



As 2018 draws to a close, it is a fitting time to share information and updates about Council and Administration's progress since inauguration on November 5. So, without further ado...

• We are very happy to report that the Metro Vancouver regional committee appointments have been announced and Belcarra has been appointed to the four committees listed below. Inclusion in these committees empower Belcarra to help lead the planning for policy and finance in these essential areas. It was a surprise and an honour to receive these high-profile appointments so relevant to our Village.

o RegionalParks

o Water

o ElectoralArea

o Mayor'sCommíttee

• We are also very happy to report that the TransLink Mayor's Council committee appointments have been formalized and Belcarra has been appointed to the New Mobility committee. This is an important committee for Belcarra because the traditional transit service model does not service small communities effectively; low ridership equals limited service. Inclusion in the New Mobility committee will enable Belcarra to help lead the development of innovative services that will be more relevant for our residents and visitors.

- Belcarra received some great news from Hon. Selina Robinson, our Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. Selina confirmed that Belcarra would receive 100% of required funding to install lights at our bus stops and mailboxes. Our goal in this regard, based on resident feedback, was to improve safety for children and adults using transit outside of daylight hours. Lighting strategically directed over the mailboxes will also help prevent mail theft.
- The process to build Belcarra's new website is well underway. The request for proposal (RFP) process for selection of the web service provider has been completed and the website development work will begin in the new year. The new website will become the primary source of information for residents including news, calendar of events, community bulletin board, access to all financial data, consultant's reports, Village information, emergency info, and more. We encourage residents to also sign up for our email distribution list by calling the Village office at 604-937-4100.
- Supporting our goal for Village Services to be a hotel concierge-like experience, all staff one-on-ones have been completed. Roles and responsibilities are being evolved and the foundations are being built to support feedback and development for both Administration and Council.

- As Mayor, I have met one-on-one with each neighboring Mayor. Discovering shared areas of focus and concern, opportunities to share resources, strategizing for regional initiatives and learning from other's experiences are immensely valuable as we plan for these next four years.
- Feedback from residents is that the first two Town Halls were a great success. Residents asked questions of Council, identified areas of concern/opportunity /interest, and prioritized areas for Council's attention. Based on feedback from these Town Halls, an announcement will be made in early January soliciting involvement in the following committees and groups: o VillageRevenueGeneratingOpportunities o WaterSystemandFireProtection o FarrerCoveRoadsandSupport
 - o TreeTrimmingandDangerousTrees o BelcarraDay
- Beginning in January the Village Hall will open up for social resident use. Evening and weekend access to free coffee and tea will be available. Council and Administration continue to assess the opportunity to secure a liquor license so that a small amount of beer/wine can also be available. The Hall will also be available for residents to book private events and activities. A calendar function in the new website will communicate up to date Village Hall usage information.
 - The installation of cameras, microphones and recording equipment is in the final stages of installation in the Village Hall. The goal is to provide online access to videos and audio of Council Meetings and relevant events.

The 2019 budget process is well underway. Council and Administration will meet for a third time in January to continue working through our financial plan. We remain focused on being fiscally responsible while ensuring resident safety and infrastructure support. An audit of Belcarra's assets and liabilities is underway to support our budget allocation process

and we continue to focus heavily on grants and other regional initiatives for small municipality support.

- Coffee / Tea with the Mayor will begin January 4th. Every Friday afternoon between 1-4pm, I will be available to discuss any topic of interest. Drop in visitors are always welcome but I encourage residents to reserve dedicated time for conversations requiring privacy. Please email me directly to reserve a convenient time to connect. nbelenkie@belcarra.ca
- In response to resident interest regarding Bedwell Bay management and the moratorium on applications for new docks, we have proposed a major initiative with the Port Authority. Our next meeting is expected to be mid- January and we will update with any news available.
- In the interest of resident safety, the decision was made to provide Farrer Cove with a large load of road mulch for the winter season. This is the optimal material to spread wherever snow and ice create risk of transit.



The RCMP recently issued a list of do's and don'ts for people choosing to meet, in person, someone encountered online:

- meet in public and stay in public for the entire date.



VILLAGE OF BELCARRA 2019 ANNUAL CHIPPING MARCH 4, 2019





I<u>MPORTANT NOTICE</u>: The chipping program shall only take place once per year. Please utilize the organics bins for smaller amounts of chipping or take your larger amounts to the Coquitlam Transfer Station (Wastech) at 1200 United Boulevard.

Residents are encouraged to dispose of their chipping material in the Organics bin at the Waste and Recycle Depot. <u>Tuesday</u> is a good day for adding larger amounts as the bin is hauled and emptied on Wednesdays.

Please note there is a change in procedure:

- Each residence is allowed one free chipping pile which does not require a tag.
- A maximum of 2 additional tags are available at the Village office at a cost of \$25 each.
- Tags are available at the Village Hall until 4:00 pm the Friday before chipping day.
- No tags will be provided once chipping has commenced.
- Each road will be serviced only <u>once</u>. Staff will not return to areas already chipped.

Important Details:

- Pile size must not exceed 1.0M x 1.0M x 3.0M (3' x 3' x 10')
- Clean, uncontaminated branches **up to 0.1 metres (4 inches) in diameter** to be stacked at the front of the property from which the material originated, with the larger ends aligned in the direction of travel. (This allows Workers to chip the branches with minimum exposure to traffic.)
- Piles will NOT BE CHIPPED that:
 - o do not conform to specifications and requirements
 - are considered contaminated containing: stumps, root-balls, grass, ivy, leaves (bagged or piled), blackberry vines, vegetation with thistles, thorns or irritants, or soil, rocks, wire, metal and nails.
- Unsuitable piles will be tagged and will be left for appropriate removal by the Resident or Owner

Please note:

- Larger volumes of vegetation for removal should be contracted to a tree service company.
- Keep the roadway clear for the passage of traffic.
- Success of the program depends on Resident cooperation follow instructions carefully and contact Village Hall at 604 937-4100 if you have any questions.
- Farrer Cove Residents (road access only), may call the Village Hall if they wish to participate in the roadside chipping program.

Shortly after she was married to her surviving husband Norman Bougie. Six years later in 1983 they had their first child Ryan Bougie. Their daughter Chantal Bougie was born 2 years later. She ensured her children were well equipped to take on the challenges of the world and was always their biggest fan. Denice was involved with the Summer Program through CRAB and many other social events. She, with her family and mother LOVED living on Belcarra Bay. Stories From The Archives -

Campers Presentation to the Captain and Purser of the S.S. Defiance

Researched By: Ralph Drew, Belcarra, BC, June 2017. Source: Vancouver Daíly World, Thursday, September 10th, 1908, page 10.

Representatives of steam service [Captain and Purser of the 'S.S. Defiance'] were presented, and Purser Rockwell received, a purse of pipes, and an address signed by the campers from Underhills [Frame's Landing], Lake Buntzen, Sunshine, Woodlands, Deep Cove, Eldridges [Jug Island Beach], and Coombe [Belcarra Peninsula], was handed to each.

That to the captain stated: "The time has come with the closing of the camping season when the North Arm [Indian Arm] campers and the genial captain of the 'S.S. Defiance' must for this season say good-bye to each other, and we feel that we cannot let the occasion pass without giving tangible expression to our kindly feelings to you for the courtesy and the many kindnesses shown us during the past season. "To those who have for some months spent about four days on the 'Defiance', the repartee of her genial captain has been a source of pleasure, while the assiduity with which our many small wants have been supplied has rendered you a grateful person to one and all." Having learned from the old sailor song that a 'Sailor's wife his star should be', we have in giving expression to our kindly feeling for you, sought also to include your wife, and we hope that you and she may be spared for many years to drink from this urn 'the cup that cheers but not inebriates'."

The address to the purser said: "Not only from the pilot house, but also to a marked degree from the purser's office have the campers of the North Arm received courtesy and kindly treatment, and to you also are due and hereby tendered the good wishes of the summer residents of Underhills, Lake Buntzen, Sunshine, Woodlands, Eldridges, Deep Cove and Coombe. We therefore had you this small memento of our feelings and express the hope that as long as you decide to remain single, we may help to soothe the reveries of a bachelor.

First Responder Medical Training: As the response stats suggest, a lot of our callouts are for medical emergencies. To work alongside BC Ambulance, each of our members maintains a First Responder Level III medical license and AED endorsement. Thanks goes out to instructors Britt Anderson, Doug Bakker, Dave McCloskey, and Darin Macdonald for the continual training.


Power Outages and Generators: Power outages are an unpleasant fact in our communities each winter and many people rely on backup generators. These portable generators are great, but they also carry the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning. Remember to follow all manufacturer directions and never operate generators in an enclosed space. During power outages, BC Hydro response crews will work through their calls on a priority basis. To avoid the risk of electrocution, people must stay back 10 meters from any downed power lines. As with other communities, a road will be closed until Hydro safely removes downed power lines from that road. Please be courteous and patient to road crews as they look to ensure everyone's safety.

What it means to us:

Mitchell: Sasamat Fire means family. When I first joined, I did not know anything about Firefighting, I simply signed up because I wanted to help out. Looking back, I realized that I joined a family the day I showed up. In many ways, my interactions with this "extended family" have helped shaped who I am today. Every member on the Department will drop anything they are doing, at a moment's notice, to go help somebody that they may have never met in their life. When you are surrounded by people who care this much about the wellbeing of others, it is hard not to feel a sense of pride and admiration for what they do, and it is an absolute privilege to be part of this family.



Amanda:

Sasamat Fire has given me opportunities to push

myself out of typical stereotypes and boundaries. During callouts, the unpredictable nature of calls and associated element of risk helped me develop a sense of empowerment and competence. By putting myself out there, I wanted to continually strengthen my skills to help more people. For these reasons, Sasamat Fire means continually working harder, as a team, to help others face life's challenges and adversities.

Our Memorable Moments:

Mitchell:

I find this an interesting one because it is weird how sometimes the smallest things are the things you remember the most. I was responding to a call at Country Side Village for a breathing issue, and I had the pleasure of taking care of the patient's 5-year-old son. He was playing video games on an iPad, but it was clear that he was acutely aware of everything that was happening. As the call was wrapping up, Chief Gregory discretely passed me a "Trauma Pup", which is a stuffed toy that we give to children who may be affected by calls. I still remember the look on his face when he received it and seeing that smile stuck with me for weeks after, and it is still something I remember till this day.

Amanda:

In every fire, MVA and medical call, I always felt useful and helpful. Every call where I helped someone in some way felt worthwhile. My most memorable call was being there for a family member that went through an unexpected and tragic loss. It was devastating as I realized the impact we have on someone's life. I learned from that call that loss, death, and danger affects people in multiple ways. I feel incredibly fortunate that Sasamat Fire equipped me with the necessary skills to help people in their worst moments. I am happy to be part of a team of dedicated firefighters.

Welcome to 2019! I must say that we have had quite a mild winter thus far. Or, the newly created Blakeburn Lagoon in Port Coquitlam. It is an amazing sanctuary very close to Costco, in Port Coquitlam: the ground is level, for strollers or those liking an easy walk. You wander along wide trails through a figure eight around the two lagoons and feast your eyes upon birds from all over. It is a very worthwhile place to check out and maybe even start to learn about different bird species.

But, bringing it all back home, I love birding from my own yard. Oh yes, this place which is between the forest and the sea, so many amazing beautiful birds to see. The first week of January I was treated with the sight of 3 adult Bald Eagles soaring above Turtlehead! I love watching the Barrows Goldeye on the water. They are adorable to watch as they flip under the floats, then back up and under, up and under. There can be a handful or up to about 80 of them. They are such fun to watch. The Northern Flickers seem to be birds of habit that stay all year round. I do enjoy watching the Towhees. They do seem to have a character that fits so well with how they move and feed. Their colour and markings are stunning.

<u>Recycling!</u> Not for the "Lazy" or "Just <u>Don't Care</u>" Individuals.

When my husband and 1 built our home in Belcarra 35 years ago, we dropped all our garbage into a large, open garbage bin next to the 3-way stop at Sasamat Lake. Paper, plastic, glass, tin cans, Styrofoam, kitchen and yard waste were all dumped in together and ended-up in the landfill. It also attracted bears and other wildlife. I would hope we have become more aware of the damage we have been doing to the planet.

Before the convenience of the single drop bin, residents had to take their garbage to a landfill dump on Barnet Highway. After speaking with a few of the really long-time Belcarrians, I understand that they had very little to carryout.

On May 30th, 1990, Belcarra's recycling depot was opened, recycling newspaper, bottles and cans, even though we have come a long way in our knowledge of recycling; consumer packaging continues to make-up a very large volume of our garbage.

Take-out food containers, household appliances, even small toys and electronic devices, all come packaged in cardboard, plastic and/or Styrofoam.

We have developed a love of plastic...Plastic food wrap, plastic bags, plastic food containers, plastic water and juice bottles. As of July 2017, 91 percent of plastic produced is still not recycled. It can take from 450 years and up to 1000 years for plastic to decompose in landfills.

For years garbage has been barged-out and dumped in the ocean, creating islands of waste, killing our oceans and marine life.

The very fish we eat have plastic and tobacco molecules in them.

Some residents still refuse to sort their composting material and household garbage properly, arriving at the recycling depot with one plastic garbage bag to put in the household garbage container. What are they doing with the paper, plastic, glass and or cans? Maybe they are rushed for time, maybe they think that is why there is a WARD attendant. The attendant's job at the recycling facility is not to sort our garbage, but to supervise that it is done properly.

Our WARD facilities have been set-up for this purpose. In my opinion, our Belcarra recycling depot is one of the most "user friendly". Bins are clearly marked as to what goes where. Still, improperly sorted composting material and household garbage can result in the Village being fined for contaminated loads which cost us extra. We are doing much better with the separating of our garbage, as statistics show that in 2018 the Village incurred no fines for contaminated loads.

However, that only means the percentage of contamination was below 5%, which is still unacceptable. The attendant has also noted that non-compostable plastic bags are being put in the organic waste bin.

With Metro Vancouver banning all Styrofoam going into the landfill, we have to be extra vigilant — perhaps the cost of a separate bin for Styrofoam, similar to the electronics bin, would offset the cost of contaminated loads.

Rewards for recycling properly:

Our Village saves money by diverting waste from the garbage bin and not incurring fines for contaminated loads going to the landfill.

Parents become role models for their children who are learning in school about the damage we are doing to our planet. Parents' behaviour can support what the children are learning. Land values will benefit from the Village having a sustainable, inexpensive recycling program which every resident influences. Help keep Belcarra the type of village we want — LETS RECYCLE CORRECTLY!

When will mankind learn that the health of our planet is in our hands?





Underwater Alphabet



Fun factoids about local marine wildlife, one letter at a time.

O is for... octopus, of course! BC is home to nine species of octopus, but the best known by far is the Giant Pacific octopus. The largest Giant Pacific octopus recorded in the Guinness book of world records is a true giant: 136 kg with an arm span of 9.8 m, but most individuals – including those seen in Indian Arm – are much smaller, just up to 15 kg with 2 m-long arms. Giant Pacific octopuses (that's right! The plural of octopus is octopuses, not octopi) are the rightful recipients of most invertebrate superlatives. They are masters of disguise, going from dark to pale, from smooth to bumpy-skinned in seconds to hide from predators or sneak up on prey. Females are the most devoted of mothers, hanging each of their 100,000 or so eggs on the ceiling of small caves, keeping them clean and constantly supplied with oxygen for months without eating, and dying soon after the eggs hatch. They are also very intelligent. They are the only invertebrate capable of observational learning, that is watching another solve a problem, like unscrewing the lid of a glass jar to get a treat inside, and then doing the same on their first try. They have long memories and can recognise individual people, even when those people wear the same clothes. Grumpy octopuses that encounter annoying divers have been known to try to pull off divers' masks and regulators, surely the most effective deterrent to harassment. So when 1 see an octopus underwater, 1 watch in awe but from a respectful distance.

Fun factoid about octopus: Octopus eyes are similar to ours in many ways, but they don't have the design flaw found in the human eye. In humans, the nerve fibres that connect the eye to the brain do so in front of the retina. They must go through the retina to exit the eye and so create a blind spot. We don't notice this because our brain interpolates the missing information. In octopus eyes, the nerve fibres are more sensibly connected to the back of the retina so there is no need for an exit hole, and hence, no blind spot.


