



these magazines are produced by volunteers for free distribution to residents, there is a current bye election for mayor and it is suspected that one faction in the Belcarra Bay Area are responsible. A few magazines were replaced at the Midden Road bus stop around mid day on 22nd January.







NOTICE OF THEFT

A special edition of the Barnacle was prepared and delivered to enable candidates to the bye election to submit a position in order that residents would have information on which to base their vote.

The preparation and organization for printing and distribution at this particular time was more difficult than usual and as always is done by volunteers as a service to residents of the Village. The cost of printing is over \$500.00 and is an amount that we can ill afford if we are to continue to maintain our service.

Distribution to the magazine holders at the bus stops was done in the late afternoon of Thursday 21st January. The following day it was reported that all copies had been removed from every stop.

The theft has been reported to the RCMP and any person who has information regarding this theft is requested to advise the RCMP on the non emergency connection. Alternately you may contact me.

\$5 Million Fundraising Goal for Expansion of Emergency Department Reached

Construction of the new Emergency Department is over 45% complete, and is

The new 21,000- square-foot facility will have three times the current space, with the latest technology to ensure our physicians and healthcare workers are able to deliver the high quality care Eagle Ridge Hospital is known for. "We designed a department that will process patients faster and safer. In an emergency that's what you want: efficient, fast, safe treatment. This expansion will change the way we deliver care to the Tri-Cities. I think it will make a huge difference in patient experience and the overall health of our community", explained Emergency Physician, Dr. Michael Mostrenko. This expansion is one that is long overdue. "The number of patients we see have more than doubled since this hospital was built in 1984. It has been remarkable to see the level of care and compassion that we have managed to provide in this facility that is over thirty years old", noted Scott Brolin, Executive Director, New Westminster and Tri-Cities Health Services and Eagle Ridge Hospital. The features that are coming with this expansion will ensure that Eagle Ridge Hospital continues to be recognized as a health care leader amongst BC's community hospitals providing first-class patient care. Stories From The Archives — A Bear Story

Researched By: Ralph Drew, Belcarra, BC, January 2021. Source: Port Moody Gazette, Saturday, March 15th, 1884

"Some of the boys thought of a plan to amuse themselves the other night, and introduced a live bear (tame) into the sleeping department of the 'Caledonia House' [in Port Moody]. "There was a sound of revelry by night", when the presence of his bearship was discovered, and more than one of the boarders displayed remarkable ability and presence of mind in getting out of his way."

"But the laugh was the other way when mine host Kelly [Robert Kelly] attacked bruin with one of the largest boots in British Columbia — of course, it was not his own, but belonged to a man who has since left town. Every thud was like the sound of a pile-driver and the bear just beat the best time of 'Maud S.' [a legendary race horse] by a half-second in getting down stairs, accompanying himself the while in a voice which scared the wolves away over at the North Arm [Indian Arm]."

In 1882, Col. John Thomas Scott (1821–1908) of New Westminster and his son-in-law Robert Brenton Kelly (1849–1908) built the 'Caledonia Hotel' at the north foot of 'Queen Street' which they opened in December 1882. It was during 1883 that Kelly built a trail south from 'Kyle Street' in Port Moody up the hill to the surveyor's "cut-line" that defined the boundary between Townships 38 & 39 (Como Lake Road) which would later become part of 'Coquitlam' in 1891.

In 1891, Robert Brenton Kelly, J.P., became the first Reeve (Mayor) for the new 'District of Coquitlam' and served for five years from 1891 until 1896. Kelly also operated the Coquitlam Post Office from 1891 to 1898. Kelly was born in Galashiels, Scottish Borders, Scotland, in 1849, and in 1880 married the daughter of New Westminster pioneer Col. J. T. Scott. In 1880, Kelly was also one of four trustees who founded the 'Royal City Planing Mills Company' in New Westminster along with John Hendry. Robert Brenton Kelly died suddenly on July 12th, 1908, at age 59.

The Applicant Submitted by Klaus Bever

An unintended association of name and expectation can be surprising.

In the 1970's my twenty year old first cousin Fred Bever completed an application for summer work. This was with The Frontier College in Northern Ontario. The job was extra-gang railroad labour during the day, replacing worn ties and rails; and teaching fellow workers in the evening. The teaching was basic upgrading for adults in reading, writing or arithmetic skills. The class rooms were old sleeper railcars on sidings near settlements by the Albany River flowing into James Bay.

The job interview was somewhere downtown on the University of Toronto grounds. Fred was then studying Canadian History at Carleton University in Ottawa. His qualifications for the job up north were exceptional.

Fred was tall, tanned and wore hair to his

waist. He was an enthusiastic yet quiet and studious sort, more likely to listen than speak. Fred also had a loose unhurried gait, learned while partridge hunting with his father in the Haliburton Hills.

And so he ambled into the small conference room given over to the Frontier College for their interviews.

The interviewers had come a very long way to see this applicant. They were astonished by his almost blond, not black hair. They had apparently mispelled his last name, Beaver not Bever. On the telephone application that spring, Fred had given them his proper first name as Wolfgang, in its contracted form Wolf.

Fred tells the story that some of the people of Northern Ontario were surprised when Wolf Beaver was not exactly what they had imagined or hoped for. But he, and they, had a wonderful summer of learning together.

I am hopeful!


Spring is beginning to push forth new life as bulbs push aside the dirt, ready to flourish. I look forward to hearing and seeing more community involvement and connection.

Letter To The Editor Submitted by Diana Drake

To All Belcarra Residents -

It has been a sad descent into 'dark' politics these last two elections in Belcarra. From alarmist misinformation through personal attacks, to misuse of private email addresses, censorship and out and out theft, there has been a steady decline in civility.

What's next? I ask this because in less than two years we will again be facing an election. Will this descent continue?

Surely we can lower the temperature on our differences of opinion. We are neighbours and friends, who in face to face discussions are invariably polite and can disagree without being disagreeable.

Therefore, anonymous "friends of Belcarra" and/or "concerned residents", I speak for many when I say, please sign your names to the blitz of emails, website missives and 'flyers'. Feeling as strongly as you obviously do, why not make yourselves more visible. Come out of the shadows, enter into the realm of accountability and run for office.

The 'masked marauder' political approach risks undermining the general good will and community co-operation that has, for years, been a hallmark of this small, very beautiful village. And it could ultimately discourage other, very capable candidates, from being willing to place themselves in the line of fire.

This brings me to the principal reason for my letter; to an example of the very worst masked marauder political style: the theft of the January edition of our community newspaper, the Belcarra Barnacle.

On Thursday evening, January 21st, two hundred copies of the Belcarra Barnacle were distributed to bus shelters throughout the Village. By Friday morning (10:30 am), the day before the election, they had been stolen.

If this was done to silence- that is censor-political opinions as expressed in the paper's articles and letters, it was unconscionable. This was a step too far. Not a prank, not an amusing bit of political skulduggery but theft, pure and simple and on many different levels:

First: The taxpayers of Belcarra contribute financial support every year to the printing of the Barnacle. In a very physical and solid sense it is our collective property, stolen from us.

As well, our community paper is supported by advertising. Businesses, big and small, local and in the Tri Cities, pay to have their ads run. That hard earned money was, effectively, also stolen.

Second: Stealing this pre-election edition of the Belcarra Barnacle is theft of an ethical nature. It reveals a deep disregard for the rights of others and a serious misunderstanding of what is meant by freedom of the press. Censorship of this sort can only be construed as the product of self interest and intolerance.

Third: Personal contributions of time and effort cannot be measured in dollars, but they are invaluable to the healthy life of a community. The work of volunteers who make the Belcarra Barnacle possible and of residents who contribute articles, photos, recipes, stories etc. to the paper, was also stolen.

Lastly, if the theft was an attempt to suppress one particular viewpoint in favour of another, it fails utterly. It points, instead, to the thief's/thieves' very evident uncertainty as to the validity of their arguments; that they obviously felt their views would do poorly when contested in an open and fair debate

Finally, it suggests that the thieves believe village residents lack the intelligence and perception to determine for themselves what is true and what may be of benefit to the community.

Now is the time for us to start anew; to congratulate our new Mayor, Jamie Ross as well as our new councillor, John Snell and wish them all the best in their endeavours on our behalf.

The last edition of the Belcarra Barnacle was published on Thursday, January 21, 2021 and placed in its usual distribution slots at all Belcarra bus stops. All copies of this edition disappeared by morning. This loss was reported to the Village Hall. Soon after, the Village circulated an e-mail noting that the edition was available on-line.

This was not a simple prank. This was an attempt by individuals or groups to prevent the timely distribution of information. The information was intended to allow Villagers to have a broader discussion about local politics and the by-election for Mayor being held on January 23. This theft was censorship, and has a cost.

Intolerance and prejudice is evident in this action. Elements of political partisanship exceeded reasonable limits and should be denounced. Village Council should consider having this investigated.

For the financially prudent in our Village, there may be little comfort that the \$500 cost of this edition was their money.

ORIENTAL CHICKEN WINGS - Judy Evans

2 lb. chicken wings
1 chicken cube
1 chicken cube
1/4 tsp. anise seed
1/4 c. soya sauce
3/4 c. brown sugar

1/2 tsp. garlic salt
1/4 tsp. anise seed
1/4 tsp. ginger powder

Cut 2 pounds of chicken wings; cover in flour, salt and pepper. Fry until golden brown.

Sauce: Dissolve 1 chicken cube in 1/2 cup boiling water. Add soya sauce, brown sugar, ginger powder, garlic salt and anise seed. Place fried chicken in pan and pour over the sauce. Place in oven and simmer for 1 hour or longer. The longer you cook, the thicker the sauce on the chicken. Turn chicken at least twice in sauce.

CHEESE-SAUSAGE BALLS WITH SAUCE (Great To Make Ahead And Freeze)

2 1/2 c. Bisquick
1 1b. pork sausage meat
1 lb. sharp cheese, grated

Sauce:
1 bottle chili sauce
1/2 small bottle ketchup
Garlic and onion to taste
1/4 c. brown sugar

Mix together with hands until well blended. Form into round balls; place in freezer. Bake at 325°F for 20 to 30 minutes on a greased pan.

<u>Sauce</u>: Mix all ingredients together, heat and use as accompaniment for sausage balls.

"BATTERED" WIENERS - Keith Patterson

1 pkg. or 8 to 12 wieners, all beef 1/4 tsp. seasoned salt 3/4 c. water

Batter:

1 c. pancake mix 1/2 tsp. onion powder

Prepare batter. Cut wieners into approximately 1-inch pieces. Dip into batter. Fry in deep fat at 375°F for 2 1/2 to 3 minutes. Makes 4 to 5 dozen appetizers.
