A Letter to Belcarra Residents

Dear Residents,

I wanted to reach out to all residents to explain our current situation and the steps we will be taking in the weeks ahead to address Village business and restore our full Council complement.

With the recent resignations on Council, we retain a basic quorum of three Council members. Until after the by-election and Inauguration of a Mayor and Councillor, I have been appointed Deputy Mayor, a member of the *Mayor's Council on Regional Transportation* (TransLink), and Alternate Municipal Director to the *Metro Vancouver Regional Board* (MVRBD).

Councillor Clark has been confirmed as Municipal Director to the MVRBD, and appointed as a member to fill the vacancy on the *Metro Vancouver Water Committee*. Councillor Clark and myself have also been appointed to the *Sasamat Volunteer Fire Department (SVFD) Board of Trustees*, along with Councillor Drake who will retain his appointment.

While Council will continue to fulfill its' responsibilities, it is very important now that we move promptly to restore a full Council. That will require a by-election which is scheduled for early 2021. While the managing of this process will be a little challenging given that we are in the midst of the COVID pandemic as well as a provincial election, we will take the necessary steps and keep everyone informed as we move forward.

Mayor Town Hall meetings have been cancelled until further notice.

We continue to work with our Water Committee and engineer in assessing the adequacy of our water supply, and once all the information is received along with recommendations, Council will take action.

While we carry on with the normal functioning of Council, we are also conscious that major decisions should await by-election results and the restoration of a full Council.

Tri-City mayor resigns alleging 'conflict of interest' blocked effort to stem wildfire risk

Neil Belenkie resigned as mayor of the Tri-City village of Belcarra today, alleging that two councillors blocked efforts to sell-off small lots of public land to fund water infrastructure to combat wildfires.

The mayor of Belcarra has resigned in protest, alleging that two councillors moved to block a plan to sell off village land in direct conflict of interest with their personal assets.

Neil Belenkie resigned as mayor Tuesday, Oct. 13th, in a last-ditch move he said was to protest Coun. Carolina Clark and Coun. Bruce Drake failing to recuse themselves from a Sept. 28th [2020] vote that Belenkie said would have advanced the potential sale of small village-owned lots in an effort to raise funds for a water system to fight wildfires.

On Sept. 28th [2020], the two councillors voted to block the change in zoning laws that would have allowed for the creation of property titles on lots less than half an acre, something currently prohibited in Belcarra, but a category that makes-up many of the road end lots.

"We were elected to improve the water systems," Belenkie told the Tri-City News. "If Belcarra can't stop a fire going through the trees — because there's no tree break — it can spread through the treetops, through Port Moody and into Coquitlam."

"If Belcarra doesn't get its water improved, I truly believe this threatens lives."

Belcarra Mayor Neil Belenkie was serving with the Sasamat Volunteer Fire Department when he remembers the village ran out of water while crews battled a house fire. He recently told the Tri-City News he fears a house fire in his community could quickly spread into the forest and start a wildfire.

Belenkie said both councillors had recused themselves in the past when the issue came before council. As evidence of the conflict of interest, he pointed to a [letter](#) submitted by Clark's husband, Peter Clark, to council in October 2019, which states that the sale of a village-owned waterfront lot would "destroy the view" from their home and substantially reduce its value.

"This home like many people our age is our entire life savings," wrote the councillor's husband, "it is all we have and potentially inflicting this type of a financial loss should be avoided at all costs."

Both Clark and Drake denied to the Tri-City News that they were in a conflict of interest.

"I do not agree that I have breached the conflict of interest rules. And I'm very disappointed that the mayor would publicly make such allegations about me," said Coun. Clark, noting she has consulted a lawyer throughout the process. "I really don't believe I was in conflict or I wouldn't have voted."

Regarding the letter, Clark later wrote the Tri-City News: "My husband wrote the letter. I did not have any involvement with it. Furthermore, I am on the record as having declared a conflict of interest regarding the waterfront lot across the street from my property."

Drake said any potential sale of the village-owned property near his house would have no impact on his view as it is two doors down. "It's on the other side of a neighbour's property," he said. "The reality is my property wouldn't be impacted."

According to Drake, his opposition to changing the laws around the sale of land less than a half-acre in size — a category which encompasses many of the road end lots — stems from a public hearing in which "there was the largest negative response I've seen in years."

Drake said some community members expressed frustration that the lots might be developed out of the "green character of the community," that certain trails would become inaccessible, and that any development would encroach upon some residents' driveways and property.

But the now-former mayor said an elected revenue-generating committee had recommended the [sale of the road ends](#) and that by blocking the process that would have made those sales possible, the two councillors have put the entire region at risk due to wildfire, what Belenkie has called a "ticking time bomb" for the entire Tri-Cities. "The village is broke," he said. "That was the number-one thing I was elected to do. I failed."

Belcarra's last independently audited [financial statement](#) submitted at the end of 2019, indicates that the village holds just under \$9 million in surplus, up \$144,000 from 2018.

In what Belenkie described as both an "unbelievably selfish" turn of events and a "failure in process," he is calling on the province to conduct an investigation into any potential breaches of conflict of interest rules.

The remaining members of Belcarra council are now looking to hold a by-election to elect a new mayor, the second election now slated for the village after former Coun. Rob Begg resigned shortly after the last council meeting, citing "council dysfunction."

In the meantime, Belcarra Coun. Liisa Wilder has stepped into the role, in line with her duties as acting mayor.

TRI CITY NEWS EDITOR'S NOTE: An earlier version of this story quoted Mr. Belenkie as saying "The village is broke." While accurately quoted, we have added context around the financial situation of the village of Belcarra as last reported in a 2019 independent audit.

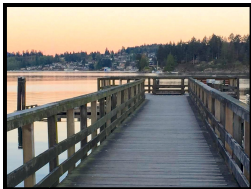

Pirate of North Arm Captured

Police Boat with Recovered Booty in Tow

Awakened Suspicion of Residents

— Elderly Man is Said to Have Brought Off
Many Raids.

A launch heavily loaded with blankets and all sorts of household goods and towing two rowboats and a canoe, also heavily loaded, coming down the North Arm [Indian Arm] Sunday afternoon, caused more excitement there than there has been for some time. Since the first of the year, many of the summer homes on the inlet have been broken into and household effects taken and the appearance of the launch with its tow awakened the residents to action.

Police headquarters were acquainted by the residents that the boat, filled with armed men were on their way to town and that these men were the waterfront pirates. Detectives were sent out in an auto and followed the road along the shore until the launch came near Hastings Mill, when they ventured out in a boat heavily armed to take the supposed pirates at any cost. The first man they saw was Chief Cruickshanks, of the provincial police, and following him came several officers holding an old man with a grey beard.

The prisoner, who refused to talk to the officers, lives half way up to Indian River, and his name is believed to be Robert Bruce. For some time, his actions have been very strange, and Sunday morning when the Elks picnic arrived at Wigwam Inn, they were informed that the storehouse had been broken into the night before and bacons and other edibles had been taken. The police were notified and after some searching for some time found Bruce and his cache.

The alleged thief got in a lot of his work before the campers [cottagers] arrived this summer, but of late has been making several inroads on supposedly empty cottages. Less than two weeks ago he visited the summer home of Mr. O. B. Leslie at Jug Island [Beach] about 2 a.m. He walked right up to the door and looked in, when he was seen and given thirty seconds "to get to the beach or get filled full of lead".

The man made the beach in the required time after saying that he did not know that the cottage was occupied. While watching him row away, Mr. Leslie saw him tow a rowboat and a canoe loaded with blankets and other camping outfits. This is supposed to be the same canoe taken from Mr. H. W. Baker's camp at Cosy Cove, just around the corner, and yesterday afternoon Mr. Baker recognized the canoe being towed behind the launch.

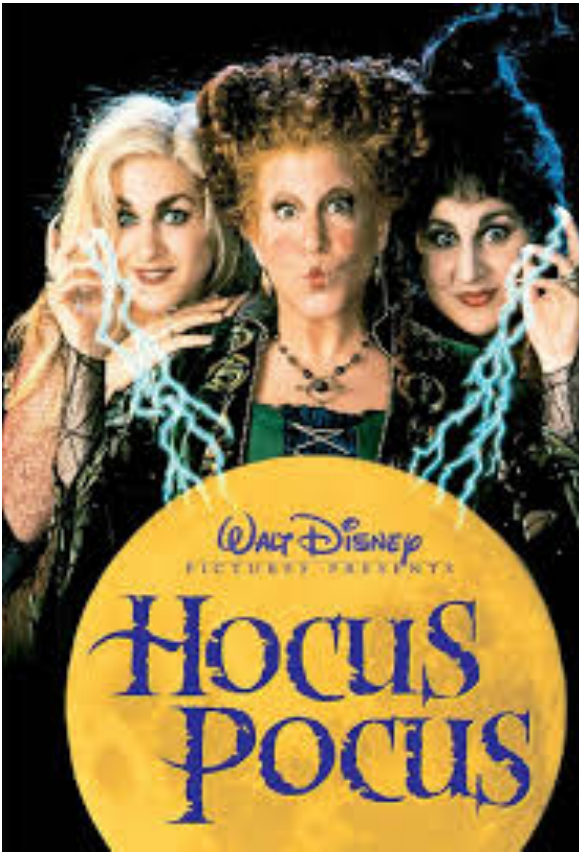

C'mon, c'mon, do the pumpkin with me (again)

Do the pumpkin, they said, the people for whom I cook dinner much of the time. "The pumpkin" at our house means one thing: the beef, corn, peach and pumpkin stew that comes to the table inside a baked pumpkin.

It is set alongside the crustiest of French bread, lots of unsalted butter, a crisp green salad on the side and the prospect of continuing, tasty leftovers.

Last year around this time, I spelled out the recipe for this simple, if time-consuming, creation. Not everybody kept their copy of SR that long.

So, heady with the success of having cooked my first ever turkey just last Monday, I set about doing the pumpkin and keeping some notes.

That turkey, by the way, was a spur-of-the-moment idea. Hurting down the highway last Sunday morning from the Okanagan wine festival, where I'd subjected my tongue and teeth to the judging of 150

wines, I was crunching Elstar apples and listening to the country station when, at Keremeos, I saw the sign that said "fresh turkeys, \$1.25 a pound."

A quick turn took me into the driveway of a turkey farm. "We only have small ones left," said the woman in apology. "We're small." I said and a 12-pounder would be just fine. "Just don't overcook it," she said.

Dinner was the 12-pounder, slow-roasted, basted with butter and later, sherry. The stuffing was determined by the contents of the kitchen and pantry: smoked ham, cubes of Winnipeg rye bread, apple, carrot, onion, shallots, green onion, garlic, dried tomatoes, dried pineapple, sage and thyme, sherry and chicken stock.

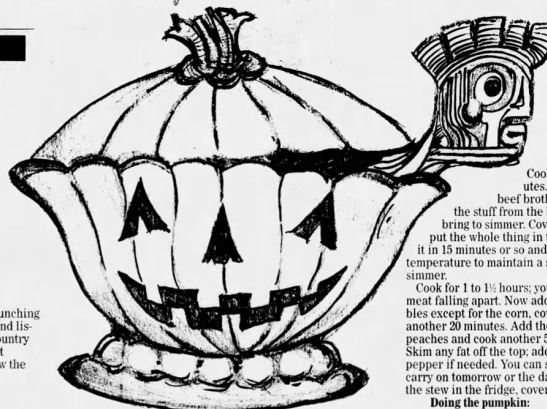
Plus turnips sautéed in butter, honey and paprika, steamed broccoli and rice potatoes. Did you know that all the potato rices for sale around town are made in Chile?

We drank a Lang Farm Winery pinot meunier 32 and smacked our lips a lot. It won one of the three gold medals this year, demolishing that old saw about how B.C. can't make any good red wine. Hah! The first-ever platinum medal in 13 years of Okanagan festivals went to Cedar Creek's magnificent Merlot 32.

But back to the pumpkin at hand; this time of year is when the dish comes into its own. In fact, this time of year is the only time this dish can be made, this side of the Andes, seeing as it calls for fresh peaches, corn and pumpkin. It serves six, if you want a little leftover for Tuesday night, and it has had some fine-tuning since last year.

For the stew:

- 3 pounds lean beef in 1-inch cubes
- ¼ cup good olive oil
- 2 medium onions, chopped
- 2 cups green pepper, chopped

- 3 to 4 garlic cloves, chopped
- 2 teaspoons salt (more or less, to taste)
- ½ teaspoon black pepper (more or less)
- 1 big bay leaf
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme (1 teaspoon if fresh)
- 2 to 3 tablespoons tomato paste (more, if you want the stew darker)
- 1½ cups red wine
- ¼ cups beef broth (enough liquid to cover everything)
- 2 cups yellow squash in 1-inch cubes
- 2 cups carrots in half-inch rounds
- 2 cups fresh green beans, snapped in half or thirds

- 1 pound fresh, ripe tomatoes, chopped (or a one-pound can of tomatoes, chopped, drained)
- 2 cups corn kernels, fresh if you can get it (just cut the cobs into 1½-inch rounds - a little messy to eat, but tasty), or use frozen
- 5 to 6 fresh peaches, peeled, pitted, quartered

Heat the oven to 325 F. Make sure meat is dry for browning. Heat the oil in a pan, brown the meat, a few pieces at a time; as they're done, put them into a big casserole with a lid. You will be cooking the stew in this.

Add onions, peppers, garlic to the oil in the pan (if it's gotten too grungy, use new oil). Stir over medium heat until the onions get that soft-but-not-browned state. Take everything out with a slotted spoon and add it all to the meat.

Put low heat under the casserole; stir in salt, pepper, tomato paste, bay leaf, thyme and stir to mix well. Add wine, turn heat up to medium and put the lid on the pot.

Cook for 15 minutes. Now add the beef broth, stirring up all the stuff from the bottom, and bring to simmer. Cover again and put the whole thing in the oven. Check it in 15 minutes or so and adjust oven temperature to maintain a steady, gentle simmer.

Doing the pumpkin: Cook for 1 to 1½ hours; you don't want the meat falling apart. Now add all the vegetables except for the corn, cover and cook another 20 minutes. Add the corn and the peaches and cook another 5 to 10 minutes. Skim any fat off the top; add more salt and pepper if needed. You can stop now and carry on tomorrow or the day after; just put the stew in the fridge, covered.

- 1 medium sized pumpkin (12-inch diameter or more)
- ½ cup milk
- salt and pepper
- greens for garnish

Cut a good sized lid off the top of the pumpkin. Scrape out all the seeds and fibres. Be careful not to make a hole in the side or the bottom of the pumpkin - leave lots of wall in place. Rubse pumpkin with the milk, sprinkle inside with salt and pepper.

Put it right side up on a baking sheet or sturdy foil, in a 350 F oven. Bake for about an hour; maybe a little less; you want the flesh tender but not too soft. Put the lid of the pumpkin in to bake for the last 20 minutes.

Reheat the stew on top of the stove and ladle it gently into the pumpkin. Do not pour it all in at once from the pot; it will split the tureen and cover you in stew.

Put the lid on top, sprinkle cress, parsley, greens all around, set on a sturdy serving platter and bring it to the table to squeals of glee from all assembled. Scrape out just a bit of the pumpkin when you serve the stew, being careful not to go through the wall with the ladle.

The stew reheats beautifully once or twice, but not the pumpkin: that's a one-shot tureen.

Wine? That new Bulgarian cabernet sauvignon, called Sliven 1989, is perfect: soft, round, full and tasty, and only \$7.95, new in B.C. as a general listing.

Besides, scientists have just discovered a grape pigment in cabernet, called *enocetin*, which helps the body get rid of radioactive substances. You can't ever be too careful. Especially when it tastes so good. ♦

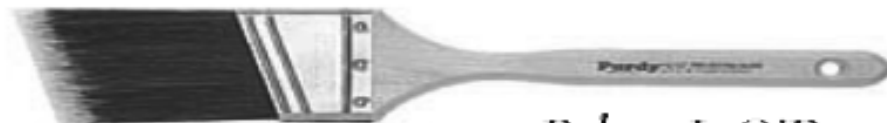
