

December 2 Council Meeting

RCMP Officer in Charge, Superintendent Darren Carr, of the Coquitlam RCMP presented a "Certificate of Appreciation for Bravery" to Belcarra resident Ryan Timm (see page 5).

Council received for information the "Interim Staff will update the Housing Needs Report". Zoning Bylaw and Official Community Plan to ensure policies allow for the projected number of new homes.

Stewart Novak, Manager, Municipal Services, provided an update on Belcarra's 'emergency management indigenous engagement requirement activities' as per the Emergency and Disaster Management Act.

A recent road outage requiring a detour of Belcarra residents through Anmore was discussed. Belcarra residents did not receive an Alertable notification about the road outage. The Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) advised that discussions with Port Moody and Anmore are needed to improve notification for events that occur outside of our municipality but effect our access and safety.

Ken Bjorgaard, Financial Consultant, presented and Council approved, a grant application in the amount of \$10,000 under the Local Government Infrastructure Planning Grant Program to update the Village's storm water network data. Village's share (\$5,000) of the project costs will come from the Village's Community Works Reserve Fund.

The CAO reported that the Port has installed three new buoys at the south-end of Bedwell Bay. The buoys mark a voluntary no anchor zone established for the protection of eel grass.

January 27 Council Meeting

The Village will receive a second payment of \$32,816 from the Canada Community-Building Fund.

Port of Vancouver forwarded documents related to the private residential dock program and their private residential dock licence process. For more information visit https://www.portvancouver.com/ permits-landingpage. Councillor Clark confirmed that there is still a moratorium for dock builds on Bedwell Bay.

Council received and consented to the adoption of the "Metro Vancouver Regional District Sasamat Fire Service Conversion Bylaw No. 1402, 2024". The Conversion Bylaw replaces the existing letters patent. No significant alterations were made with the exception of the addition of a clause regarding maximum requisition (\$1.25 per \$1,000), which is required content for establishing bylaws per section 339(1)(e) of the Act. The bylaw will now be referred to the Inspector of Municipalities for approval.

Council approved a grant of \$353 to the Communities Embracing Restorative Action (CERA) Society for support of the Community Youth Justice Program for 2025.

Council approved that the Village's "2025 – 2029 Financial Plan Bylaw and 2025 Utility Rates Bylaw (Fees & Charges Bylaw Amendment)" be prepared on the following basis:

Property Taxes — 8% increase Water User Fees — 7% increase Waste & Recycle Depot (WARD) User Fees 20% increase

The CAO presented and Council accepted for information two reports: "Status of Strategic Priorities Work Plan Initiatives and Key Infrastructure Projects" and "Quarterly Department Reports - For quarter ending December 31, 2024"

To address ongoing property non-compliance issues, Council approved a remedial action requirement for Lot A Section 31 Township 39 New Westminster District Plan EPP93027.

Council approved a grant application to the British Columbia Water Meter Pilot Project. Belcarra's total grant funding package is valued at \$350,425.63 with Belcarra responsible for \$6,753.63 (software fees).

Council did not approve the purchase of a portable field office, located at the Waste and Recycle Depot (WARD), for the Village's Bylaw Enforcement person.

Council approved the purchase of a used portable field office to replace the rented office currently being used as Belcarra's Building Department Office at a cost of \$25,910.00 plus applicable taxes.

Council approved an extension of the agreement for financial consulting services with Ken Bjorgaard (K&E Business Services Inc.) for a further two-year term.

The CAO reported that the province has launched a mandatory registration program for short-term rentals. The deadline for registration is May 1, 2025. https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/housing-tenancy/short-term-rentals/registry

Ryan Timm, A Selfless Act of Bravery

At a recent Council meeting, Belcarra resident, Ryan Timm, was presented with a "Certificate of Appreciation for Bravery" by RCMP Superintendent Darren Carr and Mayor Jamie Ross. The Certificate is given in recognition of Tim's "extraordinary act of heroism and selflessness in helping a stranger in distress."

From Superintendent Carr —

On July 9, 2024, while Ryan was driving in the area of Pitt River Road and Langdon Avenue, in Port Coquitlam, he came across a house fire. No emergency crews were on scene. Ryan parked his vehicle and approached the residence to offer assistance. He was advised by the homeowner that there was an elderly female in the basement of what was then a fully engulfed residence. Ryan ran into the basement to locate the elderly female who had mobility Ryan was able to bring her to challenges. safety. He then ran back inside the basement to ensure that no one else was trapped inside. As he heard the floor above his head starting to give-way, he quickly got himself to safety.

Superintendent Carr observed, "Ryan's quick and selfless actions undoubtedly saved the life of the elderly female resident."

Where the birds all sing and the flowers bloom what have you seen in your garden lately?

The excitement of seeing my Hellebores starting to flower in December and learning from neighbours of Fuchsias, the odd shrub blooming, and some herbs showing signs of life, it is a quiet time right now. Well, I did pick my last few Raspberries in December and the Geraniums are back in the sunroom.



An article in the newspaper notes that it is good to let the fallen leaves stay on your garden as this provides food for insects and birds. That is one job off my list.

We enjoy watching our feathered friends feeding on the seed spread on the sundeck railing and looking back on previous reports, it is interesting to note the difference in numbers and species now showing up. By far the most numerous this year is the Juncos with 37 showing during one count. Of course, the Steller's Jays are always an early show and slowly the Spotted Towhees are increasing in number and the list is rounded out by Blackcap Chickadees, Crows, Gulls, Song Sparrows, and Bald Eagles. It is always a delight to see the Anna's Hummingbird show up, but I hear from neighbours that they see far more Hummers than the odd one or two that I get. Other sightings include clouds of Pine Siskins with the odd few landing nearby; as well as a sighting of a Ruby-Crowned Kinglet.

Stories from the Archives — Magnus Johnson: Bedwell Bay Pioneer Researched By: Ralph Drew, Belcarra, BC, January 2025

'Old Man Johnson', an old Icelandic hermit, was a squatter who used to live in a small cedar-shake cabin located at the head of Bedwell Bay, most likely close to Ray Creek for easy access to a supply of fresh water. Based on information from the 1931 Canada Census, (1) the individual was Magnus Johnson (1861–1935) who immigrated to Canada from Iceland in 1888. According to a 'Vancouver Sun' newspaper article at the time of his death, (2) Magnus had been living at Bedwell Bay for 40 years.

In 1926, twelve-year-old John Grohn and his family camped in a big army tent beside his cabin. John remembers: (3)

"I got friendly with the hermit and used to go and talk to him. He was quite old, and had an Icelandic accent. He told me all kinds of stories. He was squatting in a small cedar shake house. It had a shed and a lean-to piled full of newspapers and old magazines he'd been saving over the years. He had an old rowboat and he brought us a salmon for a buck. One night there was a thunderstorm and our tent litup with white flashes. All of a sudden, we could hear singing going on outside. The old guy was shouting Icelandic verses. I guess the god Thor was up there banging, so he was out there chanting!"

Years later in 1933, when the Colwill family moved to the LePage house next to Sasamat Creek, the old hermit was still living at the head of Bedwell Bay. The Colwill children recall that he had fruit trees near his small shack. Don Colwill used to visit the hermit but his sister, thirteen-year-old Audrey, was scared: (4)

"Whenever anyone went near his house he called from inside: 'I've got a gun, I've got a gun.' When he died, the police boat came-up and took him away. They had to burn the old place down because it smelled so bad."

Magnus Johnson was found dead in January 1935 aged 74 years. ⁽⁵⁾ His body was removed by the Provincial Police ⁽⁶⁾ and the provincial coroner ascertained that he had died of pneumonia. ⁽²⁾

Typically our expenses are equal to what we raise. In 2024, our bank savings declined by \$1259. This was due partly to a 25% decrease in our income from refundable containers. Our current directors have agreed to continue their roles into 2025: Penny Moen as President; Dayna Fitz as Secretary; Liisa Wilder as Treasurer; and Sue Brain, Jim Chisholm, Andrea Jauck, and Deborah Struk as directors at large.

In December we hosted the much-loved Santa ships and Santa-in-the-Park event. Thank you to Dan Greenwood and Greenwood Yacht Services, Shelley Herron, and the Santa ship captains for organizing this fun event.

In 2025, CRAB plans to host our usual community events along with a couple of additions. See the Bears and Spirit talk announcement on page 15 of this issue.



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



Belcarra Synchro Skater Competes at the Canadian National Skating Competition

Belcarra resident, Destiny Cassels, as a member of the Lower Mainland Synchro Skating Team, competed at the Canadian National Skating Competition last week in Laval Quebec.

The skaters on this team were selected this past year to represent BC / Yukon. They were up against stiff competition from the world champions from Quebec, but they performed well and the experience was invaluable. They hope to continue to improve their skills and compete again next year.

For Destiny, it all started approximately one year ago. After competing at the novice level of synchronized skating the previous year, she was invited to try out for the junior synchro team. It was a rigorous selection process. All the skaters were previously singles skaters who were very skilled. Destiny was one of 16 selected for the team.

At the introductory meeting with skaters and parents it was emphasized that a total commitment was required from both skaters and parents — no exceptions.

The following year was an intense five nights per week immersion into learning to perfect two routines, a short program and a long program, each to be choreographed to separate sets of music.

As the only junior synchro team in the lower mainland, they had no competition here, but they did enter into one event in the fall of last year, finishing first.


The first real competition was in December in Woodstock Ontario, where they faced veteran teams from Ontario, and Quebec. They finished last, but ever optimistic they proceeded to the National Championships in Laval, and the rest is history.

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



What might a gardener write about in February, (minus "Valentine's Day")? Checking out seed catalogues? How about the easy-peasy use of "peat pellets" for starting seeds? Here's a surprising / alarming catch phrase: "For peat's sake, don't use peat!"

February 2nd marks "World Wetlands Day". The "Convention on Wetlands",

supported by 172 countries, was adopted in 1971. Our BC Council of Garden Clubs recently reviewed a new book, "The Gardener's Guide to Saving the Planet", published/available from the Peatlands Protection Society (affiliated with the West Coast Climate Network).



What are Peatlands? The International Peatland Society defines them as terrestrial wetland ecosystems. When waterlogged plant matter is unable to fully decompose, the resulting material is peat.

Sphagnum mosses and shrubs are the predominant vegetation in cool climates, and graminoids (mostly grasses) and woody vegetation are in warmer climates. Eliza Olson (Peatland Protection Society) states that some peatlands are up to 50,000 years old. Dr. Maria Strack, University of Waterloo, estimates it takes 1,000 years to get a damaged/extracted peatland back to its original state and at least 100 years to get it fully functioning.

Peatlands (almost half of the world's wetlands) store twice as much carbon as all the world's forests and yet cover only 3% of the planet's land, according to the UN Environmental Program.

When drained or burned, they go from being carbon sinks to carbon sources. They take centuries to redevelop, and they also are a unique ecosystem supporting numerous wildlife. UN Environment Peatlands experts claim that since 1970, we have lost 35 percent of them.

Peat is still used for heat and power in some countries but environmental concerns have now been raised. Even Ireland has now put in restrictions preventing the burning of peat and curtailed some of its extracting.

It may seem that our little gardens don't make much of a difference, but, for example, the UK has recently ended the sale of peat for gardening and Kew Gardens are 98% peat free! The International Peatlands Society states that Canada and Germany account for about half of the world's horticultural peat extraction. Most of the peat moss used in the USA comes from Canada's sphagnum bogs! (Ouch!) SunGro Horticulture, a leading exporter of Canadian peatmoss, claims to only harvest from bogs which are suitable for restoration. Research on restoration (restoring the sphagnum moss plant cover) is being done to allow the long-term peat accumulation function to be re-established". Hmmm... but after this plant cover grows, doesn't creating the peat layer (which actually absorbs the carbon) still take hundreds of years?

There are peat-free compost alternatives, but you must check carefully. "Organic" does not mean peat-free. Farmers' Almanac suggests 7 alternatives: Coconut Coir, Wood-based materials, Compost, Pine Needles, Rice Hulls, Leaf Mold, Composted Manure. Other websites additionally list: Sand, Bentonite Clay, Expanded Clay, Perlite, Xylit.

The World Wetlands Day 2025 theme is "Protecting Wetlands for Our Common Future". It seems we are losing wetlands three times faster than forests. On February 2nd, check the labels on your own supplies and see if your next purchases can be peat-free.

In the early years of the SVFD, cost sharing was based on what was called the "Simon Fraser Formula" which was the pro rata average of both population and assessment base:

Today, about sixty percent (60%) of the annual SVFD callouts are due to medical emergencies (including motor vehicle accidents) which are directly related to population and demographics.

The balance of annual SVFD callouts is mostly due to protection of buildings and other capital assets which are measured as the taxable assessment base of each municipality.

At the time SVFD was formed 47 years ago, the communities of Anmore and Belcarra endeavoured to find a "magic formula" for cost sharing. Although not perfect, the "Simon Fraser Formula" worked in the beginning and warrants reexamination at this important juncture.

Letter to the Editor Road Closures

As Deputy Fire Chief for the Sasamat Fire Department, I am submitting this article to share my observations and recommendations concerning a recent weather event that significantly affected the residents of Belcarra.

On Saturday, December 14th, the Sasamat Fire Department was dispatched to three "wires down" calls at various locations in Anmore, Belcarra and Port Moody. These three calls were paged out within minutes of each other. In response, both fire halls deployed trucks and personnel to each call. At the first call, a tree brought down wires on Bedwell Bay Rd. alongside Sasamat Lake in Port Moody. At the second call, another tree brought down wires on Strong Rd. in Anmore. A third tree landed on wires and blocked the road at Bedwell Bay Rd. & Crystal Creek Drive (Anmore). Due to this particular road blockage, Port Moody Fire could not attend their call on Bedwell Bay Rd. As the situation evolved, it became clear that our Fire Department (with assistance from Anmore & Belcarra Public Works) would have the responsibility of maintaining control and safety of these scenes until the arrival of BC Hydro and tree removal services.

Unfortunately, during this significant event, some residents and other members of the public became increasingly frustrated that they were unable to leave or enter the area. Their frustration led to some displays of hostile and aggressive behaviour towards our members. I would like to remind all residents that this behaviour is not acceptable. As First Responders, we have a responsibility to maintain safety around any emergency scene. We are not stopping traffic, cyclists, and pedestrians on a whim, we are doing so because it's necessary. Also, I would like to let everyone know that our members are unpaid volunteers and as such, we are doing this work, solely, to contribute to community safety, not for pay, pensions or benefits.

Looking ahead, these road closures will inevitably happen again, so I recommend that all residents enhance their level of preparedness for events that may restrict their ability to leave the village. This means that you should have sufficient food, medication and supplies for at least 72 hours. Additionally, residents should become familiar with the park access road that, in some cases, will be opened by parks staff (or Public Works) when an emergency requires the closure of Bedwell Bay Rd. in or around the village. However, residents should also be aware that in some circumstances the park road may not be accessible due to hazards identified by parks staff.

During a road closure, or other emergency events, residents may be able to find information on the *Alertable* App, or by contacting the Belcarra emergency phone number. Please take the time to download the App.

In closing, I would like to extend our thanks to Rick Pynn, the owner of A1 Tri Craft Tree Services. Rick assisted our department by using his truck (equipped with emergency lights) to block Bedwell Bay Rd. until we could take over the post.

Mark Carney wrote in his book *Value(s)* that where process affecting others becomes mysterious and secretive; it raises suspicions and loses support. Carney goes on to say that once confidence in leadership is diminished, it becomes difficult, lengthy, if not impossible, to restore.

Mark Carney is a Canadian, born in the Northwest Territories and trained in economics at Harvard and Oxford Universities. He was the Governor of the Bank of Canada and the Bank of England.

His observation is reminiscent of how much of the world's hopeful looked to Barack Obama as he described his "red line" in dealing with Syria's dictatorship's use of chemical weapons on their own countrymen. One of these has been put in place. This Council has not made any clear plan to complete the rest of the engineering recommendations. And despite broadening support from residents for traffic calming along Bedwell Bay Road and despite comments from Village staff about the risks from speed to pedestrians along our roadways, this Council has yet to propose clear plans to make villagers' security and safety of the highest My confidence in this Council is importance. ebbing.

Everything was delicious but clearly the fresh Irish brown bread stood out. Klaus and I, separately and unknowingly, each asked Judith for the recipe; me, so that I could bake it, and Klaus, so that I could bake it.

My copy of the recipe describes the bread as 'a healthy, brown bread for a meal. Easy to make.' Klaus and I both think that it's really tasty the first day, served warm with butter. We also agree that it's delicious the next day, toasted with butter.

Recipe for Irish Brown Bread From Judith

All purpose flour	2 cups
Whole wheat flour	1 1/2 cups
Natural bran	1/2 cup
Granulated sugar	1/4 cup
Baking soda	1 1/2 tsp.
Kosher Salt	1 tsp.
Buttermilk	2 cups
Neutral-flavoured oil	1/4 cup


In a large bowl measure flours, bran, sugar, baking soda, and salt. Mix together and make a well in the centre. Pour in the buttermilk and oil. Stir just to moisten. Scrape into a greased loaf pan (9x5x3 inches). Bake in 350°F pre-heated oven for one hour. Remove from pan and let cool.

Final thoughts:

Who knows when breads and cakes are done? After years of checking for 'spring back' and clean cake testers while achieving soggy bottoms and dense centres, I decided to invest in a temperature For this loaf, a 200°F centre seemed to probe. work.
