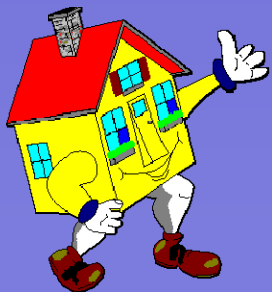
When and where to hold the meeting

- Church hall, community centre, home, school, library, service club, common room.

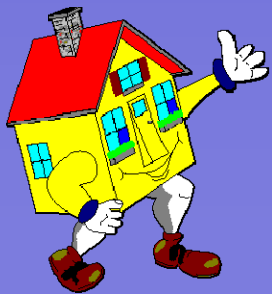


If you would like

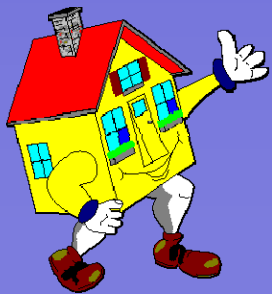

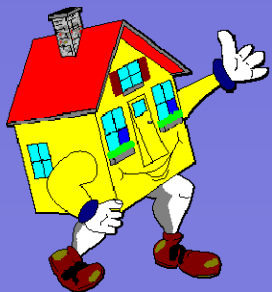
- Chaired by BC/CC.

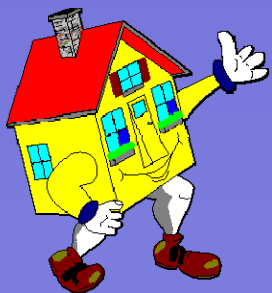
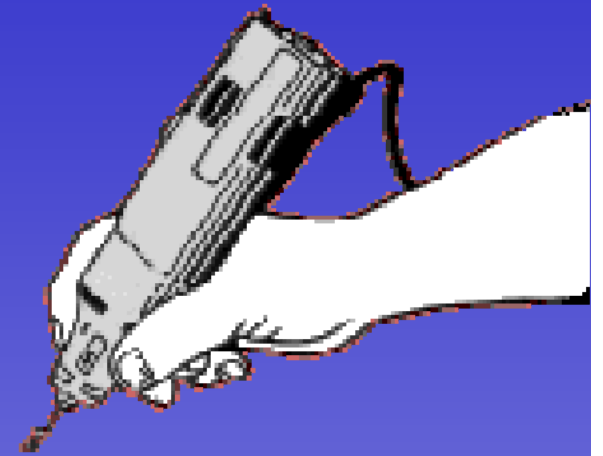


- Do not run the meeting.
- Do not bring window stickers.
- They are usually scheduled to arrive half an hour after the meeting starts.
- They will answer questions relating to policing, your neighbourhood.....



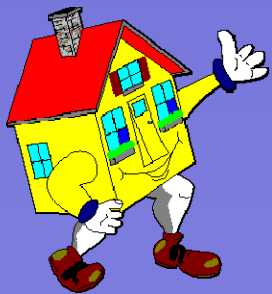
Engraving your Property

- Engrave your BCDL number.
- In two places.
- Do not use secret squiggles!
- Do not use your SIN number.
- Consider TB Vets SECURiTags.
- Issue bill of sale or get a receipt if you sell or buy marked items.



Block Maps

- Make a Block Map after your meeting.
- Drop it off or post it to the Block Watch office.
- Give a copy of the map to every household in your Block Watch.
- We require a new map at least once a year, or as frequent changes make a new map necessary.

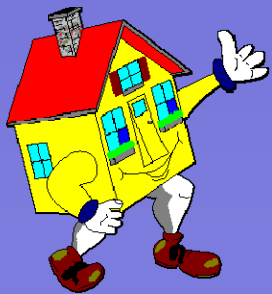


On the registered copy of your map (the one that goes to the Block Watch Office), first names must be shown. The distributed copy may use initials.



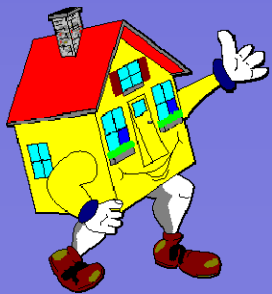
Once you have submitted your Block Map, the Block Watch office will confirm:

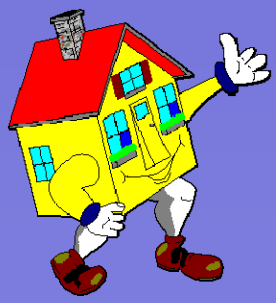
The Block Watch Newsletter

- We encourage everyone to contribute letters, articles and suggestions!!

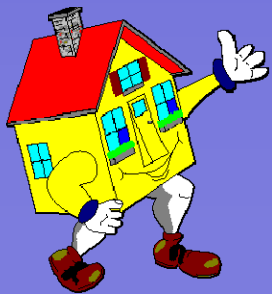


911



Emergency Communications for southwest British Columbia.

Up to 57 operators handle the 911 and
non-emergency call for the GVRD.
The facility includes PEP, RCC, EOCC
and VECTOR.

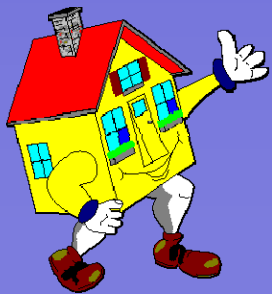


When you phone 911,

operator's console.



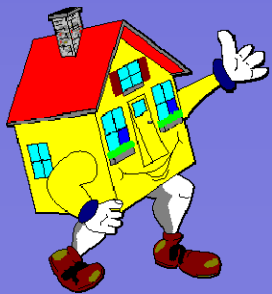
Note!!!!

company appears on our console,
NOT your name and address.



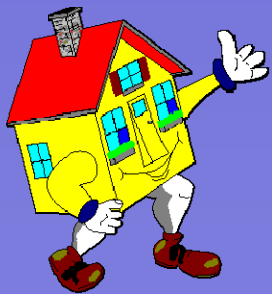
When do you call 911?

- Emergency
(requires Police attendance)
- Non-Emergency
(Crime/Suspicious Activity/Report Line)



Priority 1 (in progress/short time delay)

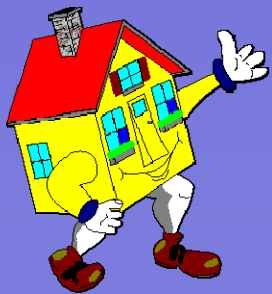
- Danger to life, weapons.
- Damage to property.
- Hold-up, Shooting.
- Stabbing, Screams.
- Incomplete phone call.
- Attempt suicide, assault, BNE.



Priority 2

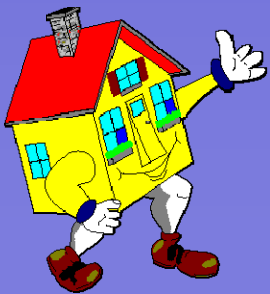
(longer time delay/no immediate danger)

- Suspicious person.
- Disturbance. Assault, MVA.
- Fight (no weapons).
- Family trouble.



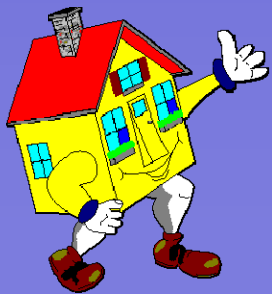
Priority 3

- Cold BNE.
- Parking complaint.
- Found evidence/property.
- Keep the peace.
- Theft with suspect.
- Suspicious circumstances.
- Noise complaint.



When you call...

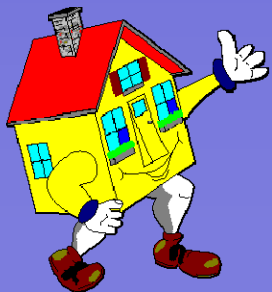
- Try and remain calm.
- Give exact location/compass points.
- Weapons, descriptions, vehicles, injuries.
- Let the operator control the call.
- Listen carefully to the questions.
- Give precise answers/stay focused.

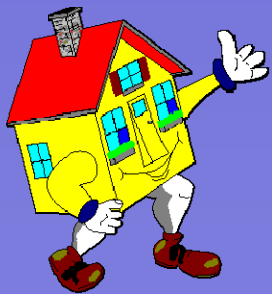


Police Dogs at Work

- Point out the last **KNOWN** position of the suspect to the dog officer.

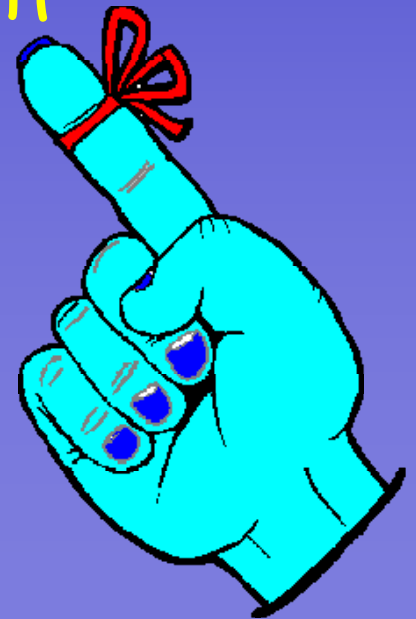
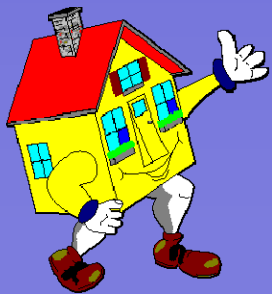
