

Port Moody mom & teenage son are both battling cancer – and they need your help <u>Diane Strandberg / Tri-City News</u>

Heidi Hass Gable is battling cancer and her 14-year-old son Cam is fighting leukemia; she has started a GoFundMe page to help with the finances as she can't work

Heidi Hass Gable knows about challenges. In 2013, she championed parents as the chair of the District Parent Advisory council at a time when School District 43 was cutting jobs to fend off a \$12-million deficit.

Now, not only is she facing down colorectal cancer after a two-year battle with the disease, she recently learned that her son, Cam, 14, has leukemia. Her friends, supporters and Facebook page readers are helping her get through the ordeal, Hass Gable said, as she worries about her son, her finances and her own health. "We've dealt with this really well," Hass Gable told The Tri-City News this week.

Still, the former technology consultant admits there are challenges. She hasn't been able to work for two years, is running out of RRSP funds and will need to take more time off to deal with her own and her son's illnesses.

Recently, she started a GoFundMe page to solicit donations to help pay the bills; so far, it has raised more than \$16,000 towards a \$50,000 goal.

"That's been difficult, learning how to ask for help," Hass Gable said, "I like to be the person who was helping and doing that kind of thing, and to turn around and say, 'I don't know what to do,' it's been hard."

The family, including Cam, her 21-year-old daughter and 18-year-old son, live together in the caretaker's cottage at Belcarra Regional Park, where Hass Gable opens and shuts the park and washrooms. She said living in a park is beneficial, as she can enjoy the ocean and trees by walking to the pier when the weather and her energy level cooperate.


Her Facebook community, friends and other supporters have provided Hass Gable with the strength to carry on — a surprisingly positive aspect of social media given its many negatives. But Hass Gable said it can be a relief to share with others what she's been going through. "It gives me a chance to stay in touch with people, it lets people support me, it does make a difference when people comment, touch base and help. It feels good." Hass Gable has gone through multiple rounds of chemotherapy and had surgery, but a small spot of cancer stubbornly persists in her lymph nodes, requiring more surgery.

Meanwhile, Cam, who is being homeschooled, is also undergoing chemotherapy and blood transfusions, which brought up his blood cell count, but he's not feeling great, she said.

He gets his support from his buddies called Cam's Crew by BC Children's Hospital staff, where Cam spent three weeks in treatment — while her other kids are finding their own outlets during this trying time. Hass Gable said her eldest daughter is busy as a volunteer firefighter with the Sasamat Volunteer Fire Department and her 18-yearold is active socially.

Together, everyone is managing, she said, with a little help from their friends.

'It's been really inspiring how the community comes together when you ask for help."

Coyote dragging cat prompts safety warning for pet lovers

Keep your small pets indoors, BC Conservation Service warns, also advising residents of Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam and Port Moody to manage trash and other animal attractants

The rescue of a cat from the jaws of a coyote has prompted warnings to Tri-City residents to keep their small pets indoors and to remove all items that might attract the prowling critters.

Although coyotes aren't a danger to humans, they will grab small pets because they don't distinguish them from other small prey such as rats and mice, according to Austin Lord of the BC Conservation Officer Service.

"Most of the time, they're looking for small rodents, like mice, rabbits, even raccoons," said Lord, who advised residents of Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam and Port Moody to keep control of their waste and other animal attractants.

His recommendations come after a woman posted to the Port Moody Discussion Group Facebook page Monday about efforts to rescue a cat whose head was stuck in a coyote's jaws. The incident occurred Monday morning on Ioco Road when Debra Lee was driving with her nephew. When they saw the coyote trotting along dragging the cat, the nephew jumped out of the car, startling the animal, causing it to drop the cat.

Lee stopped traffic while the cat ran under a car. The owners were eventually found but the cat had to be taken to the vet because of its injuries, and will likely lose an eye.

As it is breeding season, some coyotes may be on the move but it will be a few months before pups are born.

Lord cautions people to take the same precautions as they would to keep a bear from coming into their neighbourhood.

"We're just reminding people to manage attractants," Lord said.

He advised people to check out the Stanley Park Ecological Society, which has a lot of information about coexisting with coyotes on its website.

Stories From The Archives — Stuck in the Mud!

Researched By: Ralph Drew, Belcarra, BC, January 2020. Source: The Port Moody Gazette, Saturday, January 19th, 1884.

A wagon, loaded with goods for Port Moody, started out the other day [from New Westminster] to brave all the adventures on the so-called road to the [C.P.R. railway] terminus. The driver must have been a brave man, but wanting in that better part of valour called discretion. By dint of much labour and a liberal use of the whip, he accomplished about half the distance between Sapperton and Clarke's Road [along 'North Road'] when the power of horse-flesh was no longer sufficiently potent to move the wagon and the horses had to be rescued from suffocation in the mud. The cargo was subsequently carried to its destination piece-meal, the wagon remaining sunk to the hubs, to be dug-out on some future occasion. Verily, we have a valuable [Provincial] Government, and one that takes care not to trouble the Mainland with the outlay of any of its religiously collected taxes.

12 Golden Rules for Critter and Wildlife Areas

1. Leave all wild animal babies, including birds, where they are in woods and fields. The parents are usually close by or are off searching for food.

2. Preserve the forest by leaving flowers on their stems, shrubs and trees standing and by being responsible with fire.

3. Learn to know snakes. Harmless species are out number poisonous ones and even poisonous snakes bite only if provoked.


4. Take empty cans and bottles home or leave in proper containers, thus avoiding risk of animals getting heads caught in cans or feet cut on broken glass. Remember – animals go barefoot!

5. Respect and protect homes of animals – dens, nests and food supplies.

6. Throw scraps of food far from highway so that animals attracted to the food will not be run over by vehicles.

7. Ask drivers to slow down in wooded sections, keeping a sharp eye out, so they may yield to animals their right-of-way.

8. Get professional help when trying to rescue an injured animal.



9. Keep pet dogs and cats under control so they will not chase wild animals.

10. Prevent pollution of the environment by doing without poison sprays, refusing to throw trash into streams, and speaking out to remind others.

 Insist that wildlife refuges be
"places where animals are safe and protected" - not shooting galleries!

12. Hunt with a camera – as YOU would like to be hunted.

Underwater Alphabet

Fun factoids about local marine wildlife, one letter at a time. Written by Isabelle Côté, Belcarra's Professor of Marine Ecology

X is for... nothing that I've ever seen in

Indian Arm or Burrard Inlet. Oh dear! Instead, here is dubious poetry about some of the Xtraordinary encounters I've had underwater in our ocean backyard.

I spied a bobtail squid along Cosy Cove On the flat, featureless bottom where I dove. Cute as a button, eight arms awaving, Flashing colours, communicating.

Near Croker Island once seastars had died, I saw thousands of urchins, all side by side, Feasting on algae and munching away, Happy that they were no longer the prey.

One day on a wreck I came face to face With a huge lingcod in need of some space. He looked grumpy, doing what he does best: Chasing me away from his very full nest.

Near the power plant, on a rocky wall, I spied four lithoid crabs, out for a crawl, Built like Hummers and covered in spines, Orange and blue marine porcupines. At Tupper Rock, a pinnacle rising up high Lived a Red Irish Lord with a wonky eye. That fish was there, dive after dive, Nestled in a crag, nearly blind but alive.

Behind Jug Island, on a fine sunny day I saw a new fish that I knew right away. T'was a midshipman, all covered with dots That had come from the deep to that shallow spot.

In Bedwell Bay, just in front of my home, I spotted on eelgrass some jelly-like domes: Hooded nudibranchs are like alien ghosts, But my favourite mollusks of all on this coast.

Recently Jim Chisholm received a notice titled VOLUNTEER POSITIONS FOR COMMITEE MEMBERS with regard to a five person committee for the OCP committee.

One of the points for applicants to consider is 'BE ABLE TO THINK OBJECTIVELY WHAT IS BEST FOR THE VILLAGE OF BELCARRA RESIDENTS'.

Recently at a council meeting in February it seemed to me that there was a conflict over the discussions held regarding short term rental. At least that was my personal perception as a councilor discussed and voted on the rules for the B&B or short term rentals. How can you be objective if you plan to operate a B and B or Short term rental?

After watching the video of the last council meeting I see, once again, what seems to me to be a conflict of interest from a councilor that has stated that the road end by their residence should not be sold for various personal reasons. To me this makes a personal conflict. How can you possibly make an unbiased decision when you are on record protesting a road end sale near your property?

Now that the Village accountant and Chief administrative Officer have studied our Village financial status it has been made clear that we must get our financial house in order. We need millions and the only way to do that is land sales (road ends). That means road ends MUST be sold as they are the ONLY source of enough funds to clear our water debt, re-establish our reserve funds, install an additional water reservoir, fix our roads and provide the funds necessary for the new fire hall. We are in a VERY PRECARIOUS FINANCIAL POSITION.

We MUST sell as many road ends as needed to get our Villages financial needs taken care of and get a stable financial position taken care of AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. We will not need to sell all the road ends.

At the last council meeting three of our councilors voted against selling more than three road ends.

WHY would any councilor limit the sale to three road ends if more are needed? How does that serve our Village? It will take more than three road end sales to get us on secure financial ground. We have numerous road ends and we do not need to sell many but we need to sell enough to take care of our IMMEDIATE AND URGENT NEEDS.

We are a small Village and it is difficult to not, at some time, have a personal conflict, however, for the sake of the perception of self interest 1 think councilors should step away from the table so as not to appear to be showing self interest.

REMEMBER TO THINK OBJECTIVELY WHAT IS BEST FOR THE VILLAGE OF BELCARRA RESIDLENTS.
