

- 8. Procedural planning to transition back to in-person/hybrid Council meetings.


I move into 2022 with much enthusiasm for continuing the work of Council and our Village.

'Tis the Season to Be Careful

The Christmas holiday is an amazing time of the year, full of good times and precious family moments. But it can also be a very stressful few weeks.


Busy people caught up in the hectic, pressured scheduling of the festive season are often more careless and; therefore, more vulnerable to crime. Here are some tips from the RCMP to ensure a safer celebration:

- when shopping on line, never provide personal information (birth date, social insurance number etc.) Shop only trusted sites. Those recognized, for example, as reliable by the Better Business Bureau.
- when shopping in person, keep an eye on your credit card (i.e., watch for double swiping), park in busy, well-lit areas and do not leave valuables visible in your car.
- when celebrating do not drink and drive. Always have a designated driver and always call police if you are unable to stop a person driving under the influence.
- when setting up your tree be sure that presents are not placed around it if it can be seen from outside. Keep a live tree frequently watered and keep all trees well away from sources of heat. Tree lights should be off when no one is home.

- when decorating, consider all lit candles a fire hazard and do not leave them unattended. Use ladders with caution and check all strings of lights, both indoor and outdoor, for excessive wear before installing.
- when cleaning, up do not leave boxes that advertise new electronics outside your home. Remove a live tree before it dries out usually after 3-4 weeks inside.
- when driving. watch the weather reports, know road conditions and give yourself plenty of extra time. Always wear a seatbelt and pull over when using GPS and/or your phone.
- when travelling, do not advertise your plans on social media. Ensure your house is locked and monitored, either by a neighbour, friend or electronic device. Have someone pick up your mail.

Snow and Ice Removal Information From Public Works Winter 2021 & 2022



Frequently Asked Questions during a snow event in Belcarra

When will my street be plowed? During a snow event, Village roads are plowed according to a priority system aimed at supporting the greater public safety and public transportation access.

Priority 1 - maintain accessibility for emergency vehicles and transit vehicles on collector, arterial and emergency and bus routes that connect major sections of the community.

Priority 2 - maintain safe travel routes and accessibility for vehicles on non-arterial and collector routes. Clearing these routes may be advanced or delayed depending on the weather event intensity, severity or duration.

Priority 3 – maintain safe travel routes and accessibility for vehicles on all remaining routes. Clearing these routes may be advanced or delayed depending on the weather event intensity, severity or duration.



Why did the plow fill my driveway with snow? Our plows are set to push snow to the right to remove it from the roadway. The best way you can ensure that snow doesn't get pushed back onto your driveway by the plow is to pile snow on the right side of the driveway (when facing the street) when shovelling.

(Please note that when an approaching snowplow is coming toward you, it is advisable to move yourself as far away from the road as possible. The driver may not see you and the snow is blowing.)

Why can't I just shovel snow onto the road for the plow to pick it up?

Shovelling snow onto the road contributes to unsafe driving and walking conditions and increases the cost of providing winter road maintenance. If you shovel your snow into the roadway, you may be subject to a fine under the Village Parking Regulation Bylaw No. 518 Section 53, Snow Removal.

- " (a) No person shall deposit, pile, or spread snow or ice cleaned from roofs, parking lots, or garages or any other surface or property, on any highway, boulevard, or other public place, except the place designated by authorized Public Works staff.
- (b) Nothing herein contained shall be construed as prohibiting the Village from plowing snow to the property line of any highway or from removing such plowed snow."

Why hasn't the Village plowed my street? The Village only plows where safe to do so. Illegally parked vehicles on the side of roads and road ends create a hazard and they will not be plowed until it is safe to do so.

Why hasn't my road been salted yet? It's very icy!

All roads are salted according to the same priority route system as plowing. However, it is also possible that if there was any rain or wet snow, the brine mixture may have washed away. You may report an area of concern by using our emergency line.

Why hasn't the Village cleared the catch basin in front of my home? It is covered in snow!

During a snow event, the main focus of the Public Works staff is plowing the roads. If it is safe to do so, it is recommended that you clear the catch basin in front of your home to help prevent flooding when the snow melts.

Does the Village plow, white line to white line?


Yes, wherever possible, the Public Works staff will attempt to plow white line to white line or curb to curb. If residents can park their vehicles in their driveways during snow events, this will help to ensure that our plows can clear curb to curb.

What if I have a medical emergency and can't get out of my house?

If you have a medical emergency, please call 911. Emergency services will coordinate with the Village, if required.

What if I have a regular medical condition and I need to be able to get out of my house in order to receive treatment or medical attention?

We sympathize with your situation. However, the Village must prioritize resources through the community in order to serve the needs of the greater community. We recommend you plan ahead, as much as possible.





Stories From The Archives

A Great Scheme – A Canal from Port Moody to Pitt River

Vancouver Daily World, Editorial, Monday, November 30th, 1891, page 2.

"In the Spring of 1889, the announcement was made in these columns [the 'Vancouver Daily World' newspaper] that a company was being formed in this city, the object of which was to construct a canal from the head of Port Moody to the Pitt River, connecting the salt water of Burrard Inlet with the fresh waters of the Pitt and Fraser Rivers. The distance according to the reports of the engineers who have made a preliminary exploration of the projected line, is less than 3½ miles [5.6 km] to tide water in the Inlet from the banks of the Pitt River, and a little over four miles [6.4 km] to those of the Fraser, an entrance to which will be made by the first named stream a short distance below the railway bridge."

"The engineers pronounce the scheme a perfectly feasible one, the greatest difficulty being the Coquitlam River, which at the Junction [the CPR mainline junction with the spur line to New Westminster] is divided into two streams, but a short distance above the railway bridge it is one. In summer, except when a freshet prevails, it is not a large stream, but in the Fall and Spring it is a vast as well as a turbulent body of water. Modern engineering, however, provided the cash is forthcoming, can overcome almost any difficulty, imaginary or actual."

"The first company, in consequence of the temporary absence and subsequent death of one of its most active members — the late Dr. Whetham [Alderman, City of Vancouver] — dropped the matter for a time, and then finally."

"Realizing the importance of the scheme to our trade and the immense advantage it would confer upon this city and its great habour, heavy capitalists residing at a distance as well as in our own city have taken hold of the enterprise with such a determination that its success is practically assured. Already the necessary legislation to be asked for in Victoria and Ottawa is in course of preparation, and the surveyor's plans will shortly be completed for submission to the 'House of Assembly' and 'Dominion Parliament'.

"The turning of the Pitt River into Burrard Inlet will necessarily make it more or less a fresh water body, completely baffling the dreaded toredo [a wormlike marine mollusk which can drill into wood causing substantial damage] and making Vancouver's harbour peerless as a stream in which the mercantile as well as the naval marine of the world can ride in safety from either storm or tide, and at the same time cleanse their sides and bottoms of barnacles. Then indeed will Burrard Inlet become a much greater favourite than it is at present with seafaring men, and the British Admiralty as a port for its floating fortresses."


"To and from this harbour will river craft ply direct with the ports and places of call above New Westminster, with which City of Vancouver will then divide the trade of the district bordering upon the river, which to us at present is practically a dead letter, as little or none of it comes to Vancouver. In this respect alone, the importance of the scheme is paramount."

"To our agricultural friends in the territory certain to be benefited by the completion of the enterprise, it means a nearer and a better market for their products than they now enjoy, and a consequent larger amount of traffic with this city and its tradesmen, whose field of operations will be vastly enlarged by fresh outlets and connection with a desirable class of people of which at present they know very little."

"We are aware that already some in our own midst turn-up their noses at the mention of the scheme, claiming it to be Utopian and impossible of being completed. This was the cry when the Welland Canal was first mooted. So it was with the Canadian Pacific Railway and the many other great enterprising schemes launched upon the world in connection with bridges, viaducts, tunnels, etc. Even the tramway to New Westminster which, after encountering the most virulent and unwarranted opposition from a selfconstituted coterie, is now in successful operation, was pooh-pooed and sneered at, yet behold the benefit it has already conferred and that without costing our citizens a solidary cent."

"The men who have the new scheme in hand have yet to learn the meaning of the word fail. They, of course, expect the hostility of New Westminster, but those competent to give an opinion aver that the diverting of the Pitt River into Burrard Inlet will not affect the volume of water in the Fraser River or in the least interfere with navigation above and below that city. But of this more hereafter."

After Note: Between 1893 and 1896 there was an economic depression throughout North America — equivalent to the economic depression of the 1930s — that deeply affected every sector of the economy. That economic depression precluded potential investment in such a major infrastructure project as the proposed canal from Port Moody to Pitt River.



LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I'm sad to convey that Belcarra has lost another one of its loving residents. My Mum, Margaret Schulz, passed away at our family home on Tuesday November 16, 2021. She was going to celebrate her 99th birthday on November 29.

When we moved into our Belcarra home on November 30, 2002, it was with the plan that Mum would someday leave her beautiful home on Lake Osoyoos to live with us. She spent that Christmas with us, headed home, immediately sold her house, and moved to Belcarra the next fall in 2003! Wow! That's falling in love! As wonderful as her home on the lake was, Mum was a "West Coast girl" at heart. She loved Belcarra from the start and constantly marvelled at the tall trees, paralleling them to her beloved grandson's tall skyscrapers in Downtown Vancouver. There was no doubt which she thought was the winner! "Do people in Vancouver even know there is a place as wonderful as this?" she would often say. She loved reading our Belcarra Barnacle and even wrote an article in April 2008 about the Seniors Society at Glen Pine Pavilion. She was 100% in agreement the year our Village sign proclaimed us to be "the best place in the best place on earth"! Rainy days were declared as "That's what keeps BC green" and sunny days were triumphed with "Look at that beautiful blue sky!"

In her first years here, Mum loved to walk our dog (at that time, a little white Bichon Frise named Dexter) to the Belcarra Pícnic area. 2016 was a rough year in that we nearly lost Mum twice within 2 months: first to a heart attack (resulting in a Pace Maker) and then to a series of strokes. We were so grateful to find the Aging My Way Home Care as Mum needed 24/7 support after that. (We highly recommend them as a support line that really ends up being part of the family.) In the last few years, she loved nothing better than a car ride along Tum Tumay Whueton Drive to watch all the happy families and children at play in the picnic area. Seeing the little ones gave her the most pleasure, and she delighted in saying, "Why walk when you can run!" Too bad she had not been graced with any "great grandkids".

Mum had always been a "working mother" and I grew up in a "ladies' household" comprised of my mother, my grandmother, and myself. Her second marriage came about when she was teaching Legal Stenography at Burnaby Vocational. She put so much love and effort into her students! (She still received newsy letters every Christmas from a favorite student!) Mum was also instrumental in helping her new husband, Erich, write and publish very successful "Heavy Duty Diesel Mechanics" textbooks. That took a lot of stressful brainwork, as you can imagine! Sadly, Erich passed away shortly after they retired to Osoyoos.

Mum then devoted herself to visiting aging neighbours in the local Osoyoos Care Home. Whenever she visited us (at that time, in Coquitlam) she was well-known by my school colleagues as my "Grade 2 teacher helper", ready to color, cut, and glue those myriad of student resources, happy to dig out weeds in our school garden, and even willing to clean the art easel paint brushes. Mum's younger brother, Patrick, did eventually move to Osoyoos as well, but he too, sadly, passed away within a few years. Mum ended up as the last of 7 siblings.

Mum will be so deeply missed. She was a lovely, gracious lady with an underlying British politeness and a wee bit of the Irish sense of humour. No matter what the physical challenges threw at her, she remained busy every moment of the day. I was so very blessed to have enjoyed the most wonderfully memorable of afternoons with her that last day. Mum and I enjoyed a delightful outing complete with a lovely time just sitting watching the water view and all the happy families at Rocky Point Park where I was treated to Mum singing part of the Zip-A-Dee-Doo-Dah song: "Oh what a beautiful day! I've got a wonderful feeling, everything's going my way!" We also took her favourite drive through our local White Pine Park to see the little waterfall and check out who was hiking along the beach. Finally, we had a stop at the neighbour's driveway to wave at his giant blowup Santa. Her face was completely lit up with joy as she waved to Bill (or was it Santa?).

Peter and I especially want to thank our own Belcarra Fire Department. How very lucky we are to have dedicated volunteers who give up their spare time to train, to practice, and then to drop everything in their own lives to assist in a crisis. Their professionalism, combined with compassion, was undeniable and we are so very, very grateful. Thank you as well to the wonderful paramedics from New Westminster who never gave up hope. An incredibly empathetic paramedic, who had recently lost her own mother, guided me through the mysterious legalities as I sat there in a virtual stupor after Mum passed. Finally, thanks to the kind-hearted advanced paramedic who had to come from Langley when the Vancouver detachment was bogged down in traffic. Peter and I are so very grateful for all these wonderful people who guided us through a most traumatic time. Thank you to all of you, and additionally, to all the kind neighbours who so quickly sent heartfelt condolences and oh so many exquisite flowers.





Sasamat Volunteer Fíre Department


This holiday season the Sasamat Volunteer Firefighters Association (SVFA) is having a colouring contest!

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

An Opportunity in Democracy

In the late 18th century, as part of the global adjustments for power between, among others, Britain and France; and what became the American War of Independence, the principle of "no taxation without representation" was established. Not only was the principle of representation established but, equally important, so too, was the principle that taxation should be justified to those that bear the burden of paying.

Belcarra Council met on November 8th and received a five year tax plan from their financial consultant. This plan covers the period from 2022 to 2026.

The presentation was very clear on some important points:

- 1. Our Village is not broke.
- 2. Our Village has a Potable Water System debt that is not in arrears. This debt has a planned retirement in place.
- Our Village has made reasonable budget accommodation for staffing, expected repairs, and maintenance of existing assets/ infrastructure.
- 4. Our Village has not detailed any projects that may require large capital outlay.
- 5. Our Village will have at the end of this 5 year plan, if it is accepted by Council, cash reserves of at least an additional \$2.1 million.

6. Our Villagers will pay annual property taxes, if this plan is accepted by Council, that will be about 50% higher at the end of the 5 yr interval than at the beginning.

The financial planning document presented a five year plan for gathering a lot of money. The average Belcarra household will be asked to pay more than \$8,000 in excess of predicted and expected expenses. The five year planning document builds to at least a \$4.2 million cash surplus, for which there is no specified purpose.

In the years following the successful separation of the American Colonies from England, deliberative assemblies in democratic jurisdictions everywhere have applied the principle that the explanation for taxation precedes taxation itself. Most legislators have come to recognize that clear and convincing guiding principle that they must offer tax payers some certainty on how they plan to spend the taxes that they say they need.

Belcarra Council met on November 22nd to further consider this taxation plan and some adjustments were made. If Villagers have questions needing answers or goals needing explanations, there is plenty of opportunity to bring those forward.




