

These are the Council highlights since my last update.

### Council Meeting, March 6

Elizabeth Noble was recognized by Council for her recent success in gymnastics at the 2023 Canada Winter Games where she received BC's highest score and won a bronze medal. Elizabeth stands out for her kindness in recognizing individuals who helped her during the pandemic. Belcarra is proud of her achievements.

- Water Parcel Tax Amendment Bylaw No. 608


The motion passed on February 21 "That Council approve the quote submitted by ISL Engineering in the sum of \$19,515.00 plus applicable taxes for work relating to the 3700 block Marine Avenue Road rehabilitation" was reconsidered, and on reconsideration, was defeated.

Councillors Carolina Clark, Janet Ruzycki and Liisa Wilder attended a celebration on March 8 recognizing International Women's Day.

Belcarra is preparing to receive \$759,000 from the BC Growing Communities Fund to assist in meeting our unique local priorities. Premier David Eby announced on March 3, that "One billion dollars in new grants will be going to local governments in BC to help build community infrastructure and amenities to meet the demands of unprecedented population growth. Cities and towns need support to build thriving communities. The new growing communities fund will help local municipalities improve roads, build more arenas and water facilities and improve recreation options for families".

Council met with MLA Rick Glumac to acknowledge his efforts in assisting our Village. Happy to chat,

### What Is My Role?

Block watch is a free program operated by the Coquitlam RCMP Detachment to help prevent crime in your community.

Basically, your role is to be aware of what is going on in your area or neighbourhood.

You and your neighbours are committed to being watchful of each other's homes and look after one another.

Communicate with each other and be concerned about your neighbors' property as well as your own.

To immediately report any criminal or suspicious activity to the police and then to your Block Watch Captain

### What Is Block Watch?

Block Watch is a <u>free</u> program operated by the Coquitlam RCMP Detachment to help prevent crime in your community.

# How Does Block Watch Work?


Block Watch is a program of "neighbour helping neighbour".
Residents form a Block Watch group and create a communication network, through the use of a list of names, addresses, phone numbers and email addresses.

They make a commitment to watch out for each other's homes and to immediately report all criminal and suspicious activities to the police and also to each other.

They keep each other informed about neighbourhood incidents or other problems occurring on their street by providing this information to their Block Watch Captain.

### Who Can Join?

The Block Watch Program is not limited to residents of single family homes. Multi-family complexes can also form an effective and successful Block Watch by working together with their neighbours.



### What Is Required?

Each Block Watch group must have a minimum of 25 registered houses on their street and requires one Block Captain and at least one Co-Captain.

Depending on the size of some multifamily complexes, some additional Captains/Co-Captains may be needed. Each complex requires one Area Coordinator in addition to their Captain and Co-Captain and must have more than 50% of the units registered.

All Area Coordinators, Captains and Co-Captains must successfully undergo a security clearance by completing a Block Watch application.

A group registration form must be submitted, listing all of the group participants, including their first and last names, address, phone number and email.

There must be an active Captain and Co-Captain and a current Block Watch group membership list on file in order to qualify for any insurance discounts which may be available to Block Watch members and to have the Block Watch street sign remain.

# What Does Block Watch Provide?

- Crime prevention and home security information, decals, engravers, street signs and possibly an insurance discount
- Block Watch Fan Outs for crimes such as residential break and enters, including suspect descriptions.
- Crime Alerts providing information on crime trends/hot spots, personal safety, home security and crime prevention tips.
- How to properly recognize and report crime and suspicious activity to the police.
- Liaison between you and the police and other agencies and organizations.
- A greater sense of safety, enhanced awareness and community spirit.
- Making our communities safer, more inclusive, connected and stronger, one block at a time



### Block Watch Does <u>Not</u> Include

### X Patrolling Neighbourhoods

You are not required to, nor do we recommend you patrol your neighbourhood and potentially put yourself in danger.

### Chasing Burglars

This is the responsibility of the Police. All we ask is that you report suspicious persons and activities.

### X Attending Several Meetings

You are simply required to attend one small informal gathering or block party.

### X Reduced Privacy

Block Watch is about neighbours "watching out" for one another, not "watching" one another.

#### X Block Parents

Block Watch is not the same as Block Parents. These are two separate programs.

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### Stories From The Archives — Port Moody As An Arsenal

Researched By: Ralph Drew, Belcarra, BC, March 2023. Source: Port Moody Gazette, Sat., January 19th, 1884.

"We pointed-out the great future importance of Port Moody as the terminus of the greatest railway system on the continent, and its great value as the center of commerce on the Pacific frontiers of the Dominion; we now come to another great feature in its future progress, in its guise as an arsenal, where all the munitions of war, naval and military, will be stored — where the warships will be repaired and refitted and where troops and supplies will arrive from England for distribution on the Pacific."

"It would be difficult to find a more splendid site for a graving dock, large enough to receive the greatest iron-clad afloat, than the small cove on the North Arm [Indian Arm] known as Bedwell Bay. The whole outline of a graving dock has been formed by nature, and so far from excavation being required, the bottom of the dock would become a receptacle for debris from the sides which will be removed in placing the stone, in order to reduce the depth. An unlimited quantity of the finest granite is on the spot, so the cost of constructing a first-class dock would be less, probably, than any other place in the world."

"The Arm itself would contain an entire fleet, so that every branch of refitting, victualling and arming a squadron, could be carried-on at the same time. The entrance to the Arm is open at all seasons of the year, and at all times of the tide; it is undisturbed by any wind that blows, and could be defended against any possible attack.

Wood and water of the best quality are plentiful; splendid spars can be obtained when required. As a place for a naval depot, it has no superior, and we are much mistaken if this fact has not been duly chronicled at the Admiralty."

"The site chosen by Colonel Chambers for fortifications includes the bluff [Burnaby Mountain] at the mouth of the North Arm, which dominates the whole of the inlet, including Port Moody. Thus, from the ramparts at the fort, the whole of the Inlet and the North Arm can be overlooked, and every operation carefully noted. A site will be selected, no doubt, for the erection of extensive barracks, where troops arriving from Europe may be lodged before transfer to the troop ships or transports; as, also, for the reception of troops on their way home. As a sanitorium for soldiers from the East Indies, nothing could be better; the fine mild climate, with its pure bracing air, would be an excellent preparation for the homeward journey.

But in the case of precautionary measures for eventualities, where troops could be placed on ship-board in a few hours, it is without equal."

"The surroundings of Port Moody would have many attractions for military men; the fishing and shooting being both excellent.

For yachting or boat racing it is the very beau ideal, and the level plateau between the head of Port Moody and the Coquitlam [River] offers many splendid cricket fields or racecourses.

The presence of large numbers of commercial, naval and military gentlemen will, of course, create a gay city; theatres and opera houses will soon raise their stately heads as the rendezvous of beauty and fashion. The drives in every direction will throw Victoria into the shade, because the level country in the immediate vicinity of the mountains, will produce a coup d'œil [means a glance that takes in a comprehensive view] of surprising grandeur."

"Our readers but can dimly imagine the appearance of Port Moody in a few years hence; its port thronged with large steamers; its wharves covered with merchandise from every clime; its streets lined with magnificent stores, thronged with a gay and fashionable crowd; carriages rolling through the streets of the city, and in the business portion, crowds of great wagons carrying the merchandise from warehouse to wharf and wharf to warehouse. Amongst the residences, the spires and towers of churches, and in the center of the city, the great hotels and public institutions. It will be the center of commerce, from being the center of the telegraph system of the Dominion, on the Pacific; connection with every part of the world will be made from this city, because the Asiatic system will be united to the Dominion telegraph now stretching from the Eastern Provinces to the Rocky Mountains, and soon to be joined by the wires now being stretched from this city."



Newspaper in Your Garden

Newspaper has been used widely in vegetable gardens as mulch, as a natural weed killer, and even as potting cups. Newspaper is a biodegradable substance. The Nuffield Foundation, which focuses on science and social science, conducted an experiment with students which demonstrated how microbes in the soil break down materials. In short, soil microbes contain enzymes that easily break down and digest the cellulose in paper. During this process, carbon is released into the soil. Read more at:

Luckily, one of Les B.'s friends (Eric Herd) has over fifty years in the ink making industry, so they had a long chat on the subject. Although newspaper ink used to have toxic heavy metals such as lead and cadmium, since 1986 Canada switched to using canola oil and soybean oil. It seems that soy ink is not only environmentally friendly but makes great colours! The paper pulp is then whitened by hydrogen peroxide, which is more benign on the environment than chlorine.

ATTRA (Appropriate Technology Transfer for Rural Areas) guidelines for organic farmers include newspaper and cardboard as useful compost additives for suppressing weeds, retaining moisture, and adding organic matter to your soil. compost-1.pdf (ncat.org)

BTW, did you know that a "good compost" has a balance of "brown" and "green" materials? Brown materials add bulk, which helps with aeration. Brown includes: newspaper, wood chips, dry leaves, straw, sawdust, corn stalks. Green (may not always be green in colour) includes: grass clippings, coffee grounds, food scraps, weeds, manure.

Here are some questions about the possible environmental threats from the use of newspaper. \*Are the inks toxic? Inks, both black and colour, used on today's newspapers are 100% non-toxic. \*Are those glossy pages okay? No, not good. \*Is corrugated cardboard glue okay? No, again. Can newspaper be put into the compost? Yes, but must be shredded.



What else can you do with your newspapers? "The Spruce" lists 9 great ideas from kid-friendly seed starter pots from pulp to storing your frost-tender bulbs (Nora does this!).

### Letter to the Editor Apathy and Governance By John Snell

While the village gets used to life after Covid, it appears to be coming down with another equally alarming disorder.

There is no clinical diagnosis, but apathy, nonetheless is becoming widespread.

Fortunately there is a cure, but first one needs to understand the condition.

It is best described as a total lack of interest or concern, and being indifferent to what is going on (in the village). The urge to do something about it just isn't there. It's not a self-inflicted condition, but more a reaction to what most perceive as a total waste of time in getting involved and voicing an opinion. The exception to this is a core of caring long time residents.

Literally dozens of villagers have given their time as committee members on issues of importance; the Tree Committee, the Revenue Generation Committee and the Water Committee, to name just a few. The OCP committee is stalled by political antics.

Villagers have given up...what's the use...nothing is going to change...nothing gets done.

To say that many folks have become disenchanted with the governance of this village would be an understatement.

Governance can be defined as "The system by which entities, (VoB in this instance), are directed and controlled.

It is concerned with structure and processes for decision making, accountability, control and behaviour at the top of an entity".

Almost a year ago, villagers engaged in a "question and answer" fact finding initiative to aid in the preparation of an updated OCP.

Questions included, "What would you change?", "What should priorities be?", and "What detracts from the community?"

The answers highlighted the villager's widespread dissatisfaction, concern and condemnation with regard to "infrastructure and service", "emergency preparedness", "governance and policy" and "financial sustainability". Council and Works were given a failing grade and a pointer as to where improvements were needed and should be made.

Solutions might come from discussions stemming from a few simple questions, such as:

"Is it because council is prompted in council meeting agendas to receive reports and shelve them without necessarily moving to an action plan?"

"Is it because the Village lacks the engineering capability or resources to manage its infrastructure?"

"Is it because of the time consuming, costly and extensive use of outside consultants to advise and give guidance on even the simplest of projects?"

"Is it because the head of the municipality is being hampered in managing the administration of the village?"

Getting through to council is a challenge. Public correspondence is now subject to a censorship bylaw to the point that villagers are discouraged from going this route.

Zoom, which started out with an active "chat sidebar" and with "real time" public engagement has been phased out. There is no live engagement with council, other than by the physical attendance at council meetings. The attendees can be counted on one hand. Most questions are respectfully received and forwarded to staff. If you are one of a dozen or so villagers who watch council live on YouTube and have a question, send an email!

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The Village of Belcarra can only benefit from greater resident involvement.

The Mayor and CAO between them decide both the language and what items are to be on any council agenda. The four councillors are your street level conduit, and are well positioned to express and individually convey your opinions and wishes to council as a whole.

Letter to the Editor Pedestrian Safety By Klaus Bever

"Pedestrian crash survivability rises from 20% at 50 km/h to 90% at 30 km/h". This is a quote from a DriveSmartBC publication from February 2020 entitled: "Imposing a 30 km/h Speed Limit in Residential Areas". This is an achievable goal for Belcarra.

Before the driving/racing enthusiasts in Belcarra get their "knickers in a knot" over this modest proposal from our provincial government agency, let us explore some other obvious benefits to motorists. A lower speed within the village means improved gas consumption and prolonged battery life and less frequent charging. This is a painless reduction in carbon emissions and a clear benefit to the environment.

A lower speed on our roadways may reduce the need for some of the traffic calming measures now being considered following our recent ICBC road safety audit. This may reduce some taxes.

A lower speed on our roads would be a kind and respectful recognition of the many villagers that use them to get their mail, take the bus, walk their dogs, cycle for exercise or visit their neighbours. These roadways are, in many places, the only pathways available to pedestrians.

In British Columbia in 2019, on roadways shared by pedestrians and vehicles, 2,400 pedestrians were injured and 49 were killed (<a href="https://www.drivesmartbc.ca/pedestrians/pedestrians-highway">https://www.drivesmartbc.ca/pedestrians/pedestrians-highway</a>).

A speed reduction to 30 km/h for now, can be accomplished relatively easily, quickly, and inexpensively. This could be done while we continue to explore and develop a sidewalk or shoulder pathway system that completely separates pedestrians from vehicles. A pathway dedicated to the safe movement of all pedestrians of all ages and all abilities, is the goal.






