



Online Shopping Safety Tips

Incredibly, it's that time of year again. Time to wish the very best of the season to all and time to begin (or, if you are an early bird, to complete) the great gift hunt.

This year, because of Covid-19, more shopping will be done online than ever. And, unfortunately, it is riskier than ever. More and more scammers are around trying to cheat shoppers out of their money or gain access to private financial information. However, if you follow these internet shopping safety tips, most hazards related to purchasing items online can be avoided.

- 1. Research the website and seller. See if there is any negative feedback/reviews. Use the Better Business Bureau online directory and scam tracker.
- Look for a definite location and telephone number on the homepage. Even 'phone to check.
- 2. Make sure website is secure. There should be a padlock symbol in the address bar next to the website address.

The website address should start with https://

- 3. Check delivery date and return policy information.
- 4. Ensure software and anti virus protection is up to date. Change passwords frequently.

- 5. Use a credit card, not a debit card. First a credit card does not allow direct access to your accounts. Second, there are more consumer protections with a credit card if something goes awry.
- 6. Be alert to the type and amount of data the retailer is asking for to complete the transaction. If you do not feel comfortable with the information requests, cancel before purchasing. No retailer needs, for example, your social insurance number.
- 7. Check your accounts frequently for signs of any unauthorized activity.
- 8. Don't make purchases using public Wi-Fi.
- 9. Keep your transaction information in a safe place. (i.e order confirmation number). Track your purchase, to make sure it is on its way.
- 10. Remember the old adage: If the offer looks too good to be true, it probably is. A really low price can be a red flag that you are on a fake site.
- 11. Finally, report any cyber crime to the RCMP. Call their non emergency/information number: 604-945-1550.



Letter to the Editor

Dr Bonnie Henry says we are all in this together.

Covid-19 has made an enormous impact on how we spend our time. As I write this opinion piece, the daily number of infected individuals in Canada is rising. The numbers are also rising in BC and in the Fraser Health Authority. The way forward is still uncertain. The time frame to easing of this pandemic is some way off. Once most of us have had a reliable vaccination, we will feel better about travelling. Until then, most of us will stay closer to home and put increasing pressure on local resources.

It seems that the local parks, waterways and trail-ways will be under continuing, if not increased, pressure this coming year. Local parking will be as difficult in the year ahead as it was this past summer. This may not be the best time to make permanent decisions regarding local parking.

There are many opportunities for more and safer parking in our Village. Moving forward with those ideas may be more appropriate if they also reflect the broader thoughts that may come with input from our neighbours. Blending our ideas with those from Anmore, Port Moody, GVRD Parks, Translink, and BC Hydro Parks seems appropriate and timely.

We can also make some adjustments that will increase road safety and traffic flow within the Village. There are opportunities for traffic calming such as speed bumps, crosswalk lights, improved sight lines and additional stop/uield signs.

Midden Road opening, at least in a one-way counter clockwise path, would permit a safer and more practical routing for trailers, safety vehicles, public transportation and some Villagers.

The position Belcarra took this year with respect to parking was indeed helpful. The parking demand far exceeded the availability and Council acted with prudence and good judgement in calming the many issues that followed. We don't yet know whether the interim changes that were made will need to become permanent changes. Let us defer making those positions permanent at this time. Let's talk to one another. Let's talk to others who may be affected by our parking decisions and let us plan together. We have time.

As with Covid-19, we will get through this, stronger and together.

Stories From The Archives —

'S.S. Defiance' on the Rocks near Bedwell Bay

Source: Vancouver Daily Province, Friday, May 31st, 1912, page 20.

"A resident of the North Arm [Indian Arm] reported that the steamer 'Defiance' went on the rocks about noon yesterday, near one of the islands opposite Bedwell Bay [most likely the rocks adjacent 'Racoon Island'], and was calling for assistance. A later report stated that with the rise of the tide the steamer was floated from her dangerous position and steamed to the city."

In 1899, Captaín John Andrew ('Jack') Cates (1866-1942) started the 'Terminal Steamship Company Limited' when he purchased the 'S.S. Defiance'. In 1900, Captain Cates purchased the 320-acre Mannion estate, also known as the 'Mannion Ranch', on Bowen Island's Deep Bay. In 1902, Captain Cates launched the 'Terminal Steamship Company' ferry fleet, the new name for his Howe Sound ferry service. Prior to 1907, the 'Terminal Steamship Company' primarily provided ferry service to Bowen Island and Howe Sound, although the 'S.S. Defiance' began service on the North Arm (Indian Arm) run in 1902 following the launch of the 'S.S. Britannia'. Step-by-step the 'Terminal Steamship Company' fleet grew to include the 'Belcarra', the 'Bowena' and the 'Ballena'.

These were smaller passenger/cargo vessels offering a basic ferry service that brought countless church, club and company picnickers to destinations such as Bowen Island and Belcarra Park on Indian Arm. (Both the 'Bowena' and 'Ballena' were used exclusively on the Howe Sound runs.) In 1908, when the Burrard Inlet travelling post office (T.P.O.) was established, it was the 'Terminal Steam Navigation Co. Ltd.' that provided ferry service to Indian Arm, and the 'S.S. Belcarra' was designated as the first T.P.O. and Captain Cates was the first postmaster for the Burrard Inlet T.P.O. from 1908 until 1910. Both the 'Belcarra' and 'Defiance' carried mail to and from locations on Indian Arm.





Sarajevo, Bosnia

Many people may know Sarajevo, Bosnia as a war zone. But the mysterious city holds more than you may realize!

One of their famous destinations in Sarajevo is their bobsleigh track made for the 1984 Olympics. The track is mostly abandoned with graffiti drawings and over grown trees around. But there are many nature hikes and view points around the track. Along with modern cafes, hotels, and playgrounds. The track is located just outside the busy Sarajevo.

Just a few blocks up a steep hill from the main street in Sarajevo, is the War Childhood Museum! It holds most of the precious things kids had during the Bosnia and Herzegovina War. They hold stories of why the items in the museum were special to the kids during the war, right beside each item. This is one of my favourite museums in the whole world!

The Old Town in Sarajevo holds many pedestrian streets and food markets. If you wander around and pay close attention to the stores you may see lots of candy shops. These Candy Shops usually have tasty Turkish Delights sitting on windows to catch your eye. Many shops sell old toys or kitchen supplies, while other stores sell modern phones and coffee machines. The Old Town is a "Must Go" when visiting Sarajevo.


If you come to Sarajevo by plane and rent a car, get the smallest one you can get. The tiniest, smallest car possible. For other than the main roads, Sarajevo roads are tiny, especially the ones going up to the bobsleigh track. Small, squished and tiny, tiny, tiny!!! My family had a hard time getting YOLO (,our van we live in,) through their roads. When you or your family drive through their roads to get to a specific destination, ask locals. You may have a GPS, but in Sarajevo, it's best to ask people who live nearby on the roads. For Sarajevo roads can be very very (VERY) tricky to get by. Better yet, don't drive in Sarajevo. It's best to relax in buses and taxis, than waste your time navigating.

Sarajevo is really one of my favourite cities in the whole trip. The War Childhood Museum was unique, the people are kind, and I will miss it all. I hope people will appreciate that there is more in Sarajevo, Bosnía than many may realise.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Belcarrans:

I've written this letter to ask that you might consider organ donation. As you may be aware, many lives have been saved and many more have been greatly improved by a gift of life from people like yourselves who have decided to help others through registering to donate tissue or organs to those who desperately need them.

My 46-year-old daughter is one of those people. She was born with a congenital defect in her urinary tract that severely damaged her kidneys and has now been on the waiting list for a kidney transplant for more than 15 years, (this is longer than anyone else in B.C.). She is currently on every wait list in B.C. and across Canada, and while there are just over one million B.C. residents who are registered organ and tissue donors, many people still don't know that registration is required to ensure vital time is not wasted determining if a deceased person wishes to donate. There is no longer a sticker on your driver's license and it is advisable to let your family members know of your wish to donate.

Many people are unaware of the advances in kidney transplantation that have greatly increased the success rates in recent years, but although the outcomes are far better than they were when Jana was a child - majority of transplants done then were almost always from a deceased donor - the lack of available organs is a major impediment to saving and improving the lives of those who need your help.

The number of British Columbians waiting for a kidney transplant is more than 650 people and the list continues to grow. Living donation is mostly now the norm. With a living donor the transplant is planned in advance and critical time is not wasted while the kidney is transported, transplant team is assembled, and an available operating room is located, etc.

Living kidney donor transplant operations can generally be performed with only a few small incisions (laparoscopically) and the recovery time for donors is typically very short. The kidney itself is only out of the donor's body for a few minutes before it is received by the person who so badly needs it. It's easy to see that transplants from live donors have a much higher success rate than deceased kidney donations. To be a living donor you must be a minimum age of 23 years old, but apart from that there is no age limit.

So please consider giving the gift you hold inside you. The process of being a registered living kidney donor involves only some preliminary questions and physical testing to ensure you are in good health. There are no costs to the donor and financial aid is available should you have to miss work or incur costs associated with your donation. Your privacy and personal information is secure within the B.C. transplant system.

I understand this is an extremely personal decision and there is a lot to think about. If you would like to gather more information and explore living kidney donation further, go to the BC Transplant website (www.transplant.bc.ca). You can also register to be an organ donor here as well. Or if you want to find out if you could be a donor for my daughter, please contact the donor nurse coordinator at St. Paul's Hospital at (604 806 9027/1-877-922-9822).

When exploring the possibilities of kidney donation I want to assure you that, should you decide to become a living donor, you can make the choice to back away from the process at any time. You may also wish to explore donation anonymously or I'd be happy to chat with you about it as well.
