Booking your immunization appointment

All eligible people can register to book their vaccine online through [*Get Vaccinated*](#).

There are [three easy steps](#) to register to book your vaccine appointment:

Step 1: Register online, by phone or in person at a BC Services Centre

First, you register and get a confirmation number. You need that number to later book your vaccination appointment.

Registering also helps health authorities request the right amount of vaccine doses for each community.

- **Register in-person:** [Visit the nearest Service BC location](#)

To register, you must provide:

- First and last name
- Date of birth
- Postal code
- Personal Health Number - Find your Personal Health Number on the back of your B.C. driver's licence or BC Services Card.
- An email address that gets checked regularly or a phone number that can receive text messages

If you don't have a Personal Health Number, please register by phone or in person at a BC Services Centre.

Phone centre agents will never ask you for financial information, including credit card information.

Step 2: Book an appointment

After you have registered, you will be contacted to book a vaccine appointment when you are eligible based on your age and the [immunization plan phases](#). You will book your appointment online or by phone. You will select a location, date and time.

Please do not get discouraged if it takes a little longer to book your appointment by phone or online. Anyone who is eligible for the vaccine and wants to be immunized will receive their immunization.

Step 3: Get the vaccine

Visit the vaccine clinic to get your vaccine dose.

Getting the second dose

Second doses will be given four months after your first dose.

People who get their first vaccine dose will be notified by email, text or phone call when they are eligible to book an appointment for their second dose.

Where can I find the date of my first dose of vaccine?

The date of your first dose can be found on your COVID-19 Immunization Record Card, which you should have received at the time of your vaccination.

If you have lost your card, your immunization record is also available online in the [Health Gateway](#). Signing up is quick and easy using your mobile BC services card. Visit www.healthgateway.gov.bc.ca for more details on how to sign up.

Vaccine eligibility

Vaccine booking is available for individuals in the following groups:

Currently Eligible to register:

- Self-identified Indigenous (First Nations, Métis, Inuit) individuals born in 2003 or earlier: [Register online](#) or call [1-833-838-2323](tel:1-833-838-2323) (toll free)
- Born in 2003 or earlier (18+): [Register online](#) or call [1-833-838-2323](tel:1-833-838-2323) (toll free)
- Individuals born in 1991 or earlier (30+): You can get a vaccine at eligible pharmacies with vaccine supply. [Find an eligible pharmacy near you.](#)
Appointments for pharmacy vaccinations cannot be booked through the Provincial Get Vaccinated registration and booking system.

People who are pregnant

Pregnant people who are born in 2005 or earlier (16+) can book their vaccine appointments. To book an appointment, call 1-833-838-2323.

People who are clinically extremely vulnerable

People aged 16 to 74 who are clinically extremely vulnerable and have received their patient invitation letter can get vaccinated. You can book a vaccine appointment for yourself or have a family member or friend call for you.

Indigenous COVID-19 immunization clinics

In partnership with [First Nations Health Authority](#), [Métis Nation British Columbia](#), Friendship Centres and other community organizations, COVID-19 immunization clinics with cultural supports are available for those who self-identify as Indigenous (First Nations, Métis, Inuit) individuals 65 years of age or older, and Indigenous Elders.

About the COVID-19 vaccine

The COVID-19 vaccines that have been [approved by Health Canada](#) are safe, effective and will save lives. Vaccines do more than protect the people getting vaccinated, they also protect everyone around them. The more people in a community who are immunized and protected from COVID-19, the harder it is for COVID-19 to spread.

Reminder: [Provincial Health Officer \(PHO\) orders](#) and guidelines remain in place for everyone, regardless if they have received the vaccine. Please continue to practice COVID-19 safety behaviours, such as, avoiding gatherings, wearing a mask in indoor public spaces, cleaning your hands often, coughing and sneezing into your elbow and keeping two-metres apart from others.

Is there a call list I can be added to for extra vaccine doses at the end of the day?

No. Members of the general public must wait for their age group to become eligible and then book an appointment to receive a vaccine. To avoid vaccine wastage at immunization clinics we only pull the doses needed to fulfill booked appointments each day. If doses remain after a clinic takes place, staff may put out a call through appropriate service providers to identify eligible people from our priority groups, as identified in the Province's COVID-19 Immunization Plan.

Why should I get the vaccine?

Community immunity could be reached when a large majority of people in B.C. are immunized against COVID-19. When you choose to be vaccinated against COVID-19, you are helping save lives by protecting your household and your entire community from the virus.

The COVID-19 vaccine will be free for everyone in British Columbia.
