

Mayor's Report

October, autumn in Belcarra, when gardeners are busy preparing for the coming spring, our boats come out of the water, birds head south, our resident winemakers are pressing grapes, and our resident bears prepare for hibernation.

On the advice of counsel, the public hearing for the Official Community Plan, (OCP) which had been scheduled for October 11, was cancelled. Adjustments will be made and a new public hearing will be scheduled as soon as possible.

Council introduced a plan to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of Council meetings. Public contributions to Council will be welcome once at the beginning and again near the end of the meeting. As well, Council has adopted a policy on how to effectively manage correspondence to Council. These procedural changes reflect current practice in other BC municipalities.

Here are the Council meeting highlights since my last update.

Council Meeting, October 10, 2023

Ken Bjorgaard reported on budget variance to September 30,2023.

Paul Richardson reported on quarterly department activities.

Stewart Novak introduced the WSP engineering report on the Tatlow and Dutchman Creek reservoirs (tanks). Recommendations from the report were approved by Council.

Amanda Siebert advanced Council Procedure Bylaw No. 617, 2023 to a second reading. Council adopted the Village of Belcarra Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Bylaw No. 616, 2023. Correspondence was provided to the Village of Anmore regarding the Sasamat Volunteer Fire Department.

Council Meeting, October 23, 2023

A presentation by EComm was made regarding emergency notification services.

Council approved a recommendation to subscribe to the Alertable Notification System.

Following an amendment, Council accepted Procedure Bylaw No. 617, 2023 for a third reading.

During November, we take time to remember those who have served our community and our country in support of democracy and freedom everywhere — and those who have fallen in service for all of us. 

Lest We Forget

Sasamat Volunteer Fire Department (SVFD) Board of Trustees

Special Meeting

A special meeting of the SVFD Board of Trustees was held at the Anmore Fire Hall on October 26. Attending were the Chair Darrell Penner (Metro Vancouver Board); Mayor John McEwen, Councillor Kim Trowbridge, and Councillor Paul Weverink from Anmore; and Mayor Jamie Ross, Councillor Carolina Clark, and Councillor Liisa Wilder from Belcarra.

The following motion was carried unanimously by the Board.

That the SVFD Board of Trustees:

- 1. approve a construction manager at risk procurement approach as presented in the report dated October 25, 2023 titled "Sasamat Volunteer Fire Department Facilities Replacement";
- 2. release \$500,000 from the SVFD's Capital Facility Reserve Fund to help fund preliminary design for the replacement of the two fire halls; and
- 3. direct staff to make efforts to obtain appropriate financing for the construction of two fire halls to allow for the procurement process to commence.

As Bill Duvall, the Director of Corporate Safety, Security, and Emergency Management for Metro Vancouver said, we "are at the potential start of a multi-year process".

The SVFD is an essential service for the safety and well-being of Anmore and Belcarra residents. Established in 1977, entirely with volunteer members, it has grown to over 40 volunteers including a fire chief and two deputy fire chiefs. The Department responded to an average of 77 call outs per year from 2011-2020. In 2021 there were 119 call outs and 121 in 2022.

In April 2018, the Board received a Condition and Needs Assessment completed by Johnston Davidson. The report found that the fire halls do not meet BC Building Code, have limited physical space, lack personal protective equipment storage, and do not have enough washrooms.

The "Sasamat Volunteer Fire Department Facilities Replacement" report identifies the minimum requirements of the future new fire halls as determined by the SVFD Fire Chief, the deputy fire chiefs, and staff from Metro Vancouver.

For the Belcarra fire hall, minimum requirements include three vehicle bays with exhaust management, a decontamination area, gear storage and drying area, laundry and decontamination, an emergency generator, and fuel storage. Chief Jay Sharpe indicated that most of these items are to meet WorkSafe BC requirements. New considerations include accommodations for three crew members, which may help future recruitment.

The "Sasamat Volunteer Fire Department Facilities Replacement" report provides a projected cost estimate of \$7.4 million for each hall. The projected costs are based on the construction costs of the new Bowen Island fire hall.

The next SFVD Board of Trustees Meeting is planned for early 2024.





Obituary

Joachim Werner Ludwig Otto GLOEDE

April 2, 1935 – October 10, 2023

Joachim "Joe" Gloede was a 46-year resident of Belcarra. He passed away peacefully at home on October 10. He leaves Juliana (Julie), his loving wife of 61 years.

Born in his grandparents' home in Putlitz, East Germany to Werner and Elizabeth Gloede, Joe had a wonderful childhood with his two brothers.

He apprenticed as an electrician and began his lifelong career in electronics at the Standard Elektrik Lorenz factory in Stuttgart where 6,000 people worked.

He met 19-year-old Juliana Juri at work, and it was love at first sight. The couple married on October 19, 1962, and moved to Vancouver six years later. They stayed one year with Julie's sister in Burquitlam and then bought their first house in Port Coquitlam in 1969.

They discovered Belcarra while visiting friends and bought their lot on Bedwell Bay Road at the entrance to the village in 1976. Joe and Julie were employed in the local electronics industry and did a lot of the work on their new home while it was under construction.

Joe and Julie loved their home, spending time in the greenhouse and tending their beautiful gardens. Joe was very skilled and inventive. He enjoyed woodworking and problem solving and was often lending a helping hand to friends, neighbours and family.

Joe retired at the age of 65. He always had a project going on in his workshop which included building his own furniture and designing an electric hoist to simplify the winemaking he and Julie enjoyed. As an avid reader, Joe would devour the latest issue of Der Spiegel magazine while keeping up with televised local and international news.

Joe will be greatly missed by his loving wife Julie, brother Owe, extended family and friends in Canada and Europe, and his neighbours in Belcarra who meant so much to him.

Stories From The Archives Our Terminus

Researched by: Ralph Drew, Belcarra, BC, October 2023.

Source: Mainland Guardian, Wednesday, April 13th, 1881.

"We have endeavoured for a long time to stirup amongst our [New Westminster] citizens a more general interest in the location of Port Moody as a salt-water terminus of the Canadian Pacific Railway, but, by some strange perversity in human nature, quite a number of them view the selection of Port Moody with absolute suspicion, if not with strong dislike."

"We shall be told that human beings are children no matter how long they have been in the world; that infants unconsciously reject the food that their nurses are industriously thrusting into their mouths, without which they would certainly die. Now, however incredulous some people may be, it is nevertheless the actual truth, that if Port Moody was not adopted as the salt-water terminus of the railway, this city would fade and sink into a very insignificant place.

People here, if they would pay more attention to their own interests, should know that this city [New Westminster] will be the main terminus — the city terminus — and that Port Moody will be the commercial terminus.

It can be readily understood that construction to this city will not be entered upon for some years yet, because the chief object in obtaining a deep-water connection with the railway in order to obtain supplies at all periods of the year, will become of the greatest importance as the work extends and the number of men employed, increases."

"Nothing more clearly points to this view of this case than Mr. Onderdonk's statement to the reporter in Portland [Oregon]. Mr. Onderdonk was under the impression that the winters in this country [British Columbia]; and particularly in the canyons, were so severe, that outdoor or even tunnel work, would be impossible — at least occasionally.

But he was agreeably disappointed to find that during one of our severe winters he might have kept a large number of men at work profitably, a course which he will certainly adopt next winter, so that it is highly probable that a very large quantity of materials and supplies will be sent up the [Fraser] river [from New Westminster] during the coming summer."

"In a former article we pointed-out the fact that one-third less than the sum calculated upon, will be amply sufficient to construct the 90 miles from here to Yale, and that consequently, the character of the work must be of the very simplest kind.

It would not, under these circumstances, be at all surprising that efforts should be made to induce the Dominion Government to give out the contracts, and it is even asserted that the chief reason for Mr. Onderdonk's visit to the east was to interview the Government at Ottawa on this very subject."

"Our readers will now see how very important that our citizens should manage, in some way, to secure the construction of a good road [North Road] to what will be the very center of action and business — perhaps a few months hence. It seems almost incredible that and 'enemy in the camp' should recommend the adoption of Coal Harbour and English Bay for the terminus, which, if it was possible of attainment, would inevitably destroy this city by diverting the entire trade to Victoria. Is it any wonder that Victorians are largely interested in the adoption of Coal Harbour, English Bay and False Creek, for the terminus? Can our people not comprehend that if Coal Harbour was adopted, that every particle of supplies would come from Victoria, to the entire exclusion of mainland produce and mainland producers?"



"It is, however, fortunately beyond the power of anyone to divert the trade from us; Port Moody will be the terminus until our own is constructed in this city, meanwhile, Coal Harbour will be utilized for what it is intended by Nature — a village where the herring fishery will by-and-by assume considerably dimensions, and where population interested in this industry will rapidly accumulate.

It is now placed beyond doubt that the extraction of oil from herring is a most remunerative business, and we have been assured that it will be largely developed ere long. Capital, we are told, is ready, and it is quite within the scope of possibility that this summer will see extensive buildings erected for herring oil works. Our terminus will be constructed in due course of time."

Where the birds all sing and the flowers bloom. What have you seen in your garden lately?

The end is near for flowers in the garden with a clump of Michaelmas daisies making an appearance and the last of the standard rose buds suffering the current rainy weather, but then the weigela made a fourth blooming, now leaving only the conical hydrangea and sedum 'Autumn Joy' showing colour. Sure, the leaves of trees and climbers are also providing colour, particularly the Kiwi vine and Virginia creeper and not to mention the cedar scales. Geraniums have now been transported back to the sunroom for winter to join the resident house plants. Apples were in abundance this year with the total supply going to the food bank topping 55 gallons.

One last cutting of the grass now allows the start of fall clean up and compost making and possibly a start to apple tree pruning not done last year.

Doing a bird count each day, one notes the regular appearance of Steller's jays, juncos, spotted towhees, black-cap chickadees, song sparrows, house finches, crows, glaucouswinged gulls, and the brief glimpse of an Anna's hummer. Although I say at a brief glance, I was entertained recently by the hummer doing several of its spectacular 'J' dances which I had only seen before in the spring. Mentioning the remarkable flight of birds, I am always amazed at the jays flying at tremendous speed from 70 or so metres away, only to put on full flaps and land quite easily on the deck railing.

Mind you, watching the birds feeding provides many opportunities to observe the dexterous moves of all species.

With fall upon us the chances are slim that you will see a bear in its underwear.







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Light Pollution and Migrating Birds

The arrival of fall brings many transformations! Looking up to the skies, we see those tell-tale "V shape" flocks of birds heading south. The "Pacific Flyway" is a major migratory route, 15,000 km (9,000 miles) extending from Alaska to Patagonia. This month Les was inspired to collect information on migrating birds and see how they are affected by lights at night.

Migratory restlessness to start a move south, is cued in birds by the shortening of daylight hours. Birds, influenced by Photoperiod (change in daylight), are known as "Obligate Migrants". The other type of migrating birds are known as "Facultative Migrants". These birds' migration is caused by conditions — especially food supplies — and they migrate for survival's sake.

At the peak date, September 17, more than nine million birds flew south overnight, (mostly from BC). "Amazing," Les thought.

Then he asked himself, "How do they know this?", and looked it up. It seems that for the last 23 years, bird movements in the atmosphere have been detected by the US NEXRAD weather surveillance network. Les had to say, "Outstanding!"

Many birds migrate at night using the stars and constellations to find their way. Unfortunately, light pollution is making it increasingly difficult for birds to navigate. Additionally, they can be attracted to and disoriented by ALAN (artificial light at night), and may even start their migration too early. Experts recommend we reduce our lighting from mid-September to mid-October. Portland and Toronto are ahead of the game in that they issue a "Lights Out" warning for this time period. We think Vancouver and the Fraser Valley need to do the same.

You might wonder if this is an over-reaction. Consider this: on October 12, 2023, one thousand birds died, during an apparent collision with the McCormick Place Lakeside Center in Chicago! The lights at McCormick Place were left on after hours to accommodate an event. The Washington Post reported there were warblers, woodcocks and sapsuckers among the species of dead songbirds. Chicago actually has a "Lights Out" program to combat bird strikes; too bad this building did not follow it.

So folks, please help the migrating birds next year in September and October. Try to reduce your lighting to help our feathered friends.

Belcarra South Cottages Repeal of Heritage Designation

On October 10, 2023, Port Moody Council agreed to begin the process of repealing the heritage designation of six cottages situated within təmtəmíxwtən/Belcarra Regional Park (Belcarra South). The Bole House, the seventh cottage, is not included in the repeal.

Background

In April 2015, Port Moody Council adopted a bylaw to designate six of the Belcarra South Cottages as protected heritage property.

In February 2020, Tsleil-Waututh Nation and Metro Vancouver signed the *Belcarra Regional Park Cultural Planning and Co-operation Agreement* and renamed the park təmtəmíxwtən/Belcarra Regional Park.

In March 2023, Tsleil-Waututh Nation requested Port Moody rescind the protection of the cottages under the heritage designation bylaw in recognition of the environmental and cultural importance of the area.

Tsleil-Waututh Nation Statements

The Park was the first home of the Tsleil-Waututh Nation's largest ancestral village, təmtəmíxwtən

They have strong, ongoing cultural ties to this area.

They were not consulted when the cottages were first built nor when the heritage designation bylaw was adopted.

The state of disrepair of the cottages poses ongoing risks to the cultural, environmental and archaeological heritage along the foreshore.

Restoration of the area will improve the environmental and cultural health of temtemíxwten and provide additional access to these areas for the Tsleil-Waututh community and all park visitors.

Next Steps

Before the heritage designation bylaw can be repealed, a public hearing will be held.

I certainly agree that Belcarra should maintain a mutually respectful relationship between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal peoples. I also recognize that Belcarra is on land that was, in the past, an area which was a territory of the Tsleil-Waututh peoples ... that was then ... this is now. It is no longer their territory and has not been for many, many years. I own my property and pay taxes to my present government and have no responsibility to any First Nations group.

I have read a portion of the OCP and I am very distressed and concerned about numerous items.

Is this the draft that the Village OCP committee put forward or is this an extremely altered draft that was changed greatly after the committee were dismissed?

The Regional Growth Strategy (RGS) presented by Metro Vancouver and adopted by Belcarra Council by Resolution on June 20, 2022, in my opinion does not fit with Belcarra community.

This RGS will make us vulnerable to the First Nations approval of any decisions within our community.

On page 12 there is a statement about dealing with First Nations on a government to government level. It is my understanding that First Nations have declared that they are not Canadians and are not answerable to my government so why are Metro Vancouver and my own Village Council agreeing to act and consult with First Nations on everything? There is also a vague reference to "First Nations proposed projects within the Village of Belcarra boundaries". What does this mean? I am concerned that this may leave our small community vulnerable to a project that we Villagers will have no authority over. Why would we approve such a vague proposal of a First Nations project? This is only one of many subjects in this proposed draft of the Village OCP that I am concerned about and questioning.

I do not approve with or agree that the First Nations should act in any way as my government and my Village government should not agree to this as written agreement in our OCP.
