



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Editor's Notes from April Council Meetings

Note: Due to the Federal election, the April 28 Council meeting was cancelled.

April 14 Council Meeting

Council received the KPMG "Village of Belcarra Audit Findings Report" for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Ken Bjorgaard, Village Financial Consultant, presented the "2024 Financial Statements". Ken also presented a summary of some "Key Financial Indicators" (See Table 1 below). Council accepted the draft statements and KPMG can now provide a final audit report.

Council declared April 28, 2025 as the official "Day of Mourning for Workers Killed and Injured on the Job". In recognition, Council observed one minute of silence during the meeting.

Council supported the nominations of Mayor Meghan Lahti, City of Port Moody, and Councillor Nancy McCurrach, City of Port Coquitlam, for reappointment to represent Belcarra at the E-Comm Board of Directors for the 2025-2026 term.

Council accepted a report of the "Status of Strategic Priorities Work Plan Initiatives and Key Infrastructure Projects as at March 31, 2025"

Council accepted Village staff's "Quarterly Department Reports – For Quarter ending March 31, 2025".

The Village of Belcarra 2025 Tax Rates Bylaw No. 634, 2025 received first, second, and third readings.

Land-clearing was noted on the Metro park's former caretaker's lot on Midden Road. Metro parks is considering the installation of a septic system.

It was noted that effective April 24, 2025, Melony Burton is the newly appointed Chief Administrative Officer, Financial Officer, Approving Officer, and Secretary to the Board of Variance.

Stewart Novak reported to Council that an application to receive a water metering grant upgrade was not approved. He indicated that there may be other future funding opportunities for the Village.

Watering trees, shrubs, and flowers is permitted any day from 5:00 am to 9:00 am if using a sprinkler, or any time if hand watering or using drip irrigation. All hoses must have an automatic shut-off device.

Edible plants are exempt from restrictions.

Spring has sprung and the bird is on the wing but that's absurd the wing is on the bird.

What have you seen in your garden lately? If you live on Main Avenue, chances are that you have seen a bear in its underwear. What does that say about the neighbourhood?

The blush of yellow on the Forsythia is a sure sign of the change in seasons, not just that there is a wonderful show of blossoming shrubs everywhere you look. Camelias and Magnolias are particularly in full bloom this year. Daffodils are making a show and leaf shoots of Day Lilies, Tulips, Soloman's Seal and all kinds of plants are showing signs of life. Even the large trees are showing more greenery every day. One treasured flower is the Hellebore, which has been in bloom since December. It was nearly destroyed by the cold snap, but is now back in full glory. Of course, the grass is sprouting and the first cutting has started the season; and then there is the trimming of the hedgerows and shrubs within the yard.

In between the rain rivers there was enough time to prune the apple trees and raspberries and now we wait in anticipation to see if it was not too drastic. It is now time to be pruning and putting the Geraniums back on the sun deck once that has been scrubbed and the grandsons called to do the heavy lifting.

Having been away for a couple of weeks, I am still waiting for our feathered friends to come back to a regular showing in full force to enjoy the seed spread on the deck railing. Stellar Jays have shown up in large groups and the Dark-eyed Juncos are beginning to increase in numbers. Blackcap Chickadees, White Crowned, and Song Sparrows, together with Spotted Towhees are regulars. House Finches, Canada Geese, Band-tailed pigeons and Robins are occasional shows. A cloud of Pine Siskins and the Piliated Woodpecker make the odd show, as does the Bald Eagle perching at the edge of the Bay. Crows and Gulls are usually seen, but the big joy is the return of the Rufous Hummingbird that loves to perch on the middle spire of a truncated Hemlock and flash his breast for all to see. Generally, we get to see around ten species and up to thirty-five birds in a one-hour session.





Memories of a Trip to Japan By Klaus Bever

Japan is, seemingly, a country of contrasts. Monuments to many centuries of feudalistic and warrior monarchical history are blended with graceful Buddhist temples and Shinto arches amidst pastel green shaded gardens. No warrior is more frightening than the samurai; no garden more restful and peaceful than the Japanese garden.

The people moving on the streets of Tokyo are goal dedicated and very private on their paths, avoiding eye contact. When we appeared lost and indecisive in the maze of the Tokyo subway underground, many hands and smiling faces came to help us. The ticket machines of the Tokyo rail stations have the same dirty patina and lack of personality as those in Vancouver. Our first outing was from the port city of Yokohama to the seaside former capital city of Kamakura, to the south. When the rail ticket machines failed us, we were helped by school children and early morning commuters. This was a pleasant opening chapter to our second visit to Japan.

We had forgotten that most admirable of Japanese technological achievements, the making of some of the very brief but necessary, recurrent human moments an event of immense daily anticipation and satisfaction: the visit to the toilet. The overall appearance of the toilet in Japan is not unlike that found in the public washrooms at Costco or at the Vancouver International airport. The toilets are similarly throne-like in overall appearance, suggesting perhaps that some business conducted, at times, may be urgent and of royal importance. The toilet is most often of ivory-white glazed ceramic, covered rather indecorously with an oversized thick plastic lid. But there, most comparisons end. The lid, on being lifted, has The often non-thoughtsome weight to it. provoking act of toilet lid lifting in Canada seems to acquire more importance in Japan. It is perhaps similar to a first step in a more lengthy theatre piece long remembered.

The toilet seat is of a familiar size, shape, and texture as found in Canada. But oh my, oh my... it is heated. And not heated to a level of near thermal discomfort but more to the temperature of faint memories of bath water that mommies slowly lower their babies' bottoms into.

Of course, shortly after, one does what one comes here to the toilet to do. And afterwards, amidst the various more incredibly mundane alternatives from around the world, you are ready for that uniquely Japanese olympian expression of modern-chip, high-tech achievement. There is a spigot near the back of the toilet which softly, soothingly directs a warm stream of water upwards and towards where it is most needed. The flow continues uninterrupted, unhurriedly, until you press a small button on the wall near the toilet. The visit ends as the spigot flow slowly diminishes, and then stops.

Our time in Japan was far too brief.

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
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Easter Sunday Pancake Breakfast

The Frozen River by Ariel Lawton







FortisBC Notification Advanced Metering Infrastructure Project

FortisBC will soon begin work throughout the community to upgrade residential gas meters to wireless advanced meters.

Here's what FortisBC wants its gas customers to know before the gas meter exchange:

- Most customers don't need an appointment for the meter exchange.
- To assist the technician with their work, we ask that customers maintain a clear path to the meter and keep the area around it clear of items that may be blocking access.
- A FortisBC employee or approved contractor will install the new meter. This meter exchange will take approximately one hour.
- The technician may need to temporarily shut off gas service and may need to enter the premises to relight gas appliances once the meter exchange is complete.
- If a customer is present, Fortis can relight appliances right away.
- If a customer is not present during the exchange, Fortis will leave a number to call to have a technician return in a timely fashion to relight gas appliances, if required.

Stories from the Archives — "Deep Cove"

"An appropriation of \$200,000 [about \$5.4 million today] having been passed by the Federal Government towards the construction of a bridge across the Second Narrows in Burrard Inlet, it is interesting to note that the 'Vancouver, Westminster & Yukon [V.W.&Y.] Railway Company' have filed plans for a railway line extending from Second Narrows to Deep Cove on the North Arm of Burrard Inlet [a.k.a. 'Indian Arm']. Also, that erection of strong steel bridges, capable of carrying heavy cars across Lynn and Seymour Creeks, is now being rapidly carried to completion, and that an excellent road communication will shortly be established between North Vancouver City and Deep Cove. Plans are also underway for extending the telephone service to this place, and an estimate has been furnished for the cost of construction of this line."

"When the wonderful natural advantages of this beautiful portion of our harbour are remembered, it is hard to overestimate the full significance of the above facts, and easy to foresee a wonderful development in this district in the near future. That Deep Cove is bound to become a most delightful suburb from a residential point of view when good communication by land is established, has long been realized by those who know the spot. The knowledge, however, that some of our shrewdest business men have made heavy purchases in this section lends colour to the rumour that the opinion is rapidly gaining ground that Deep Cove has a future as an industrial, shipping and railway centre."

"It must be admitted that this bay affords anchorage and shelter for shipping that is unsurpassed in our harbour; that it can easily be reached by vessels of the deepest draught; that it is in close proximity to the proposed bridge over which the great transcontinental [railway] lines now building to this coast will have to cross to reach Vancouver, and that these lines can have easy access to its shores."

"The fact that the 'V.W.&Y. Railway Company' apparently already recognized these advantages by registering their plans for a line into Deep Cove will go far towards directing to this place the attention of the great companies who will soon be seeking for an outlet in this harbour."

Afternotes:

- 1. The 'Vancouver, Westminster & Yukon Railway Company' (V.W.&Y.) was incorporated in 1901 by British Columbia's foremost industrialist of the day, John Hendry, and shortly thereafter Hendry received a federal charter to lay track from New Westminster to Vancouver. Hendry subsequently sold most of the assets associated with the V.W.&Y. in the four years leading up to 1915 when the company's charter expired, and the Deep Cove railway extension was never built.
- 2. In 1906, the 'North Arm Navigation, Land and Development Company Limited' created the Deep Cove Subdivision Plan and began marketing lots in the townsite the same year.
- 3. The First World War (1914–1918) interrupted many proposed development plans including the Second Narrows bridge access and railway crossings to North Vancouver.
- 4. The original 'Second Narrows Bridge' was not opened until November 7th, 1925.

Recipe for Lemon Tart By Sue Brain

Crust:

1 cup flour 1/2 cup butter 1/4 cup sugar pinch of salt

Mix together the flour, sugar, butter, and salt. Press the crumbly mixture into a greased tart pan. Bake at 325 F for 20-25 minutes until golden. Let the crust cool.

Filling:

3 large eggs

14 oz sweetened condensed milk

1 Tablespoon lemon zest

1/2 cup fresh lemon juice

Blend filling ingredients together. Pour into the baked crust and bake another 25-30 minutes until set.

Recipe for Crunchy Apple-Banana Dog Treats By Nora Boekhout

Ingredients:

1 apple (shredded)

1 small ripe banana

1 egg (large)

1 Tbsp peanut butter (all natural please!)

1 Tbsp coconut oil

1 cup oat flour (more expensive!)

11/2 cups whole wheat flour

1/4 cup flax seeds (milled)

1/4 tsp cinnamon

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F (175°C). Line baking sheet with parchment paper.
- 2. Wash and core an apple. Grate it finely.
- 3. Mash a small ripe banana. (I like to keep my overripe bananas in the freezer for all baking needs.)
- 4. Mix the apple, banana, egg, peanut butter, and coconut oil (melted) in a large bowl.
- 5. Add your dry ingredients and mix well. Add a little more flour if it seems too sticky. Add a little water if you need to get any dry bits in the bowl.
- 6. Lightly flour your surface and roll dough to about 1/4 inch.
- 7. Cut into your favourite shapes. You can also divide into long rectangles (3/4" x 6" or 12") and score them every 3/4" to make squares that are easy to snap apart after baking.
- 8. Bake for about 25-35 minutes (ovens vary), until golden.
- 9. Cool before serving! Homemade treats for weekly servings are best kept in the fridge with the rest kept in the freezer.
