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TATLOW RESERVOIR OUTAGE

Beginning March 31 at 7:00 am, the Tatlow Reservoir will be out of service for inspection and interior lining repair. The reservoir will remain out of service for up to one week (7 days) while necessary work is completed.

Potable water supply to Village residences will be uninterrupted. The reservoir will be bypassed from the distribution system allowing residents the continued use of household water.

Water conservation measures apply from March 31 to April 6, 2025

Restrictions include:

- No vehicle washing
- No filling pools or hot tubs
- No watering gardens or lawns
- Reduce shower time

Fire Safety Precautions

Fire hydrants will be out of service while the Tatlow Reservoir is out of service.

Staff is working directly with the Sasamat Volunteer Fire Department in planning and implementing fire safety measures.

Editor's Notes from March Council Meetings

March 10 Council Meeting

Council designated March 26, 2025 International Purple Day for Epilepsy Awareness in the Village of Belcarra.

Council received a letter from the Village of Anmore seeking input regarding Anmore's Official Community Plan (OCP) Amendment Bylaw No. 686.2023 — Anmore South. Council directed staff to forward the letter to Belcarra's planning consultant for review and comment.

Council received School District No. 43 (Coquitlam) Board resolution for proposed 2026-2027 eligible school site requirements. To address population growth over the next ten years, the board expects that six new schools will be required.

Council directed staff to engage the services of a registered professional to report on options and cost for the installation of a Village Hall sprinkler system.

Council received for information Paula Richardson's report of her meeting with MLA Rick Glumac — "Discussion with MLA regarding Residents' Queries regarding Road Ends".

The Village of Belcarra Records Management Bylaw No. 635, 2025 received first, second, and third readings. Council approved the Village of Belcarra Records Management Policy No. 233. Council approved funding (\$10,000) to hire outside expertise to update the records management system.

Metro Vancouver is seeking public engagement on their 2026 Budget and Five Year Financial Plan. Information on how to provide input can be found on the Village's website or on the Metro Vancouver website.

On Wednesday, March 12, staff will conduct a bypass test of the Tatlow reservoir.

Tatlow reservoir internal inspection and repairs are planned for the end of March / early April.

BC Hydro installed new lighting at Kelly and Bedwell Bay Road. Stuart Novak reported that the light was installed by BC Hydro in error and that it will be taken down.

March 31 Council Meeting

Council approved a letter to Anmore drafted by the Pooni Group regarding the Anmore South Lands OCP Amendment Application. In the letter Belcarra requests an extension to respond once the questions in the letter are addressed and additional technical information is provided. The proposed plan for Anmore South includes: 2,202 residential units (8 single-family detached homes, 120 duplex units, 740 townhomes, and 1,334 apartments), opportunities for small commercial businesses, community amenities (e.g. parks, trails, natural areas, and recreation facilities) and sewer and water connections.

Council accepted for information the completion report from Stewart Novak, Manager, Municipal Service, for the Marine Avenue Road Rehabilitation project. The project along Marine Avenue included: full depth removal of asphalt and underlying sand to repair slumped areas, repaving, and rain curbs to direct water flow. Council noted apparent changes to the available parking. Staff is considering clearer marking of eligible parking places.

Council approved the purchase of the existing rented portable field office (the Belcarra Building office) at a cost of \$31,000 plus applicable taxes.

Council repealed the Village of Belcarra Flag Protocol Corporate Policy No. 182 (May 25, 2009) and approved the Village of Belcarra Flag Protocol Corporate Policy No. 236. The purpose of the policy is to ensure that the National Flag of Canada is displayed in a consistent and appropriate manner and to set out a protocol and procedure for flags and flying flags at half-mast.

Council adopted the Village of Belcarra Records Management Bylaw No. 635, 2025.

The Monday, April 28 Council meeting is cancelled to make the hall available for the Federal Election.



Sasamat Volunteer Fire Department (SVFD) Board of Trustees Meeting Editor's Notes

A meeting of the SVFD Board of Trustees was held at the Anmore Community Hub on March 6.

Metro staff provided an update on the SVFD Service Review. This process started in June 2024 and is ongoing. Mayor Ross (Belcarra) and Mayor McEwan (Anmore) attended the preliminary meeting with Metro Vancouver. Metro provided three cost proportioning scenarios that have been forwarded to both Villages for review. Additional service review meetings will be held to discuss options and how to move forward.

Metro staff reported that the approval process of the SVFD Conversion Bylaw continues. The current service arrangement for the SVFD is governed by letters patent which are being converted to a Conversion Bylaw.

The Trustees asked Metro staff to explore funding opportunities for the construction of the new fire halls from the Provincial and Federal Governments.

The Trustees asked Metro staff to draft a letter to BC Hydro to request payment of grant funds in the amount of \$5,000 for the provision of fire service at Buntzen Lake in 2024.

Metro staff provided an update on the 2024 financial statement. The service was under budget by 26% (\$111,833). The Trustees passed a motion to move the unspent 2024 funds into reserves.

Chief Jay Sharpe presented the 2024 Call-Out Statistics. He noted that the volumes and types of calls were "usual" for the Villages.

2024 Call-Out Statistics

- 17 Fire
- 69 Medical
- 9 Motor Vehicular
- 1 Other
- 34 Alarms
- 128 Total Calls

Chief Sharpe reported on a recent emergency call for a boat fire in Indian Arm.

The SVFD was unable to respond to the incident as they were denied access by Emergency Management of BC (EMBC) to water transport provided by Royal Canadian Search and Rescue (RCSAR). Chief Sharpe will be looking into this further. Without access to this over-water emergency transport, the SVFD may have to rely on water taxis. The use of water taxis is likely to cause delays in response.

Chief Sharpe outlined recent personnel changes to the department. The department has 25 regular members, three field incident technicians, and six probationary members. Four new recruits, all from Anmore, will start training soon.



Block Watch Update By Les Bramley

With the help of Melanie Stewart, the coordinator of Block Watch for the RCMP, we have reactivated block #6.

A few incidents have been passed on to me this year:

- 1. The fire hall F150 truck was siphoned empty of gasoline. This is deplorable, leaving an emergency vehicle not ready for instant action.
- 2. A man found sleeping at the WARD in the garbage recycling bin
- 3. Excessive speeding (apparently very fast)
- 4. Passing on a solid yellow line, with oncoming traffic approaching. Two incidents of that reported. "That's crazy ".
- 5. Cars racing through the village in the middle of the night once in awhile
- 6. Marijuana debris along the sides of our roadways

We know Marijuana is legal but the littering is not. All this plastic is definitely not good for the environment. Our village staff pick these up constantly. They tell me the worst spot is at the corner of Kelly and Bedwell Bay Road but we see these things all the way to Belcarra park. The photo was taken by a conscientious resident who cleaned up some of the marijuana debris. Thank you for doing that.

There have been some misconceptions as to how Block Watch now runs. It is very simple — First phone 911 (for an emergency) or 604-945-1550 (for a non-emergency). Then contact your Block Captain or Co-Captain, who will immediately send a fan-out message to their block members.

We have heard many people in the village say: 'we don't see the RCMP out here much'. Well, if we don't report incidents much, the RCMP will think that everything is pretty well ok in Belcarra.


So I am encouraging you to join as Block Captains or Co-Captains. This is a simple job that does not take much time, and helps keep your community safer.


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Old Babes in the Woods by Margaret Atwood


astronomer/mathematician, and many

Precipice by Robert Harris


In his latest novel, Harris weaves an engaging account of the relationship between British Prime Minister Asquith and the much younger Lady Venetia Stanley as the country, having narrowly escaped a civil war in Ireland, entered the First World War. The infatuated and dependent Asquith regularly shared written and verbal military secrets with Stanley by post [mail in London rarely took more than 6 hours to be delivered] and on afternoon drives around the city and nearby countryside. On occasion, this material was tossed out the car window and ended up with the



security service causing genuine alarm over potential links to German intelligence operations. Harris, a master of fiction rooted in history—in this case the context of the war and the fact that the correspondence between Asquith and Stanley survives, has written an engaging story. JS



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




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Garden Club Update by Les Bramley

Letter to the Editor Village Finances By John Willms

The private use of public property in the Village of Belcarra has been going on ever since we have lived here, back in April of 1986. For some residents in Belcarra Bay area, it meant every bylaw and policy had to be met and policed by our Village administration, for others not so much. When one of our neighbours many years ago, was targeted for having his hot tub 2 feet on the public road end, they ended up in court against the Village, but lost. The Village argument in court was a multitude of future uses for this public area, but none of these ever came to fruition. Today the road end still exists and the new neighbour next to this road end has built a private driveway and uses this land to access his property. A multi-million dollar road end is now being used by one resident for access to his residence. For some of us we would have been made to redesign our home, for others, no problem.

In the Belcarra Bay area there are at least half a dozen public areas that have some type of situation regarding the use of public property. Some residents claim new construction will block their view, others just want more parking for all their cars, one has more than one driveway into their lot, the developed road end being one of them. The total value is somewhere between 15 to 20 million dollars worth of public land (road ends if turned into residential lots) and all being used by a few residents who feel that they are entitled, no problem for our Village administration. This does not count the Bedwell Bay area or Main Avenue where there are many public areas; where our administration has the same type of attitude when it comes to the use of these public areas. The Village administration has turned a blind eye to these abuses even though most municipalities have bylaws preventing them. I was told that our bylaw was modified that allows the CAO the right to make decisions which definitely only benefit a few entitled residents.

We have full sized road areas in the Village of Belcarra being used for private use. The residents on each side of Tatlow Road have taken over most of Tatlow Road, leaving a small trail down the middle. Upper Tatlow Road is totally blocked with a concrete barrier constructed for the use of parking cars by the adjacent resident.

Everywhere you look, certain residents have taken over public property and the attitude the Village of Belcarra has taken is that they only get involved if someone complains. We now have so many areas where this illegal private use of public property is taking place; it has become almost impossible for any public areas to be sold or leased without upsetting people who feel they are entitled.

I have been told that out of 31 available road ends, there are only a handful that could be sold without too much trouble. Think about that; are all of the other road ends being used by entitled private residents?

All public lands that are being used by private residents should immediately be surveyed, then sold or leased to the users at market value, based on a square foot area and registered with the assessment authority so that taxes will be paid. Everyone should be treated equally. If the current administration refuses to correct this inequity, maybe it is time we consider amalgamation with another municipality which will listen to the concerns of the residents who live here.





Letter to the Editor Safety for the Village By Klaus Bever

It's out! The second survey for villager input towards an integrated road and trail safety plan for Belcarra residents is now available online.

This survey is being conducted on behalf of village Council by Bunt & Associates Engineering. The original report by Bunt was presented to Council at the October 31, 2024 regular Council meeting. This followup survey is more specific in purpose and offers opportunity for choices. There is room for comment. As with any survey, there are limits as to what choices can be offered. These limits often reflect the need for some brevity so that respondents are not put-off from completing the survey.

A survey prologue provides some background helps the respondent make a more informed Belcarra residents completing this survey may want to keep in mind that road and path safety have been a Council issue for Safety along Bedwell Bay Road has some time. had an engineer's report from the Insurance Corporation of British Columbia since November 2022. Recommendations were made. recommendations make safety along Bedwell Bay Road between the Kelly and Main intersections of the highest priority. Further delay implementing the ICBC recommendations is a potential liability for the Village, especially if any pedestrian or cyclist is injured in this section of roadway.

A comment on the survey's approach to traffic calming: this section offers few choices to the respondent. There are many more options available for traffic calming that could be appropriate for our village 1. A few advantages to traffic calming:

- 1. Short installation time
- 2. Relative low cost
- 3. Village staff can easily install
- 4. Most devices are readily available

- 5. Metro Vancouver and Translink enthusiastically support traffic calming along the roadways that, like Bedwell Bay Road, are part of the Metro Main Road Network.
- 6. Funding for the vast bulk of traffic calming is already in place or readily available through Translink.

"Terri Spencer Leaps into Water to Save Child"

"A brave little Vancouver Girl—just 12—risked her life last week to save a 15-month-old baby boy from drowning in the waters of the North Arm of Burrard Inlet [a.k.a. 'Indian Arm'], near Belcarra Park. The young heroine is Terri Spencer, daughter of Mrs. Lloyd Spencer. She rescued Bryan Walsh, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Walsh of Seattle."



Terry Spencer

"Four children were in a row boat, returning from 'Turtle Head' [a.k.a. 'Hamber Island'] to 'Belcarra Park' where the Spencer family was vacationing. In the boat were Terry, Bryan and Gerry Walsh, 5, and Tamea Rice. They had reached a point mid-way between 'Turtle Head' and 'Belcarra Park' — some distance from the shore — when little Bryan tumbled overboard. There were no other boats in the immediate vicinity."

"Little Bryan would have drowned if Terri Spencer had not thought fast and acted even faster. She dived into the water and grasped hold of little Bryan. She swam to the side of the row boat, and the other two children took the little boy aboard, and helped Terri over the side."

Afternote:

In the 1930s, '40s and '50s, Eric Hamber allowed sisters Annabelle Spencer (née McDonald, 1898–1988) — who was employed by Eric Hamber — and Mae Rice (née McDonald, 1902–1995) to holiday at their cottage on Turtlehead. (Photographs below are courtesy of Susan Rice, granddaughter of Mae Rice.) During World War Two, Annabelle and Mae brought war orphans from England for the summer. In a 1958 letter, Annabelle Spencer wrote:

"We have a summer place at Turtlehead which we have been enjoying for the past twenty-five years. The property is in the name of Hon. E. W. Hamber — former Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia — and he and Mrs. Hamber, who have no use for the property since they have their farm [Minnekhada] at Coquitlam,



have willed it to our children. The Hambers very generously pay the taxes and the caretaker's wages but eventually these obligations will devolve upon our family. There are about six and a half acres [Lots 4–13, Block 10, Plan 1095], including a small island [DL 4992, 2.5 ac]. On the map the island is designated as 'Turtle Head' but I believe a recent bylaw has changed the name to 'Hamber Island'."

Mae Rice remembers the difficulties encountered in reaching the cottage located on the Turtlehead peninsula:

"Our main method of communicating with the caretaker was to drive to Strathcona Pier in North Vancouver and 'yodel'. He came from Turtlehead in the row boat to pick us and our supplies up and take us for the weekend to our summer camp. I have many fond memories of summer days with the boys fishing and swimming."

Frankie-Approved Teething Biscuit Rings by "Nana" Nora Boekhout

Our first Granddaughter is now 9 months old and just starting her culinary adventures post "rice pabulum". There are no teeth in sight yet, but an Instagram post inspired me to do some baking for her. This recipe is adapted from "LittleGrubbers.com" and was a winner from her first taste! (You can imagine how thrilled I was!) Warning... it's a bit mucky once it softens, so choose your venue carefully!

Ingredients

- 1 small, sweet potato (I steamed mine)
- 1 cup flour (whole wheat is healthier)
- ½ tsp. baking powder
- ½ tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1/4 cup smooth peanut butter (all natural, no additives!)
- 4 Tbsp. milk (or a bit more)

Directions

- 1. Mash the sweet potato.
- 2. Add peanut butter and milk.
- 3. Combine flour, baking powder, and cinnamon.
- 4. Mix the wet and dry ingredients.
- 5. Roll the dough on a floured board to about 1 cm.
- 6. Cut 4 cm round circles (mine were 5 cm).
- 7. Cut out 2 cm holes in the center.
- 8. Bake at 320°F (160°C) for 40 minutes.

Let cool before serving. Freeze the extras.



Mom's Never Fail Pastry Recipe by Bonni Marshall

This is my mom's very basic (and old school) never fail pastry recipe from many, many years ago. I recall my mom making this dough for pie crust every Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Her pies were always delicious and the crusts were perfect!

My mom spends most of her time and energy on caring for my stepdad now, and is no longer wielding her rolling pin... but the recipe endures ;-)

Ingredients

- 1 lb lard (Note: My mom only uses the Tenderflake brand and maintains that it's the secret to a perfect pie crust!)
- 5 cups flour
- 1 Tsp. Baking Powder
- 3 Tbsp. Brown Sugar
- 1 egg

Directions

- 1. Mix above ingredients with a pastry blender until texture is like coarse cornmeal.
- 2. Put 1 egg in a 1 cup measuring cup and fill to 3/4 full with milk.
- 3. Beat/whisk the egg & milk mixture and pour into dry mixture.
- 4. Work mixture until rolling texture.
- 5. Flour your rolling surface and lightly flour your rolling pin before rolling out the dough.

NOTE: This dough is great for pies or tarts, and it freezes very well. You will have more than you need for one pie, so freezing any leftover is a good option.
