#### MAYOR'S REPORT

Happy New Year, everyone!

What a mix of weather we have had — mild temperatures and sunshine; then dry, chilly Arctic air with snow; and now, mild, and rainy. Our spring bulbs which were moving along quickly — now seem to be hesitating.

The CRAB Santa Ships and Light Show put on by many volunteers were enjoyed by Belcarra residents and the many visitors who joined us from neighbouring communities. They just kept arriving! The good planning work done by the CRAB leadership, supported by one of our RCMP officers, Metro Parks, and our crew that put on the light show made for a unique and special night.

Here are the Council meeting highlights since my last update.

#### Council Meeting, January 22, 2024

Following a presentation by leadership students from School District 43 and their counsellor Harriette Chang, Council declared February 11-17 "Real Acts of Caring Week" in the Village of Belcarra.

Council provided a grant in the amount of \$353 to the Communities Embracing Restorative Action (CERA) for support of the Community Youth Justice Program for 2023.

Ken Bjorgaard, Financial Consultant to Belcarra, reported on 2023 projects to be re-budgeted in 2024 and unspent 2023 budgets to be carried forward and included in the Village of Belcarra 2024-2028 Financial Plan Bylaw. These included General Operating, General Capital, and Water Capital projects.

Stewart Novak, Public Works, provided information and recommendations on the following topics:

 Work carried out by the Invasive Species Council of Metro Vancouver • Report of Marine Avenue road repair provided by EXP Technical Services.

Council passed the following motion:

That Marine Avenue road depressions be repaired in accordance with Item 4.2 Option 1 – Asphalt Removal and Replacement with Added Granular Base Layer from the report provided by EXP Geotechnical Services dated December 13, 2023; and

That the entire roadway between the 3960 block cul-de-sac to 3700 block of Marine Avenue be repaved at the total cost of \$250,410.60 (including a 20% contingency); and further,

That the draft 2024 budget be amended accordingly.

Council accepted recommendations from Sartaj Grewal, Building Official, regarding Water Service Connection — Fire Sprinkler Systems Only.

Council accepted recommendations from Amanda Seibert, Corporate Officer, regarding The Village of Belcarra Blasting and Rock-Breaking Regulation Bylaw No. 619 (third reading) and The Village of Belcarra Fees and Charging Bylaw No. 517, 2018 Amendment Bylaw No. 622, 2024 (first, second, and third readings).

Council provided third reading of The Village of Belcarra Council Indemnity Bylaw No. 620, 2023.

Paul Richardson (CAO) notified Council that first reading of the Official Community Plan (OCP) Bylaw will be further delayed pending the current roll-out of the Provincial Housing Legislation.

Our CAO received notice that by the end of January 2024 Belcarra will receive \$153,143 from the \$51 million capacity fund for local government. The capacity fund is to support activities or projects local governments must undertake to meet new legislative requirements related to supporting housing initiatives, including updates on zoning bylaws and the OCP. Further information will be provided by our CAO as she receives it.



### Sasamat Fire Department Has a New Truck!

If you see something big, black, and red with flashing lights cruising your neighbourhood, it's all good. Say "Hello" to Sasamat Fire Department's new fire engine! This is Engine 3 or, as it is fondly known by our members, "The Beast". You will understand this nickname when you finally get to see this important piece of firefighting apparatus up close. This new firefighting truck will complement our other Engine (Engine 1) and our Ladder Truck (Ladder 7).

Engine 3 was delivered to the department in December and is replacing the original Engine 3, a 1996 GMC pumper truck.

The new Engine 3 was built by HUB Fire Engines in Abbotsford at a total cost of \$599,500. It may sound like a lot of money, but in terms of a new fire engine, it was a bargain for taxpayers. Incorporating a commercial chassis, as opposed to custom chassis (which is the standard chassis for most urban/suburban departments), the department saved approximately \$200,000.

Now you're probably wondering what you get for that amount of money. So here are some other details we want you to know:

- Chassis: 2022 International, four-wheel drive.
- Length: 31 feet 8 inches.



- Height: 11 feet.
- Power: Cummins L9 400 horsepower.
- The truck carries five firefighters.
- Water supply: the tank holds 800 Imperial gallons (IG). Most municipal fire engines carry 300 IG.
- Pumping capacity: 1750 Imperial gallons per minute (IGPM).
- Foam tank: 20 IG.
- Also included: five SCBAs (Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus), eight air bottles, and 2400 feet of various hoses.

The new Engine 3 was built to meet all current regulatory standards. This means that it has more features to keep firefighters safe. It also means that the mechanical features make it very fuel efficient with much lower exhaust emissions than our older Engine 3. The four-wheel drive feature gives us more capability to attend emergencies in challenging conditions such as deep snow, steep icy hills or unpaved roads; as found en route to Farrer Cove or the BC Hydro roads around Buntzen Lake. The higher clearance ensures that the truck won't impact the roadway when entering or exiting steep driveways.

Over the past several weeks, our members have been familiarizing themselves with the new arrival. Training and orientation will continue over the next few weeks until everyone is comfortable and confident in their ability to operate all aspects of the Engine. Once training is complete, the Engine will be situated at the Belcarra Firehall.



# Thank you to Belcarra By Bruce Drake



Diana and I arrived here in 1975 and we spent 48 of our 49 years of marriage in Belcarra. Diana loved the setting amidst 'Forest and Sea'. As someone who worked in downtown Vancouver, I was rather more ambivalent but was at least wise enough to recognize that her judgement on the matter was likely far better than mine. As usual, she was right.

While Diana saw a Village offering solitude, natural beauty, and the opportunity to live within nature, I objected that it rained a lot. It was pointed out to me that we were living in a rain forest and it was that rain that brought life to Belcarra's spectacular woodlands. Like most Belcarrans I would soon learn the calm and relief that came as one entered the forested approach to our Village.

Belcarra proved to be the perfect environment to raise children who would find pleasure in outdoor activities and develop a deep appreciation for nature. The relative isolation also lent itself to independence, reading, and introspection (not to mention very regular duty as a taxi service).

Diana appreciated all the volunteering done by residents ranging from gardening to CRAB, the Barnacle, Blockwatch, SVFD, and Council engagement. She enjoyed assisting with preparing the Hall for CRAB events; working to make Belcarra Days memorable, and designing unique seasonal displays for our Village entrance sign. When COVID put a stop to travel, Diana took the time to apply her remarkable imagination to writing a pair of children's adventure books based on Indian Arm with a female protagonist with First Nations ancestry. While the research was thorough, it was her love of the local waters and Belcarra itself that animated the stories and brought them to life.

She completed publication of the first volume and handled its initial promotion just prior to her cancer diagnosis in early 2023. At the same time our youngest grandchild, Sammy, was diagnosed with an inoperable cancer of the brain stem. They would pass within a few weeks of one another some 8-9 months later.

Diana loved literature, stories, imagination, and her privacy. Our family respected her wish for no public ceremony and invited only the immediate family to the spreading of her ashes in the ocean and in a few spots on the trails she loved to walk.

I want to sincerely thank her many friends for their understanding. While our family remains devastated by our losses, we have also been appreciative of the unfailing kindness and understanding shown by all of our Belcarra neighbours. It is a reminder, once more, of Diana's wisdom in choosing this community.

We will always remember Diana and Sammy, particularly when enjoying Belcarra's natural beauty, be it in sunshine or the 'gentle rain' which we occasionally encounter.



It's a Win for Team Salty Science!

If you have read the last issue of The Barnacle, looked at the Belcarra Facebook group, or noticed the sign on the way into the village within the past month, you've likely learned of Salty Science, the team of four marine scientists who set out to row across the Atlantic Ocean this past December. We're pleased to share that 38 days, 18 hours, and 56 minutes later, this great oar-deal is over and Salty Science have crossed the finish line as the winning women's team!

Belcarra's own Isabelle Côté was one of the four women marine biologists participating in the World's Toughest Row - 5000 km unsupported from the Canary Islands to the Caribbean - to raise money for marine conservation and education. The women started rowing only two years ago, though they had extensive marine experience and athletic backgrounds.

Amid considerable fanfare, a total of 38 boats left La Gomera on December 13 heading southwest, just as Christopher Columbus did 500 years ago. Chris, however, was not in a 28 foot ocean rowing boat named Emma!

The first two weeks were rough for Isabelle and Salty Science. First, it was seasickness, then towering waves crashing on the boat broke an oar and bent an oarlock, rendering one of their three rowing stations unusable. Days later, the water maker compartment flooded, frying the electrics. Teammate Lauren Shea magically rebuilt the electrical control box and replaced the pump, and Salty Science was back in business! The four days that it took to fix the water maker were incredibly physically taxing as the team had to hand-pump over ten litres of water per day. The upside is that Emma proved to be a most reliable vessel that simply refused to capsize.

As the seas eventually calmed and winds became more favourable, the team found themselves neck-and-neck with There She Rows, a UK team who had been leading the women's class from the start. The two teams then swapped the lead back and forth for the remainder of the crossing, generating lots of excitement among those following the race.

Naturally, the four marine biologists geeked out over the wildlife they encountered at sea. The team saw whales, dolphins, and sea birds, but had no idea they would be bombarded by kamikaze flying fish every night. They also didn't expect to be escorted nightly by schools of large tuna, or to have their rudder bumped repeatedly by a shark.

By the final week of the race it was still a tossup which women's team would finish first. But heavy seas pushing westward favoured Salty Science, who gradually stretched their lead to 50 nautical miles in the final days. On January 20 at about 11:30 pm local time, Salty Science reached the finish line at the historic Nelson's Dockyard in Antigua. Amid much cheering from friends, family, and onlookers, they pulled up to the dock, where they saw people and dry land for the first time in over a month. They wobbled onto the podium to accept their trophy, while the whole event was livestreamed. The next day, the team returned to the dock for an emotional welcome to There She Rows as they made their finish.

As we write this from Antigua, three days after the finish, Isabelle is only just becoming able to walk unassisted. Her legs are fine and her balance is returning slowly. Apart from that, the most noticeable differences are her very deep tan and weight loss, par for the course even though food on the boat was plentiful.

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#### **Stories From The Archives**

The Refusal of the Act of Incorporation to Port Moody

Source: Mainland Guardian, Wednesday, June 6th, 1883.

Researched by Ralph Drew, Belcarra, BC, January 2024.

"We had the privilege of looking at a letter signed by the Attorney-General [John Roland Hett] addressed to the persons interested, stating that the incorporation of Port Moody had been refused. No reason was adduced; the applicants were treated like a parcel of mendicants [beggars] who may be kicked from the door without rhyme or reason. The odd part of the matter is that the Attorney-General should have written to notify the applicants of the refusal of their request; the matter has no connection to the Attorney-Generals department, but of this more anon [shortly]."

"The matter, if we are not egregiously mistaken, belongs to the Provincial Secretary's department, and the Provincial Secretary [John] Robson, MLA, New Westminster District] is one of the 'Coal Harbour Ring', and of course, opposed anything connected to Port Moody. It would therefore appear that he had made a kind of 'cat's paw' [a person who is used by another to carry-out an unpleasant task] of the Attorney-General. If the Provincial Secretary, the Attorney-General and the rest of their colleagues think they can deprive the residents of Port Moody of their privileges as citizens, they are very much mistaken. The paltry pettyfogging [to argue over small, unimportant issues] pleas of these so-called ministers, who wreak their spite on citizens and property holders, who neither know nor care anything about them, because some persons politically opposed to them are interested, cannot be permitted for a moment. It may suit the purposes of the Provincial Secretary to play his game behind the Attorney-General

"That His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor [Clement Francis Cornwall] refused a charter to the would-be municipality, knowing the facts of the case, we do not believe.

That statements may have been made to him by one or two interested persons whom he is in duty bound to believe, we are inclined to think. One of these low cunning tricks, only likely to occur to a mind like that of 'Honest John' [Provincial Secretary John Robson] was, we are told, perpetuated in order to create some excuse for refusing the charter."

"A person was despatched on Dominion Day to count the actual residents of Port Moody. Almost everybody and his wife were in this city, demonstrating their loyalty to the great Dominion. Now, there is very little doubt that the report of this person was laid before the Lieutenant-Governor, and presentations made to impress certain baseless objections to granting the charter. The whole affair, we learn, is to be thoroughly investigated, and such an exposure will be made as will probably bring about the removal of all the obstacles to incorporation. That a charter will be obtained, no one need have a shadow of a doubt, and probably the refusal of the charter may tend to do good, as it may rid the country of a Government that is a disgrace and a danger to it."

#### After Note:

In 1883, several members of the B.C. Cabinet were denounced as part of the "Coal Harbour Ring," speculators who benefited privately from the relocation of the C.P.R. terminus from Port Moody to Coal Harbour in Vancouver. It was later concluded from documents of that period that the province's land grant to the C.P.R. represented a windfall for the company: the C.P.R. had secured land to cover the cost of an extension that it would have had to build in any case. The 'Port Moody Gazette' (Responsible Government, Saturday, November 15th, 1884, page 2) put it even stronger: "Port Moody must be ... crushed if possible, in order that the market might be created for the Provincial Secretary's land"



In a previous issue I noted that the science and art of wine is ever evolving and then I read an article that ABC does not apply anymore. ABC you ask? Anything but Chardonnay! There was a period when this wine tasted more of oak than wine and it turned many people away from trying a wine that can be a superb tipple. I recall that the Australians were guilty of this evolution. Some of us in our wine club have made Chardonnay on a regular basis and the crème de la crème is produced from grapes grown by Sangiacomo Vineyard on the Sonoma Coast, California. If you find a bottle labelled made with grapes from Sangiacomo Vineyard treat yourself. On a US website I found a 2011 vintage by Sojourn at \$45.00 and a 2010 by Ten Acre for \$48.00. Chardonnay in Bordeaux is called Chablis and is available in some local stores.

Great Wine News magazine had a book review on "Why You Like the Wines You Like" by Master of Wine, Tim Hanni, reinforcing what I quoted in last month's article.

It is humorous, down to earth, and apparently considered a revolutionary, myth-busting approach to wine and food enjoyment, based on the latest palatal and consumer research.

Also last month I mentioned Malbec as a wine to try at a very reasonable price. Well, now there will be a World Malbec Day to be held on April 17 with various functions being held in many countries. The London venue has already been sold out.

Have you ever heard of wine called Saperavi? Apparently, it has been made in The Republic of Georgia and some 50 year old examples have been uncovered that were made during the Soviet era. It is very dark skinned with red pulp and makes an intensely deep coloured, high acid, strong flavoured wine. This wine will enhance the colour of Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot grown in the warmer climates. The Australians are into growing this grape and expect to produce some very good wine over the next few years.



### Buzz Aldrin, What Happened to You in All the Confusion? by Johan Harstad


This book is a puzzle - how could anything so simple, set mostly in the barren Faroe Islands,



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#### Goldeneyes on the Inlet - by Colleen MacDonald



Common goldeneye male

What are those black and white ducks we see in large groups on the inlet?

#### ... They're **goldeneyes**!

Named for their bright yellow eyes, the goldeneye ducks winter on ice-free inlets and coves along the Pacific Coast from BC to California.

There are two species of goldeneyes:

- Common goldeneye (Bucephala clangula) identified by the white circle below its eye
- Barrow's goldeneye (Bucephala islandica) which has a crescent moon patch below its eye. These are the goldeneyes we see wintering on səlilwət/Indian Arm.

On an interesting note, bird names are changing to eliminate eponymous names. I'm curious to know what the Barrow's goldeneye will be officially called. For more information on bird names, visit <a href="https://bit.ly/3Oapc5L">https://bit.ly/3Oapc5L</a>

Goldeneyes are medium-sized diving sea ducks, 40-50 cm long and weigh one kilogram. Males are black with white markings and they have orange feet. Females and juvenile males have brown heads and gray bodies, and their legs and feet are yellow.

The females' gray beak turns a pale yelloworange during spring.

Goldeneyes are diving ducks. They usually dive in shallow bays -- about 3 meters but they can dive as deep as 6 meters or more.

Along their coastal wintering grounds, goldeneyes feed on barnacles, mussels, sea stars and crabs. At Whiskey Cove we enjoy watching the goldeneyes clustering around docks, cleaning off mussels and watching them dive under the clear water to eat the barnacles on the rocky shore. 
The goldeneyes make hoarse croaking sounds -- krawk -- as they cluster along the rocky shore and around docks. They are sometimes called Whistlers because their fast wingbeat makes a loud whistling sound in flight.

On the inlet the ducks form large groups called rafts. One day I counted over a hundred goldeneyes gathered together. Eagles and hawks are the ducks' predators on the inlet.

Other wintering diving ducks found on Indian Arm include surf scoters, buffleheads, Harlequin duck, grebes, loons, and mergansers.

#### **Do Wind Turbines Kill Birds?**

This month Les was intrigued by the question, "Do Wind Turbines kill birds (and bats)?" As the world explores renewable options for energy sources, it is vital to also consider side effects to Mother Nature. Although the answer was "Yes", Les found out that this is only a fraction of those killed by house cats, collisions with buildings and cell phone towers, or even the fossil fuel operations that wind farms replace. The scary part here is that this number is in the billions per year! Migration times are, of course, the most disastrous.

Wind power is a provider of clean, cheap zero carbon electricity and about 96% of a wind turbine is made from recyclable materials. The goal is to make them 100% from recyclable products and to use the Fibreglass as a key component in the production of cement. Wind Turbines are very expensive, typically \$1.3 million per megawatt (MW). One MW can power approximately 1000 homes for a month.


Most onshore commercial Wind Turbines have a capacity of two to three MW, but offshore Turbines can be 16 to 18 MWs. Turbine blade tip speeds range from 120 to 180 miles per hour which is disastrous for birds and bats.

Engineers and Scientists around the world have been investigating different ways to make Wind Turbines safer for wildlife. One interesting nine-year study, at Norway's Smola Wind Farm, found that painting one wind turbine blade black decreased bird deaths by 70%. It's not a simple solution; however, as US Federal Aviation Administration standards require turbines to be painted white or grey for aviation safety.

Katrick Technologies out of Glasgow Scotland have made bladeless honeycomb wind turbines. Iberdrola, in Spain, is applying vinyl shapes resembling eyes to protect bird life. Aeromine Technologies, in California, have wind turbines with zero external moving parts. Other studies on raising the cut-in speed have shown excellent results in reducing bat mortality without significantly reducing revenue. Another strategy may be, to deter bats with disorienting noises, audible only to bats.

# Apple Dapple Cake A Delicious recipe for a Book Club

- 1 ½ cup sugar
- 1 ¼ cup oil
- 3 eggs
- 3 cups flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- ½ tsp salt
- 1/4 c orange juice
- 3 cups finely diced apples
- 2 cups chopped walnuts (or pecans)
- 2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 2 tsp. cinnamon

#### Glaze

- ½ cup dark brown sugar
- 4 Tbsp butter
- 1/4 c heavy cream (or evaporated milk)

#### **Directions**

Lightly butter a bundt pan.

Prep apples and walnuts, set aside.

Combine sugar and oil and beat well. Add eggs one at a time, beating till fluffy.

Combine dry ingredients and stir into egg mixture.

Lightly stir in orange juice, apples, walnuts, vanilla, and cinnamon and spoon into pan.

Bake at 325 for 1 ¼ hours, toothpick should test clean.

Cool for 30+ minutes, remove from pan.

Combine glaze ingredients in a sauce pan, cook for 3 minutes medium high heat (almost boiling). When glaze has cooled (warm, but not hardened), pour over the cake.




