

Mayor's Report

Welcome to the New Year. I would like to provide you with Highlights from the last public Council Meeting and from my activities as your Mayor since the last report.

Council Meeting, December 5, 2022

The meeting began with a blessing of Council given by Elder Carleen Thomas of the Tsleil-Waututh Nation.

Council received for information, from the Partners from KMPG, the 2022 year end Audit Planning Report.

Council discussed and brought forward the Village's Financial Plan Document for the Public Budget Consultation scheduled for January 23, 2023. Two taxation scenarios for 2023 are included.

Ian Devlin, Chair of the Official Community Plan Committee provided budgetary comment to the operation of that committee.

Paula Richardson, Chief Administrative Officer, brought to Council a preliminary inquiry from the Evangelical Layman Church. Following discussion, Council deferred this matter for a six month period and after additional information from the applicant.

Stewart Novak provided, and Council received for information purposes, updates to several aspects of our Water System operation.

More detail and a recording of this meeting are available on the Village website [www.Belcarra.ca].

Multiple meetings during the past six weeks included: the Translink Mayor's Council on Regional Transportation, AGM of the Tri-City Chamber of Commerce, and Metro Vancouver Board. I am appointed, on your behalf, to the following regional committees: Electoral Area, Climate Action, Mayors, Regional Parks.

On December 17 I joined with community members and many children to welcome the annual Santa's Christmas Ship Flotilla with a volunteer crew from the Royal Canadian Marine Search and Rescue. The children met Santa and had the opportunity to sign his Great Book. The children were able to get a photo with Santa and receive a Christmas treat. Thank you to CRAB for cosponsoring this event.

Congrats to local author Díana Drake on her book "Ren's Treasure".

The beginning of the new year is a good time to make a quick assessment of your emergency supply kit. Here are some essentials for a home kit that will help you cope without services. Stock supplies for at least 72 hours and consider planning for one week. Keep items in a container or large bag in an accessible location. Replace any expired items like food and batteries twice a year.

- Water (four litres per person per day)
- Non-perishable food (dried, canned), or emergency food rations
- Flashlight
- Batteries
- Phone and extra battery chargers or power bank
- Manual can opener
- Spices and sweeteners (salt, pepper, honey, sugar)
- Durable cups, bowls, plates, and cutlery
- Tissues, toilet paper
- Personal hygiene supplies (soap, toothpaste, diapers)
- Garbage bags and wet wipes
- Masks
- Seasonal clothing, sturdy footwear
- Blankets
- Medical kit
- Personal items

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WARD Operation Update BIN A - MIXED RECYCLABLES

From Council Meeting Agenda www.belcarra.ca

At the January 23rd council meeting, Stewart Novak presented an update to council regarding a change in service at the WARD:

GLASS is now allowed in Bin A -

Waste Connections will now deliver the mixed recyclables to the United Boulevard Recycling and Waste Centre instead of Waste Connections' privately owned facilities. This will allow Belcarra residents to put glass jars into Bin 'A' Mixed Recyclables as they have done previously. United Boulevard Recycling and Waste Centre accepts glass jars into mixed recyclables.

SOFT PLASTIC is NOT allowed in Bin A -

At this time, #4 plastics - plastic bags, bubble wrap and chip bags will no longer be accepted in WARD's Bin 'A' recycle bin.

In order to keep soft plastics out of local landfills, these items can be taken to a Recycle BC depot to allow for effective recycling. Recycle BC has been expanding its recycling program effective January 1, 2023 to allow for more items. Belcarra residents are encouraged to check the Recycle BC website at www.recyclebc.ca for information on items accepted at these depots.

Stewart Novak reminded us that:

Food or other contaminated recyclables, and non-recyclable materials mixed into Bin A may result in back charges and may result in the full load of material being designated garbage.

Kathleen Watson (Kay)

Kay loved to travel, and on October 14th 2022 surrounded by family she booked her final one-way ticket. Her first trip occurred on August 16th, 1925 arriving in

Cumberland BC to the great joy of her parents Joseph & Hannah Watson and older siblings Henry, Jack and Edna. At 5 years old, Kay was gifted with her very own little brother, Leland, where she honed her skills as a tour guide extraordinaire. Kay outlived all her siblings.

Kay's next big trip was to Vancouver BC to attend the Vancouver Normal School to get her teacher's certificate. Education was highly valued by Kay and it was a gift she would pass on through her encouragement to each generation. She spent several summers taking courses to earn her Bachelor of Arts degree. She started teaching in a one room school house in Richmond BC, but did most of her teaching at New Westminster Secondary School. After over thirty years she retired and pursued her love of travel.

Kay excelled at sports, so much so she was inducted in 1989 to the BC Sports Hall of Fame as a member of the Hedlund's Senior Women's basketball team who won the Canadian Senior Women's Championship five years in a row. Kay would learn and hone her craft in many sports including basketball, baseball, tennis, golf, pickle ball, and pretty much anything where there was competition. She was offered a spot on the Chicago Bluebirds in the National Girls Baseball League which has gained recognition in the movie A League of Their Own, but declined the offer because she didn't want to let her school down.

Her career as a recliner coach was exceptional right up to the day before her final journey.

Some people bring home shot glasses or coffee mugs from their vacations, but not Kay....she brought home friends! Kay traveled the world with many people seeing such places including Europe, China, the Panama Canal, South America, the Baltic, the British Isles, Australia and New Zealand to list a few. The friends she met on her journeys were then invited to come and stay with Kay and her long time best friend Sandra Connor, and the tour guiding would begin. They showed their visitors the splendours of beautiful British Columbia, Expo 86', the Olympic games, fishing in Campbell River, helicopter flights over glaciers, cabin trips to Loon Lake, horseback riding at the base of Mount Baker or sunset dinners overlooking Belcarra or Gartley Beach. Through their travels Kay and Sandra brought people together and expanded their group of friends at each turn.

Kay's love of travel and sports did come second to one thing. She adored her family, and was thrilled with each new generation that came along. She was always excited to hear each detail of what we were up to or to share the tidbits from her latest adventure. Keeping contact with the clan was paramount to Kay. Cheering on each generation was a joy that all could see on Kay's face when she spoke of them. Be it a graduation, a new job, a baseball game, or a dance recital, Aunty Kay would be there buying tickets, clapping and smiling from the sidelines. When any of us moved to a new apartment or house, well we could count on Aunty Kay to be one of our first guests!

She travelled many roads, met many friends and touched all of our lives. We are better people for having known her.







February is Black History Month

Stories from The Archives As to Port Moody Streets
The Port Moody Gazette, Saturday Feb. 9th, 1881, pg. 2.
Researched By: Ralph Drew, Belcarra, BC

"One of the characteristics of Port Moody least agreeable to the stranger and intending settler — indeed the only natural characteristic which is likely to produce in him anything like a feeling of discouragement — is the immense mass of growing timber, and timber usually of an immense size, with which the ground is found to be originally covered. To a man who has lived in a prairie country, or is familiar only with the more lightly timbered forests of the Eastern Provinces, these British Columbian woods seem, at the first, quite appalling. But, after all, they are not nearly so bad as they look; and the plucky axeman and grubber, who attacks a track of this forest land in good earnest, will soon make short work of the timber standing upon it."

"Still, it must be admitted that the clearing off, grubbing, and grading of town lots and streets, after the standing timber has already been slashed and burnt over, is an expensive and troublesome operation. But, especially in town buildings, there is another view of the matter. In this almost frostless country, nobody ever thinks of excavating in order to lay deeply the foundations of a building, or to provide a frostproof cellar beneath it; so, there we dispense with one large outlay found quite indispensable in all building operations among all of our fellow subjects east of this Province; and a very large item of expense is thus saved; for these excavations not unfrequently cost as much as the whole superstructure raised above them.

It would be well then for distant strangers to be given to understand that for this elsewhere formidable outlay, there is no necessity whatever in any building operations here at Port Moody."

"There is another class of outlays ostensibly to be increased in building-up this town, and which are already being incurred, to some extent, which we nevertheless think might be largely ameliorated if not entirely avoided. The private and enterprising individuals who have undertaken to open-up streets adjacent to there own property, have, we see, commenced grubbing and grading such streets from the soil itself. Provision is being made for plank sidewalks, This, cannot but prove a very expensive, and — we cannot but think — a needlessly expensive process. Not only the sidewalks, but the whole roadway should be planked. If ever there was a country in the world where planked highways should be the rule, Port Moody is such a place. The soil itself is not good for street making. Where it is not clayey, it is quick-sandy, and it is nearly everywhere springy.

There is scarcely any dry gravel at all. Hence, the necessity for planked streets. Again, timber suited to street planking abounds here — so much so, indeed, that, at the present time, it is a nuisance. The time will soon come, however, we shall regret not having such supplies to fall back upon. As it is, it is a shame to waste this fine timber; and we should turn it to a useful account wherever we can. Hence, we should use up large quantities of it in planking our streets.

These planked streets can be made very much cheaper, very much more expeditiously, and very much better, than ever can be made by excavating and grading the soil. A little, portable, steam saw-mill, run up into the edge of the woods, almost anywhere hereabouts would now make planks enough to cover all of the streets of Port Moody. When these streets wear-out, let our successors — the future citizens of this then large and wealthy city — pave the streets if they feel so disposed. It is certain that no good and satisfactory highways can ever be made through this Port Moody soil."

New Fire Department Buildings

Sasamat Fire Department must build 2 new fire halls. Anmore and Belcarra have a long standing agreement to a 50:50 deal on assets and equipment. WCB REQUIRE new halls to be built. The halls must be brought up to earthquake standards.

Anmore is planning on building in approximately 2 years. They require a training room and sleeping quarters as they will have a paid fire chief and some full time paid firemen. Belcarra fire hall will not need those extras.

Will the same halls be built at the same cost or will Belcarra's cost less? If so the agreement is that each community will pay 50:50.

Belcarra will need to decide if they will levy a per property tax levy or sell road ends as needed. We are unable to go for any more loan money as we are maxed out.

The per property tax levy will affect EVERY property in the Village. The sale of some 5 or 6 upland road ends will only affect a FEW properties (nearest neighbors). The nearest neighbours will lose some conveniences for sure, however, they will not have the big tax levy that will otherwise be levied on all Village properties. There will be no loss of driveway access to properties as there are approximately 31 road ends to choose from.

The road ends are 66 feet wide and so 50 foot width would be sold and the


balance of 16 feet would be left for driveway access and trails. It seems to me that having a new neighbour will be worth the change and will save Villagers a great deal of money if there is a tax levy for each property.

There may be some discussion about splitting the fire department. We do not have enough volunteers to operate the fire department in Belcarra alone. We need to have the department for our household insurance costs. Without our Sasamat Fire Department we will lose our well trained and VERY NECESSARY FIRST HEALTH RESPONDERS.

BELCARRA DOES NOT HAVE THE NECESSARY RESERVES TO COVER THE MILLIONS OF DOLLARS THAT WILL BE OUR 50% SHARE FOR THE TWO NEW FIREHALLS.

As I see it there are only these 2 options. Which one is the least painful for ALL Villagers?





Slugs and Eggshells

Well here is a true gardener... Les wrote while in Kona (but on a stormy rain-soaked day of course)!

Eggshells are made up of Calcium 34%, Sodium 0.05%, Magnesium 0.3%, Phosphorus 0.04%, Potassium 0.03%, and 5% organic matter. These nutrients are useful to plants but slow to break down. We spread Dolomite Lime on our Vegetable garden for our plants' calcium needs, usually around February. We put our crushed eggshells in our compost bins along with our coffee grinds. We've read the coffee grinds are an aphrodisiac for the worms! Enough said about that... back to slugs. Some people say eggshells do not stop slugs. Our Veggie section, which is covered in our eggshell compost, has fewer slugs. We water early and again later when needed. We let the soil surface dry for the night time because "that is when the slugs really go to work". We keep the pathway grass and weeds cut very short. We are lucky to have many little snakes and ground beetles, which eat the slugs. Some birds help too!

Around March, when we notice that baby plants in our greenhouse are being eaten, we put a little slug bait down on the floor. The greenhouse is the only place we use slug bait, as we don't want the birds or animals eating it.







Nora also adds crushed eggshells to the worm bin instead. The eggshell trick may be a myth as experiments show that the slug's heavy mucus lets him slide right over sharp edges. Any trace of egg membrane actually attracts slugs! Nonetheless, clean eggshells and coffee grounds may still be a deterrent. Crush the shells into small "bits" and make the barrier wide, as slugs can stretch!

My personal "battle strategy" is to make "slug rings" around "slug favourite" plants. I use copper mesh (from Lee Valley) in conjunction with coffee grounds. This has been very successful in keeping slugs from decimating my new dahlia shoots and protecting "tasty hostas"!

Common online tips are: clear the area around your plants, keep a vigilant "slug patrol", water in the mornings, use pet safe slug bait, use barriers around sensitive plants as a deterrent, encourage predators, and grow plants they don't like.

Road and Related Safety

Much of Council's time during the last year was taken up by issues that were either centered on, or around, safety for our roads and pathways. This seemed appropriate and timely. Every member of Council exercised their opportunities in the run-up to the election, reminding the villagers of their commitment to safety for everyone, of all ages and of all abilities. There seemed to be a remarkable spirit rising amongst those holding office and amongst those hopeful for success in the October election. They had seen the future, and it appeared to be safer. After all, who would argue against greater safety for cyclists, joggers, walkers, runners, moms pushing baby strollers or those struggling with walking sticks after hip or knee surgery....and get elected?

No one spoke against greater safety. Inevitably however, issues of safety were often stacked against other persistent village and Council preoccupations. There was steep terrain, lack of roadway width, and a multitude of concerns ranging from distaste for speed bumps to driveways on village property. Oftentimes, both the elected and the hopeful found that deflecting safety discussions to funding concerns proved effective. It seemed safer to not dwell too long on safety.

During the summer months, there were opportunities to calm traffic along Bedwell Bay Road, especially at the Kelly Ave. to Main Ave. section. Council members were engaged to move forward on some transition towards traffic calming and pedestrian/crosswalk safety. Then urgency was put aside. Council eventually agreed to ask for an ICBC safety audit before considering any initiatives of their own. ICBC reported that there were safety problems. Council heard and approved a first step towards improvements. That was more than three months ago. There has been nothing since.

Late on November 26, 2022 a large tree fell from municipal property near the firehall, across Bedwell Bay Road, knocking out power, damaging utilities and damaging private property. Many local residents were without power for many hours. The roadway was completely blocked. Any residents living west of the tree fall were unable to exit the Village if needed, and any emergency vehicles coming from Port Moody were unable to access residents in the Belcarra Bay Road area. The alternate exit through the Regional Park and Tum-Tumay-Whueten Drive was not opened until the following morning. Village emergency staffing seemed absent until the following morning. This seems a failure in our emergency preparedness. And yes, this matter has not had any public discussion at Council. That was two months ago.

If you have concerns with public safety, timely reporting and improvements, speak to your Council.

Marry Me Chicken

Fall in love with Marry Me Chicken, a dish of tender sautéed chicken in a creamy sun-dried tomato sauce.

Servings: 4

Ingredients:

- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- Salt
- 1/4 teaspoon Freshly ground black pepper
- 4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts (about 11/4 lbs)
- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 small yellow onion, finely chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1/3 cup sun-dried tomatoes packed in oil, drained and finely chopped
- 2 teaspoons tomato paste
- ½ teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
- ¼ teaspoon sugar
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmigiano Reggiano or Pecorino Romano cheese
- 2 tablespoons fresh chopped basil, plus more for serving

- 1. Cut the chicken breasts in half horizontally and then pound them until they are between 1/8 and 1/4-inch thick.
- 2. Place the flour, ¾ teaspoon salt, and the black pepper in a ziplock bag and shake to combine. Add the chicken to the bag; seal the bag tightly and shake to coat the chicken evenly. Set aside.
- 3. Heat the oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. Place the flour-dusted chicken in the pan and cook, flipping once, until the chicken is lightly golden and just cooked through, about 3 minutes total. Transfer the chicken to a plate and set aside.
- 4. Reduce the heat to medium and add the onions to the skillet. Cook, stirring frequently, until softened and translucent, 2 to 3 minutes. Add the garlic and cook, stirring constantly, for 30 seconds more; do not brown. Add the cream, broth, sundried tomatoes, tomato paste, oregano, red pepper flakes, sugar, and 1/4 teaspoon salt; use a wooden spoon to scrape any brown bits from the pan into the liquid.
- 5. Bring the liquid to a boil, then reduce the heat to medium and gently boil, uncovered, until the sauce is thickened, about 5 minutes.
- 6. Stir in the Parmigiano Reggiano (or Pecorino Romano) and basil.
- 7. Add the chicken back to the pan, along with any juices that accumulated on the plate; reduce the heat to low and simmer until the chicken is warmed through and the sauce thickens a bit more, 1 to 2 minutes. Sprinkle with more fresh basil, if desired, and serve.

English poet Geoffrey Chaucer may have invented Valentine's Day From history.com

The medieval English poet Geoffrey Chaucer often took liberties with history, placing his poetic characters into fictitious historical contexts that he represented as real. No record exists of romantic celebrations on Valentine's Day prior to a poem Chaucer wrote around 1375. In his work "Parliament of Foules," he links a tradition of courtly love with the celebration of St. Valentine's feast day—an association that didn't exist until after his poem received widespread attention.

The poem refers to February 14 as the day birds (and humans) come together to find a mate. When Chaucer wrote, "For this was sent on Seynt Valentyne's day / Whan every foul cometh ther to choose his mate," he may have invented the holiday we know today.
