

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Notes from the May Council Meetings

This summary of May Council meetings is provided by the Editor. Please be sure to visit the Village website www.belcarra.ca for more details and recordings of these meetings.

Council Meeting of May 6

Council directed staff to explore an encroachment policy for the municipal lands within the boundaries of the Village of Belcarra to deal with existing encroachments and/or all private use of municipal lands.

Council approved an expenditure of an additional \$7,750 for next steps in the disposition of road ends.

Paula Richardson, Chief Administrative Officer, provided a report on Belcarra Day 2024. Village of Belcarra 2023 costs for Belcarra Day was \$5,125. CRAB has again agreed to split the costs of Belcarra Day, not including staff time, up to \$2,000.

Council adopted the Village of Belcarra 2024 Tax Rates Bylaw No. 625, 2024.

CAO reported on a Firesmart hands-on workshop for water access properties to take place on May 25 at Belcarra Regional Park.

Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) approved a \$25,000 grant in response to the Village of Belcarra's 2023 (spring) Asset Management Planning Program request.

Ken Bjorgaard, Financial Consultant, reported on Comparative 2024 and 2023 Property Tax Levies.

The CAO reported that the Short-Term Rental Accommodation and Bed & Breakfast Accommodation Policy No. 210 was amended to increase the fine for operating without a valid Business License to \$3,000 per day, a provincially directed change. The Village of Belcarra Business Licence Bylaw No. 227, 1995, Amendment Bylaw No. 628, 2024 was read a first, second, and third time.

Council accepted a report from Stewart Novak, Public Works and Emergency Preparedness Coordinator, regarding the purchase of a new tractor in 2025 rather than 2024. He recommended that the capital budget allocation of \$160,000 for a new tractor be moved forward to 2025; and that the capital budget for the new tractor be increased from \$160,000 to \$260,000 to account for price increases and the addition of a flail mower attachment. Funding will come from the general capital reserve fund.

Council approved a donation of \$300 to the Eagle Ridge Hospital Foundation.

Council Meeting of May 21

Vancouver Fraser Port Authority (VFPA) presented an update to Council. The VFPA does not anticipate any changes to the current moratorium on the licensing of docks in Bedwell Bay. Questions from the public were deferred to the end of the meeting at which time the questions were collected by the CAO and directed to the VFPA.



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Removal of Seven Historic Cabins from Belcarra South


Metro Vancouver Regional District (MVRD) Board has approved the removal of seven historic cabins in Belcarra South.

This is a change from the board approved plan in 2017, which included the retention of six cabins and the Bole House, in recognition of Port Moody's heritage designation of the buildings. One cab) in located in the Village of Belcarra, not protected by heritage designation, was also retained in the 2017 plan.

In late 2023, at the request of the səlilwəta4 (Tseil-Waututh) and after public consultation, Port Moody council rescinded the heritage designation for the six protected cabins. Only the Bole House retained a heritage designation.

A few months later, MVRD approved an amended plan for təmtəmíxwtən/Belcarra South which includes the removal of seven cabins (six protected plus one in Belcarra). The amended plan also allows for improvements to the existing road, new trail connections, the removal of invasive species, rehabilitation of an existing creek, improved beach access for the public, an open area for picnicking, and the addition of a small amphitheater. The Bole House will be retained and improved to allow for public and səlilwəta4 (Tseil-Waututh) access and use. The seven cabins, described to be in poor condition, will be photo documented before removal.

The removal of the cabins is estimated to avoid approximately \$2.4 million in capital funding, which would have been required to upgrade the cabins, and \$85,000 per year in estimated annual maintenance expenses.

Be Aware, Care, and Share

"Please be aware, share, and report, and most importantly, be safe" ended a recent email from CRAB's Liisa Wilder.

She was notifying the community of reports of suspicious activity and attempted (and successful) breaking and entering of property and vehicles all over Belcarra in the early hours of Wednesday, May 22.

Residents shared on the Belcarra Together Facebook page their videos of suspicious activity caught on ring cams between 1:05 am (Belcarra Bay Road) and 1:35 am (Main Avenue). RCMP were called to the village to investigate. The RCMP investigation is ongoing and they have asked the community to continue to forward any video or still photos from that night. If you or a neighbour was a victim, please report it to the RCMP non-emergency number: 604-945-1550.

In addition to house and vehicle mischief, residents have reported late night visitors to their docks. There was a report of breaking into a boat to steal tools and a report of strangers cruising by on the water late at night using flashlights to look for opportunities.

All of this serves as a reminder that we can improve the safety of our community by getting connected, paying attention to what is going on, and reporting any criminal or suspicious activity to the RCMP.

SASAMAT LAKE WEEKEND DISORDER

FILE: 24-2092, 2096, 2099, 2100, 2114, 2117, 2120, 2121 – Port Moody Police were kept busy over the weekend responding to calls at Sasamat Lake involving weapons and alcohol.

On May 10, 2024, just before 7 p.m., police responded to a report of a youth who had been pepper sprayed at the main beach. Both the victim and suspects fled the scene prior to police arrival. Police also dealt with hundreds of intoxicated youths at closing time who blocked parts of Bedwell Bay Road – some attempted to hail rides from strangers. Police notified *Translink* who dispatched a large bus to the park to transport the youths out of the area.

On May 11, 2024, police were kept busy with traffic gridlock issues as well as impaired driving. At about 5:40 p.m., frontline officers were called to the lake for a report of a male youth who had been shot multiple times with a BB gun and then pepper sprayed. The victim was treated on scene and the investigation remains ongoing.

"It seems a lot of these calls for service involve alcohol and unsupervised youths" states Constable Sam Zacharias. "Though these issues are not new to the lake, we once again remind parkgoers to leave the alcohol at home, plan a safe ride home, and to pack their patience."



Port Moody Police will continue to increase patrols at the lake as weather permits.

Stories From the Archives — Part 2: William George Pinder, BCLS

In May 1874, William George Pinder (1850–1936), BCLS, wrote a report describing his observations of the area while surveying the north and south shores of Port Moody Arm (See Part 1 – The 1874 Port Moody Survey). It was during that assignment that Pinder also surveyed John Hall's Crown Land pre-emption on the North Arm of Burrard Inlet — District Lot 229, today known as 'Belcarra'.

Pinder was born in London, England, in 1850, to Emily (née Trutch) and Captain George Rideout Pinder of the 2nd Madras Light Infantry. Pinder grew-up for a time in India as his father was there during the Indian Mutiny of 1857 but about 1860 Captain Pinder brought his son back to England on a troopship by the old sea route around the Cape of Good Hope. Pinder was educated at Blackheath Preparatory School, then at Corsham, a small medieval town in northwest Wiltshire, and later studied in Heidelberg in Germany. While there he made a walking tour with two fellow students through the Black Forest and Switzerland to Lake Como in Italy and back.

In 1871, he was given an appointment on the survey staff of the C.P.R., reporting to Sir Stanford Fleming in Ottawa, who sent him West to join a party organizing to start surveying a trail line for the proposed C.P.R. railway from Lytton to Shuswap Lake. At the end of the year, the party returned to Victoria to plot their field notes. Pinder's uncle, Sir Joseph Trutch, the Governor of the 'Crown

Colony of British Columbia', was also in Victoria at the time. In 1872, he worked as a leveler, and for four years was employed on trail lines and locations up the North Thompson to Albreda Lake and Tête Jaune Cache, and from Hope on the Fraser River, up the Coquihalla River to the Summit. Later, he was employed by the C.P.R. on trail lines from the head of Dean Channel up the Kimsquit River and Dean River. When construction of the C.P.R. railway was commenced at Yale in 1880, Pinder was appointed Assistant Engineer and spent two years on that assignment.

In addition to his railway work, Pinder was engaged on the 'International Boundary Survey' of the 49th parallel at Point Roberts; was employed on the construction of the 'E. & N. Railway' from Esquimalt to above the Malahat, and the extension from Esquimalt to Victoria. After the completion of the railroad, Pinder had charge, including location, of the line from Nanaimo to Comox in connection with the Dunsmuir Collieries. He was then in charge of this line for sixteen years after its completion.


After severing his connection with the Dunsmuir Collieries on Vancouver Island, he went into general practice as Engineer and Land Surveyor, doing work all over the province. He made surveys at Kitsalas Canyon in 1904 for the Lands and Works Department, and also at Fort Simpson, Work Channel, Portland Canal and Graham Island, and in the Northern Interior.

In 1876, he married Anne Marie Henrietta Devereux, daughter of Captain John Devereux the dockmaster at Esquimalt, and they had four children. Upon his retirement in 1923, he moved in with his son Frank and remained with him until his death in May 1936, at the age of eighty-six. Pinder was a member of the 'Canadian Society of Civil Engineers' and his name first appeared on the first published list of Provincial Land Surveyors in 1891. In January 1936, a peak formally known as 'Province Mountain' by The Province Exploring Expedition of 1894, was called 'Pinder Mountain' after William George Pinder, but in 1950 the name was changed to 'Pinder Peak'.

On The Belcarra Reading Table By Klaus Bever

The Belcarra Reading Table is a small table intended for a book and a cup of morning coffee or tea. The table is not intended for scrolls.

Scrolls are documents, instruments of record, in a rolled-up form. Scrolls are often large, heavy, and impractical for travellers. Scrolls are written in page format across their length.



Pages are rolled or unrolled as they are read. Referring back a few pages along the scroll length is easily done, referring back multiple pages is less practical. There are multiple solutions including the building of much longer tables to hold the scrolls or carrying multiple identical scrolls to cross reference. The solution that the Romans developed during their conquests of western Europe, was the codex.

The book in its modern form is a codex. A codex is a collection of rectangular leaves that are bound or held at one edge, usually the longer edge, and printed on both sides. The codex form is a more efficient use of paper and ink resources and became the standard form of record. Going from scroll to codex was a great improvement in permitting wider distribution of informations.

The introduction of the printing press some 1500 years later made the next enormous stride into popularizing reading and providing wider distribution of knowledge. While the codex form encouraged the accumulation of knowledge, and storing codices in libraries made information more widely available, it remained a costly labour-and-time-requiring process, that was largely unsuited to the needs of the increasingly mobile and inquisitive merchants of the Late Middle Ages.

In 1440, the Gutenberg press changed how quickly a page of information could be printed. This mechanized press could print 2000 copies of a page in about the same time that it took the same page to be hand copied. This made books much less expensive and within several decades made books widely available throughout western Europe. Ideas were then no longer confined to the elite and to clerics. Books were everywhere. Ideas were shared.

On the Belcarra Reading Table this month is *Straight Man* by Richard Russo (1997). It is an insightful novel of the interplay of social, political, and philosophical topics woven by a collection of diverse characters. The book is very funny and very clever on the nature of human interactions. Available in audio for those without a Belcarra Reading Table.



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Where the birds all sing and the flowers bloom, what have you seen in your garden lately?

If you live on Main Avenue, chances are that you have seen a bear in its underwear.

Well, not in the garden, but several reported sightings of orcas and white-sided dolphins in our area is extremely exciting. What an amazing return of wildlife! Of course, the resurgence of anchovies has attracted seals and the larger predators.

I am always amazed at the foliage of the lenten roses (hellebores) that provide a beautiful pink colour in the garden as early as January and continue to bloom even changing to green and lasting into June. This year seems to be special with the proliferation of cherry, plum, and apple blossoms as well as the wisteria, laburnum, rhodos, azaleas, and kerria providing a glorious array of colour. Snowdrops and bluebells have also added to the palette. Kiwi fruit leaves are starting to turn white and with this burst of warm weather there is a proliferation in growth of many plants in the garden, including the grass.

We have been sprinkling bird seed on our deck handrail and enjoy watching our feathered friends to and froing. Whilst the numbers appearing are somewhat reduced at this time of year with the odd Steller's jay, blackcap chickadees, dark-eyed juncos, brown-headed cowbirds, song, sulphur and white crowned sparrows as well as house finches enjoying their fill. Sure, the crows and squirrels muscle in now and again, causing the spotted towhees etc. to run for cover. The occasional Anna's and rufous hummer buzzes by and a bald eagle is seen at its favourite perch down by the bay this morning.







We were lucky to have Andrew Vickerson from Les Verts Living give our little club a great introduction! Hydroponics substitutes a waterbased nutrient solution instead of our typical soil-

based substrates. It's more involved than just watching roots develop in a jar of water though! Rock wool, vermiculite, cococoir, and hemp are just some of the media that are used, and nutrients are also added to the water. Lighting may be natural sunlight or artificial LED lighting.

Andrew's summary of "The Grocery Store Experience" gave us a chuckle, but most of us had to plead guilty to buying less than perfect food and then having to discard most of it. Hydroponics, on the other hand, gives healthier, tastier, and in the long run, less expensive, food.

Wastage Comparison





There are six common types of hydroponic systems. Les Verts Living chose an "ebb and flow" system as it is easy to use and efficient. A simplified explanation is that a tray is filled with plants in a growing media (such as rock wool), a timed pump floods the tray with water and nutrients on a schedule, and gravity drains the solution down to the reservoir to be reused. After the system is set up, maintenance takes about 10 minutes a week and 60 minutes every 2-3 months.

Nutrient Solution Water Pump

When you are considering a hydroponic system to purchase, converse with an expert (like Andrew!) rather than just purchasing "off the shelf". Andrew noted that you don't need a sunny window, hard plumbing or a green thumb. There are many factors to consider when choosing a system: available space, well-balanced and quality nutrition, light spectrum and intensity, an easy to clean watering system, airflow, warranties, guarantees, reliability, and reservoir capacity!

Despite these daunting elements there are many compelling reasons to "grow hydroponic"! Conventional field grown veggies have many drawbacks. They are grown for speed not nutrition; leafy greens can lose 50% of their nutrients; contaminants, pesticides, and waste are common! Andrew really gave us a lot to think about on our next trip to the grocery store! (There's more information on our webpage!)

Welcome Pole Display at təmtəmíx™tən / Belcarra Regional Park

On May 15, the Tsleil-Waututh Nation held a ceremony for the welcome pole installed at təmtəmíx tən / Belcarra Regional Park. Welcome poles are displayed at both təmtəmíx tən and Whey-ah-Wichen (Cates) parks. The one at təmtəmíx tən is titled 'Serpent Slayer' and the pole at Whey-ah-Wichen is titled 'Return of the Orca'.

About the Poles Chief Jen Thomas, səlilwəta4 (Tsleil-Waututh Nation): "səlilwəta4 Chief and Council are incredibly pleased to see the poles by carver Jonas Jones welcome everyone to Whey-ah-Wichen and təmtəmíx*tən. These traditional village sites hold deep importance to our Tsleil-Waututh people, and we are pleased to have them connected in this culturally significant way. Our hands are raised in appreciation of the ongoing collaboration with our partners at Metro Vancouver and the District of North Vancouver for making this project a success."

About the Ceremony Gabriel George, Director of Treaty, Lands, and Resources, səlilwəta (Tsleil-Waututh Nation): "The work done today is an important traditional practice that has been passed down by our ancestors and represents who we are as səlilwəta people. It is significant because it brings these works of art to life and gives some separation between the artist and their work. We appreciate the work done by Jonas to represent our community."



Carver of the poles Jonas Jones, the carver of the poles: "I am thankful to share this gift of these welcome poles. These poles are for the next generations and for everyone to learn more about the rich history of the Tsleil-Waututh people. Carvings like this hold our history and act as a chance to pass down wisdom, and I am grateful to pass these back to the people."

Serpent Slayer

Carved by TsuKwalton (Jonas Jones), 2023

Long ago, as the waters of the great flood receded, s?i:4qəy (the great two-headed serpent) lay across səlilwət (Burrard Inlet). s?i:4qəy was a sxeləqəm (powerful being) and all other living creatures feared and avoided it at all costs. Its gaze was more deadly than the fire from lightning.

One day, a young səlilwəta (Tsleil-Waututh or person of the inlet) boy living at təmtəmíx tən was swept away by a seal while swimming alone as his sister watched. The seals began to raise him as their own. The sea world prepped the boy to become a great warrior who would face the most difficult task: slaying s?i:4qəy.

After a decade of travelling the world, training, learning, and living with his kin of the sea kingdom, he returned to təmtəmíx*tən, ready to fight the giant two-headed serpent.

This was a gruesome battle and required the warrior to use carefully prepared arrows laced with pitch from a special tree. He struck the serpent twice, one arrow to each head. The serpent fell to its death and the warrior saved the land.


After his great battle with s?i:4qəy, the warrior returned to təmtəmíx*tən and stabbed the ground with the two-headed serpent's fang, opening a freshwater spring and sparing his people from having to travel for their water.




