



FPAC LAUNCHES FORESTRY FOR THE FUTURE CAMPAIGN FIGHTING FOR WHAT MATTERS TO CANADA'S FORESTRY WORKERS AND COMMUNITIES

Today in Ottawa, Forest Products Association of Canada (FPAC) launched its Forestry for the Future campaign as it works to put issues facing Canada's forestry workers and communities front and centre for federal election candidates across the country.

"The future of our sector in Canada is facing unprecedented challenges - worsening fire seasons, more damaging pest infestations, market volatility, and trade disputes. These are coming together in way that is putting thousands of Canadian jobs at risk and impacting our ability to use forest management as a tool to help fight climate change and make environmentally-friendly products for Canada and the world," said FPAC President and CEO Derek Nighbor.

The Forestry for the Future campaign is anchored by the www.forestryforthefuture.ca website, which captures details on the challenges and opportunities facing the sector and how prospective MPs can help. The site allows forestry workers and partners from across the country to share related information with candidates in their local ridings.

"Through forest management and wood and wood fibre based manufacturing, we have a huge opportunity to drive economic opportunity for thousands of Canadians, and at the same time realize real benefits for our environment. While we have a number of asks for prospective MPs, at the top of that list is the need to develop forest policies in a more inclusive and comprehensive way," Nighbor said. "We want to move to more adaptive management of Canada's forests, see greater investment in more regionallybased climate vulnerability assessments, have governments consider pest and fire risks as part of landscape planning, and move away from one-off policy interventions that can bring about unintended consequences for the future health of our forests and forestry communities," he added.








Stories From The Archives —

George Edmund Farrer

Quotation Source: Vancouver World, Souvenir Edition, June 1896, page 28.



George Farrer (CVA LP 338)

The area known today as 'Farrer Cove' is officially designated as 'Belvedere' on maps, a combination of 'bel' meaning "beautiful" and 'vedere' meaning "to see"; thus, "beautiful view". An old English term, 'Belvedere' was used to describe a high turret or tower or viewing place, commanding a fine view, so perhaps the name was in recognition of the bluffs around the cove. George Farrer placed a large sign at the top of the bluff that read 'Belvedere', and that place name likely can be attributed to him.

George Edmund Farrer (1865–1957), was born on August 13th, 1865 in Liverpool, England. His parents, Joseph and Mary Farrer, immigrated to Canada around 1872. George Farrer was educated as a criminal lawyer, and married Elizabeth Jane Schenick (1858–1932) on July 10th, 1889 in Parry Sound, Ontario; and immediately left by the steamer 'Maxwell' for British Columbia where they intended to make their future home. George Farrer was a member of the 'Burrard Literary Club' in 1895 along with Cortes Eldridge, who built a summer house at Jug Island beach, from whom he probably learned about the Indian Arm area.

In April 1899, George Farrer wrote to the Crown Timber Agent in New Westminster to apply for a license to cut timber from "the West half of Section 30, Township 39, West of the Coast Meridian [W.C.M.], in the Province of British Columbia."

This application covering 309.7 acres (125.3 ha) was put-up for public competition as 'Timber Berth 209', and a request for tenders was advertised in May 1899. In June 1899, 'Timber Berth 209' was granted to G. W. Phipps of Vancouver, and George Farrer was his "agent" for the logging operations on the timber berth. In a letter dated July 14th, 1907, George Farrer claimed that he had been in "possession" of the land since 1899. In January 1910, Timber Berth 209 was assigned to Farrer.

In July 1912, George Farrer applied to the Dominion Government for 76.5 acres (31 ha) under the 1908 'Federal Homestead Act' that allowed land grants to settlers if they met certain stringent conditions; specifically, clearing and cropping certain acreages and taking-up residence by the beginning of the third year. The homestead application was approved on May 2nd, 1913 (BC Homestead No. 5331), and Farrer received his Crown Grant from Canada on March 9th, 1926. His 'Certificate of Indefeasible Title' was registered by British Columbia on May 31st, 1930 after the Dominion Government transferred the Crown Lands within the 'Railway Belt' back to the Province.

When he was in his mid-forties, his wife became ill with Tuberculosis, so he retired and they moved to the relative seclusion of 'Belvedere Bay' on the eastern shore of Indian Arm. Farrer was a tall thin man who wore a panama-type straw hat. He built a big two-story farmhouse on the rock bench above the cove.

The house had a steep roof, a large porch, and a cougar hide nailed on the front of the house. (He shot the cougar because it was going after his chickens.) Farrer built his wife a glass-enclosed sunroom and looked after her for seven years. Elizabeth died at age 73 on June 3rd, 1932, at 'Belvedere Bay', and was buried in New Westminster.

Farrer's property was a large, flat and sunny field. He had a chicken run and an orchard of raspberries, apple, plum, and pear trees. Farrer loaded raspberries, potatoes, fruit and eggs onto the 'Harbour Navigation' vessel 'Scenic' to take them to market when it made its daily trips up Indian Arm in the summer. Groceries were ordered from the 'Woodward's Department Store' in Vancouver, which were also delivered by the 'Scenic'. In 1944, George Farrer told Paul Reid that he hadn't been to Vancouver in the 12 years since his wife's funeral.

George Edmund Farrer lived in British Columbia for 62 years and had three children: two sons, Leslie Farrer of Kent, WA, and Aubrey Farrer (also a lawyer) of Seattle, WA, and a daughter Patricia (Mrs. W. Underhill) of Vancouver who married a man named "North". Farrer lived to the age of 92; he died on March 20th, 1957, in Burnaby and was buried in Vancouver.

In June 1896, the 'Vancouver World' newspaper provided the following commentary on George Farrer's business dealings:

"G.E. Farrer, LL.B. — Prominent among those who devote their attention to the business of the investment broker is Mr. G.E. Farrer, LL.B., a member of the 'B.C. Stock and Mining Exchange'. Mr. Farrer has been identified with this line of business here since 1889. He is also agent for the 'Canadian Mutual Loan and Investment Co.' of Toronto.

These investments companies have proved to [be] greatest benefactors to a large portion of the public. The plan of investment is as follows: The investor buys stock, paying a membership fee of \$1 per share, monthly dues 60 cents per share, the cash value of the share at time of maturity, estimated to be about eight years from date of first payment, being \$100. It can thus be seen how easily quite a sum can be saved in driblets and many a man who would not otherwise have saved anything has found his old age brightened by the maturity of the stock he has taken-out in an investment company. Another feature is that of share loans. Loans of 75 per cent of amount paid are granted on instalment shares which have been in force one year, and any member can thus buy a home on money borrowed on his stock security. Mr. Farrer has done quite a large amount of business for his company in Vancouver. He also makes a specialty of investing private funds."





'Enjoy living in Belcarra; paradise this side of paradise'



Letter to the Editor

I am writing in to the Barnacle to see if anyone else in Belcarra is having difficulty understanding why we have gone from a sleepy little village to a police state. husband and I were away for most of the summer travelling. When we returned we found out that two of our son's friends had been ticketed and towed for parking with two wheels on the pavement. The ticket stated they were blocking the road next to the emergency turn around. There were no warning tickets even though they were parked next to the signage that said no parking with arrows pointing to the emergency turn around. For 26 years we have always been able to park in these spaces and the two young adults were obeying the parking signs. I am confused as the signage was clear that parking was ok on one side of the sign but they were still ticketed. Since complaining the sign now has arrows pointing in opposite directions. It is now clear that we are not allowed to park there. If the sign had both arrows had been in place, then no one would have parked in a no parking zone. I was told that they were also ticketed and towed due to having two tires on the pavement. It seems very unfair to me that when the new bylaw was put into effect, no signage warning residents and workers was put into place.

There is no parking on pavement signage at the beginning of the village warning the public but not on my street. I think it is mean spirited to make drastic changes to parking in our village without providing the correct signage. We have next to no parking on my end of the block but now there is barely one space that could qualify as a parking space where all wheels are off the pavement. I do not agree with the no parking on pavement and would like to revisit it. I can not let this go as it seems so unfair that the no parking on pavement is only enforced some of the time on my block. I have pictures of other cars parked on the pavement with no tickets. In the past it was the home owner who phoned the tow company if someone was parked illegally. Now we pay a bylaw enforcement person to patrol our streets as if we were a large city. I am sad that I can not stop and say hi to a neighbour without the bylaw enforcement person stopping to check that I am there to move my car. There is next to no traffic on my street but stopping to chat is not allowed. I am curious to see if there are other people in Belcarra who find our new parking bylaws excessive. If so please attend the next council meeting on September 30 to voíce your concern.
