

# Boating Safety in 2020

Summer begins! Boats are in, or are about to be in, the water.

As of May 30th it is no longer necessary to reserve a time for launching a boat at Rocky Point. Anyone may use the launch after purchasing a pass (\$21.10). Those who use the facility should observe social distancing rules on the ramp and apply hand sanitizer after using the keypad on the ticket (pass) dispenser.

The RCMP also ask boaters to follow these safety Covid-19 guidelines:

- Stay in your local community.
- Keep a distance of 2 metres from other boaters at all times. This is one fishing rod length, one paddle board, or .5. of a canoe.
- Avoid beach ramps and docks if there are groups of people on them.
- Do not beach your water craft close beside another.
- Limit the number of boat passengers to family members or a few close friends.
- Don't go boating if you or someone in your group is sick.
- Plan to wear a mask at some points in your trip: i.e. filling up with gas, shopping for provisions.

- Avoid sharing your boating and/or fishing equipment.
- If your face covering becomes damp or wet be sure to replace it with a new dry one.
- Wash your hands thoroughly or use hand sanitizer after touching communal fixtures ramp gates, fuel pumps, ticket dispensers, park washrooms.

# Please remember the Big Five:

- PFDs should be worn by everyone on board, at all times.
- Have a boating license or Pleasure Craft Operator's Card (PCOC).
- Never drive a boat under the influence (BUI).
- Follow the rules of the sea and watch your speed.
- Be weather wise and let others know of your boating plans.

# Re: Creation of Waterfront "Road-End Lots"

I write in response to the email notice from the Village dated May 1st, 2020, titled "Notice of Survey & Appraisal of Road Ends". The presumptive surveying and appraisal of "roadend lots" is a perfect example of Council "putting the cart before the horse"!

First, the "road-end lots" do <u>not</u> exist at this point in time; the prerequisite being that the proposed "road-end lots" will have to have "title raised" in the 'B.C. Land Registry' which amounts to a "subdivision of land". The 'Official Community Plan' (OCP) necessitates a minimum parcel size of 0.50 acre as a prerequisite for the subdivision of land — a size which is very much larger than any of the proposed "road-end lots".

Council must amend the minimum parcel size requirement in the OCP as a prerequisite to the creation (subdivision) of "road-end lots". That process necessitates a formal public hearing on the question before amendments can be made to the OCP bylaw. Also, the revised 'Regional Context Statement' in the amended OCP must be approved by the Metro Vancouver (MV) Board before the public hearing process can be initiated. Belcarra is outside of the 'Urban Containment Area' and the MV 'Regional Growth Strategy' does not support the densification of 'Rural Areas' such as Belcarra. It is inappropriate for Council to predetermine, or otherwise assume, the outcomes of both the 'Metro Vancouver' approval and municipal public hearing processes.

Second, Provincial legislation is very clear that where a municipality sells waterfront property (such as the proposed waterfront "road-end lots") the proceeds of the sale must be placed in a separate financial reserve account that can <u>only</u> be used for the purchase of replacement waterfront property. An examination of the 'Local Government Property Ownership and <u>Disposal</u>' legislative requirements states the following:

"Proceeds of Sale - Local governments must place the proceeds of sales of land and improvements in a reserve fund. In most cases that reserve fund must have as its purpose the purchase of other land, improvements or other capital assets. In some cases, the proceeds must be deposited to a reserve fund with a more specific purpose. Sale of closed roads which provided access to a body of water: The proceeds of disposition [must be used for] acquiring property that will provide public access to a body of water which previously had closed access roads sold." -See the Community Charter, Section 188

Statements that the 'Village of Lions Bay' has sold water-front road allowance is only part of the story. Lions Bay has sold waterfront road allowance, as per the Provincial legislation, but plans to use the funds raised from the sale to purchase other lands to augment Lions Bay's waterfront park as per the legislation. Also, Lions Bay placed the proceeds from the sale of waterfront road allowance into a separate reserve account ('Land Reserve Fund Bylaw No. 532, 2017'), as required by Provincial legislation, to be used for the above stated purpose. I suggest that Council ask staff to contact the 'Village of Lions Bay' CFO and obtain written details as to exactly what they have done vis-a-vis their road-end sale and intended use of the funds raised.

Third, funds placed into a reserve account can <u>only</u> be utilized in accordance with the requirements of Provincial legislation (<u>see section 189</u> of the 'Community Charter'). Council can <u>only</u> self-lend from a reserve account <u>with the approval of the 'Minister of Municipal Affairs' accompanied by a specific bylaw that states the term of repayment and <u>applicable interest rate</u>. In other words, Council cannot self-lend money from a reserve account without specifying by bylaw <u>both</u> a reasonable term for the loan and an interest rate that reflects the current market rate.</u>

There is no "magic loophole" to circumvent the Provincial legislation. I suggest that Council get a legal opinion and/or a written assessment from the 'Ministry of Municipal Affairs' on this important aspect of the Provincial legislation.

It will cost tens-of-thousands of dollars to create each waterfront "road-end lot" which will result in considerable wasted money given the above restrictions. It makes no sense to create and sell waterfront "road-end lots" in order to generate funds to lend back to the municipality at the current interest rate. If needed, the municipality can borrow from the 'Municipal Finance Authority' (MFA) at the current interest rate without incurring the significant added cost of creating the waterfront "road-end lots".

There is no "money tree", and there is no "free lunch".

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# Outsmarting the Cabbage Butterfly Submitted by Adrienne Peacock.

I recently received this idea from a friend (Shirley Campbell of the PoCo Garden Club) and thought it was such a good idea that I would share it with those of you who grow brassicas (cabbage family - kale, Brussels sprouts, broccoli, cabbage, radish, Pac choi and cauliflower, for example). The white cabbage butterfly (Pieris rapae) is an annoying pest of brassicas. Apparently this butterfly is territorial, so if they see a white butterfly in the brassicas they will fly somewhere else to lay their eggs. The idea is to provide a "look alike" decoy to deter the butterflies from laying eggs on your brassicas.

The following provides instructions on how to make the butterflies. According to goodseedco.net, the key features needed for success are:

- include the black marking of the female (two spots/upper wing vs. the male with only one spot/upper wing).
- 2. make the decoy slightly bigger than the real thing, a wingspan of about 2 inches is good.

It's also a good idea to craft them so that these 'fakes' can flutter in the garden like the real thing, by putting them on a wire, as described below:

1. draw or print a template on regular white paper (many templates on the internet)

- 2. 'seal' the butterfly so they withstand rain by running clear tape along the back and front of the paper. Packaging tape works well here because it covers a wide area in a short time
- 3. cut out each butterfly
- 4. optional: if you want to seal it again, wrap some more thin strips of tape around the straight edge of the butterflies. (they tend to curl a bit once it gets wet and this helps to protect it better from rain)
- 5. attach a thin wire to the back of the butterfly with a small piece of waterproof tape (like electrician's tape, duct tape, or foil metal tape)
- 6. wrap the other end of the wire around a piece branch, stick or bamboo branch
- 7. poke in the ground next to your brassicas

# Tips

- add varying heights to the butterflies so they look natural
- use thin wire so the butterflies can move easily in the wind
- -if needed, move the stick when the leaves start to cover the butterflies as they grow bigger

Westcoastseeds.com has a whole variety of companion plants that can enhance brassicas (and many other garden vegetables). They say all brassicas benefit from chamomile, dill, mint, rosemary, and sage and a neutral soil pH of 6.5-7.0. Onions, marigolds, and garlic are also good companions for brassicas. The white cabbage butterflies are certainly out and about now in BC. So it's worth a try.

# Portugal and the Pandemic

My much-anticipated March 2020 trip to Portugal hit a snag as Covid 19 started showing up in Northern Italy and then proceeded to spread west into Spain. Andrea, my daughter, had left mid-February and was hiking the Rota Vicentina, the spectacular route down the Portuguese coast. The plan was for us to meet in Lisbon in the first week of March and travel Portugal from south to north over four weeks.

By the time I left Belcarra, there were only three cases of the virus in Portugal: one in Lisbon and two in Porto. It didn't seem dire and we were committed to being careful. In what I believed was an overabundance of caution, I packed facemasks, antibacterial hand cleaner, surgical gloves, and sterilized wipes.

We met, as planned, in Lisbon, rented a car and headed south from Lisbon to Salema, a tiny fishing village at the western edge of the Algarve. Things were very relaxed there with little talk of the virus; facemasks were nowhere to be seen and no one was distancing. We did, however, wash our hands regularly.

However, as we drove north it was increasingly obvious that the virus had become an issue. Schools, universities, galleries and museums were closing in rapid succession. Shops were shuttered and eventually restaurants began closing down. Finding a meal was beginning to be a problem. Shopping for food in the public markets was risky. When our Airbnb in Porto contacted us, offering us a full refund if we would stay away, we realized how bad things really were. We headed back to Lisbon and the scramble for a flight home began.

We cancelled our return flight, scoured the internet for an earlier flight, finally found one but were turned away at the airport when it was discovered we were travelling on Canadian passports. The flight was routed through New York and the US had closed its doors. Another scramble. Finally, we flew Lisbon-Brussels-Montreal-Vancouver over two days. By this time we were wearing facemasks, washing our hands obsessively, staying away from crowds, and eventually wiping down our seats, trays, arm rests and everything we touched on the plane. We arrived home on March 21 and spent the next two weeks quarantined. Thank goodness for friends and family who shopped for groceries for us during our self-isolation.

All that aside, Andrea had a great hike and, together, we had a wonderful two weeks. We ate fresh seafood, drank cheap Portuguese wine, listened to heart-wrenching fado in a little hole-in-the-wall in Alfama, laughed ourselves silly trying to pronounce street names, learned all about cork trees, paid a small fortune for fresh asparagus (and then couldn't make the stove in our Airbnb work) and drove our rental car down cobbled streets no wider than sidewalks. We ambled through quaint little villages draped in wisteria and drank ginjinha (sour cherry liqueur) out of tiny dark chocolate cups.



# Port Moody Picnic

Researched By: Ralph Drew, Belcarra, BC, June 2020.

Source: The Port Moody Gazette, Saturday, August 23<sup>rd</sup>, 1884.

"Twelve boat loads of 'Port Moodians' spent the day at a shady nook in the narrows below Bonson's on Tuesday last [August 19th, 1884]. ['Bonson's Hotel' was located on the east side of North Road at Burrard Inlet.] It was the largest and most successful picnic ever held in this city [Port Moody], and everyone present contributed their quota toward the day's enjoyment. The ride home in the cool of the evening was very pleasant, and the flotilla of twelve boats loaded with excursionists gave the bay a very animated appearance. The ample provision of good things to eat and drink provided by the ladies, left nothing to be desired, and the occasional tune from Sam Cormier's violin gave variety to the entertainment. The days proceedings closed with a social dance at Capt. Clarke's residence, which was kept-up until "the wee sma' hours ayont the twal", and was enjoyed by a large number of both sexes. Mrs. Clarke, Mrs. J. S. Fraser and Mrs. Norman Fraser are entitled to the honour of getting-up the picnic, and its primary object was to furnish a good time to all and to promote that good fellowship and sociability for which the Port Moody people are already noted."

# Crows Submitted by Diana Drake



As is the case for almost everyone, the restrictions of the last few months have altered many of our normal routines. In particular, our morning coffee 'out', has morphed into a coffee brewed at home and a trip to Town Centre Park (surprisingly empty) where we can sip, talk and walk the dachshund.

Over the weeks, this change has led to 'social distancing' with an amazing avian pair, Laurel and Hardy Corvid. They are an extremely bright and interesting couple who have quickly become our new 'best friends.'

Harvey is almost always there to greet us on arrival now and never fails to recognize the car (and us) whenever we play the "find the Volt" parking game. Somewhat scruffy in his grooming, and sporting a few extra ouncesdue in no small part to the muffins and cheese he panhandles from us - he is nevertheless very handsome.

In the summer sunshine his feathers have an iridescent purple-black sheen. His eyes are bright, intelligent and assessing.

Altogether he is a responsible and thoughtful bird. Whenever any of his many demanding, and in his opinion, shiftless relations show up he furiously chases them away. But whenever Ms. Corvid appears he always defers to her, letting her secure a sizeable portion of the rain of cheese for herself. Laurel is svelte, more cautious than Hardy but equally bright. Between them they never fail to impress.

Not only does Hardy know the approximate time of our arrival, he knows the shape and colour of the car. He always waits politely until the window is lowered and then says hello. With his head slightly to one side, and one bright eye appraising all possibilities, he makes a low rrrrr rrrrr sound, with a slight upward note at the end like a question. He carefully eats one or two (or three) bits of food, then filling his beak to capacity, flies away to set up several caches. These are in the grass around the trunks of nearby trees. Once placed, he covers his treasure with sticks, bits of bark and tufts of greenery. Then back he comes, ever hopeful of more.

A crow's brain is structured differently to a human's, but it is capable of many, once thought uniquely human, abilities. Hardy and Laurel have the capacity to form memories and through the process we call dreaming, to fine tune those memories "for future purposes". Such purposes include solving complex problems and imitating (not rote mimicking ) human language. Simply put, Hardy and Laurel are capable of conscious thought. (For evidence of this google Betty, the tool wielding, wire bending New Caledonian crow). They exercise reasoned action and, in this way, think like we do.

No wonder we find their antics both irritating and engaging!

And, before we somewhat grudgingly accept Harvey and Laurel, the 'common crow', into our rarified brainiacs club, we should also know that their brains do easily what ours only manage to do at a rudimentary level: they create new neurons even as aging adults.



### HOMEMADE MOSQUITO TRAP:

Submitted by Carol Drew.

Items needed:

1 cup of water

1/4 cup of brown sugar

1 gram of yeast

12-litre bottle

### HOW:

- 1. Cut the plastic bottle in half.
- 2. Mix brown sugar with hot water. Let cool. When cold, pour in the bottom half of the bottle.
- 3. Add the yeast. No need to mix. It creates carbon dioxide, which attracts mosquitoes.
- 4. Place the funnel part, upside down, into the other half of the bottle, taping them together if desired.
- 5. Wrap the bottle with something black, leaving the top uncovered, and place it outside in an area away from your normal gathering area. (Mosquitoes are also drawn to the colour black.)

Change the solution every 2 weeks for continuous control.
