

Village of Belcarra announces appointment of Paula Richardson to top spot

The Village of Belcarra is pleased to announce the appointment of Paula Richardson to the position of Chief Administrative Officer (CAO), effective November 1, 2022. Paula replaces former CAO, Lorna Dysart, who retired in June.

Following Lorna's retirement, the Village began an extensive recruitment process. There was a positive response to the posting, and a number of candidates were interviewed by Council. In the end, it was determined that Paula was the most suitable candidate to fill the position.

Paula has been employed by the Village since 2016 and has worked in an administrative capacity since that time. With the retirement of the former CAO and following a brief period when the position was filled by Dennis Back on an interim basis, Council appointed Paula as Acting CAO in early July. During her time in this acting role, she has demonstrated her ability to fulfill the responsibilities of the position in a very competent and professional manner. It was the opinion of Council that Paula represented the best fit for the position given her deep understanding of local issues, and the fact that she has proven her ability to work closely with Council and the community.

Mayor Jamie Ross stated that he is pleased with the outcome of the recruitment process and satisfied that the community will be well-served. "Paula is well respected by Council and her peers and has a good rapport with members of the community," he adds.

Power outages:

As our recent weeks of wonderful summer-like weather give way to the cold, wet days of late fall, windstorms and power outages are probably not far behind. Particularly as this year's drought (coupled with widespread insect infestations) has led to the weakening of many trees.

If there is a power failure:

- Check first to see if your neighbours' power is still on. If not, notify B.C. Hydro.

- Turn off all tools, appliances and electronic equipment and turn all thermostats down to minimum. This will prevent both damage to sensitive devices as well as the possibility of fire when power is suddenly restored. (It also makes the 'restart' easier when there is less drain on the system.)

- Turn off all lights except one - this last light will alert you to the restoration of power.

- Do not open your freezer or fridge unless absolutely necessary. A full freezer will keep food frozen for 24-36 hours if the door remains closed.

- Do not use charcoal or gas barbecues, camping heating equipment, or home generators indoors. They give off carbon monoxide which can be deadly.

- If using candles, never leave them unattended.

And, finally, here are five power outage 'tricks':

- Strap an LED head lamp (or flashlight) so that it shines into a 4 litre jug of water. The water will amplify the light to create a lantern that can illuminate an entire room. Place the jug in front of a mirror for even greater amplification.

- Light the pointy end of a crayon. Once the fire reaches the paper, stick the crayon in its own wax on a china saucer or plate. One crayon can last a couple of hours. (Never leave unattended)

- Bring solar powered walkway or garden lights indoors.

- To lengthen the life of your iPhone battery put it on low battery mode, close unused apps, put phone on airplane mode. If your phone and backup chargers are out of battery, connect to a lap top that has a battery.

- If you run out of AA batteries for flashlights, you can convert AAA batteries using a ball of foil. Place the ball between the AAA's battery's negative end and the device, thus completing the circuit.

Stories From The Archives

A Hiking Trip To Lake Beautiful

Source: Vancouver Weekly News-Advertiser, Wednesday, July 24th, 1889, page 8. Researched By: Ralph Drew, Belcarra, B.C., September 2022.

"Five young men from the C,P.R. offices — viz. F. & J. Schofield, J. Bonltbee, J. Miller and J. Brown - had a thrilling experience in a trip they accomplished to Lake Beautiful [Lake Buntzen] and back. On Saturday [July 20th, 1889], they went to Port Moody [from Vancouver], from there to Tiffin's Mill [at Mossom Creek] and then struck through to Lake Beautiful, to which there is no regular trail. They arrived at their intended destination all right, but in returning lost their way and were about 24 hours in their endeavours to find the right way back, during which time they were without provisions and almost continually on the tramp. A party went in search of them but they arrived back in Port Moody in time to render an exploration unnecessary. The boys came home on the [C.P.R.] 'Pacific Express' all sound, but very tired and hungry and their wearing apparel a good deal worse for wear."



Can we talk? Can we be open? Can we be here for each other? Are each of us ready for our own departure from this earth?



My beautiful dahlias, courtesy of bulbs from the Fentons, have never been SO prolífic.

October marked our final meeting for the season, and we celebrated by sharing seeds, plants, and cuttings! Let's prep those gardens for the fall and make plans for Spring 2023! Hope you join us!

Les is ever the "go-getter" in our group, and he was inspired to do some investigating about our precious Cedar. He had several people ask him if they are dtreesying because they look so brown with all those seeds. They have been stressed by our long dry spell; let's hope they recover soon.

Here are a few facts on this wonderful tree.

Díd you know that the western red cedar was proclaimed the official tree of B.C. in 1988? It actually is not a true cedar but a woody member of the cypress family. The Latín "arbor-vítae" translates to "tree of lífe". B.C has the world's largest supply of standing red cedars. It is one of the most valuable commercial tree species in B.C. It generates over \$1 billion in economic activity annually and provides 1900 jobs. Although it has probably been in the Northwest for 50 million years, this species only became widespread in B.C. 4 to 5 thousand years ago, says Richard Hebda of the University of Victoria.

The cedar became the tree of choice to our indigenous people about 3 thousand years ago. Indígenous terms of affection include "grandmother cedar" and "long life maker." It was easier to work with (than Sitka Spruce) and offered them wood for homes, totem poles, canoes, paddles, nets to hooks, lures and fishing floats. Cedar's soft inner bark supplied clothing when woven into tunics, mats, blankets and could be shredded to make fluffy towels, diapers and sanitary pads. The vine like appendages that swoop down from the branches were twisted into ropes so strong they could haul 40-tonne whales! The roots were coiled into baskets tight enough to boil water on hot rocks. The green leaves that look like scaly braids were used for calcium rich medicine.

Pollen cones on western red cedars grow most heavily on the branches of the tree that are exposed to direct sunlight. Seed bearing cones grow on lateral spray branches typically near the middle of the branch. Each seed cone contains between eight and fourteen seeds. The seeds themselves range in size from 4 to 7.5 millimetres and are usually reddish brown.

The "seed fall" for these trees is typically October/November so we are about to see millions of them soon in Belcarra!

A Western Red Cedar on Vancouver Island, known as the Cheewhat Giant, is the largest known tree in Canada. It was discovered in the Pacific Rim Park in 1988 and is estimated to be over 1500 years old! "WOW!" It is 55.5m (182ft) high and 6.1m (20ft) around. The volume of the trunk is 449m3 (15,900 cu ft). It is the second largest Western Red Cedar in the world; the largest is on the Olympic Peninsula. Many communities and organizations are looking to protect our precious old growth forests. The Ancient Forest Alliance and the Canadian Forest Service are working with our indigenous people, the government, and industry to make our forests sustainable. For example, in July the Kanaka Bar Band (a Nlaka'pamux First Nation) located south of Lytton, announced their vision to protect a total of about 35,000 hectares of some of the most bio diverse old growth in B.C. "Awesome!"






